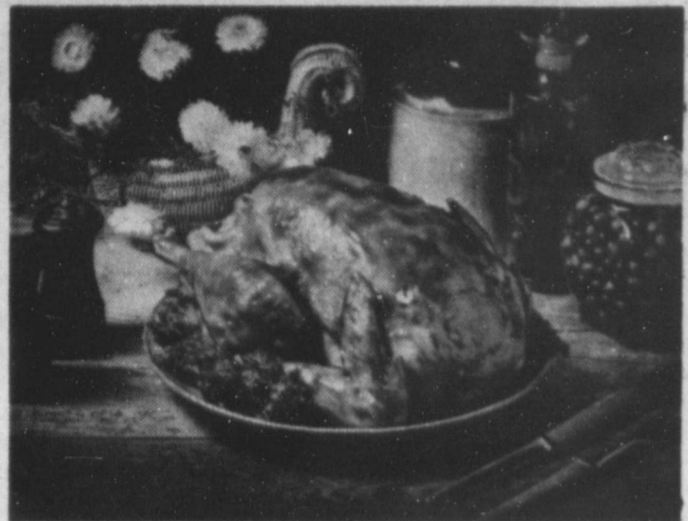

Cranberry Glazed Turkey

10 to 12 lb. turkey
 10 cups soft bread cubes (about 14 slices)
 1 cup chopped walnuts
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon leaf rosemary
 1 teaspoon ground sage
 1/2 teaspoon leaf thyme
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1/2 cup water or broth
 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted

Cranberry Glaze
 1 can (1 lb.) jellied cranberry sauce
 1 cup apple juice
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Glaze; toss lightly to combine. Stuff turkey cavity and neck portion with stuffing mixture. Bake at 325° at 18-20 Min. per lb.

Prepare Cranberry Glaze; brush on turkey. Return to oven for about 15 minutes, basting frequently, until nicely glazed. Serve remaining glaze with turkey. 10 to 12 servings.

Cranberry Glaze: In medium saucepan, heat cranberry sauce until somewhat thinned, stirring constantly. Add apple juice and butter; continue to heat, stirring constantly, until butter has melted.

Prepare turkey for baking. (If frozen, thaw first and follow label directions.) In large bowl, combine remaining ingredients except Cranberry



DOUBLE CRANBERRY SALAD

2 1/2 cups cranberries apple dressing
 2 4 ounce packages of 1 1/2 oz. package lemon flavored gelatin
 1 10 1/2 oz. package frozen cranberry orange relish
 1/2 cup chopped celery
 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 1 1/2 cups cream styled cottage cheese
 4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

Bring cranberries drink to boiling. Stir in gelatin till dissolved; stir in relish. Chill till partially set; stir in celery and nuts.

Pour half into an 8x8x2-inch baking dish and top with remaining gelatin. Chill till firm. Cut into squares. Makes nine servings.



Apple - Sour Cream Pie

Pastry for 9-inch lattice top pie
 1 beaten egg
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 1 cup dairy sour cream

Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry. Combine egg, granulated sugar, brown sugar, and sour cream.

Stir in sliced apple and the raisins. Turn into pastry shell. Add lattice top; seal edges, and flute. Bake in 400° ovens for 50 minutes or till done, covering edges with foil during last 15 minutes baking time.

**Art of Meat Carving
A Handy Thing In
The Holiday Period**

COLLEGE STATION --Skillful carving of meat is an art. And one main reason to master it is that properly carved meat is more tender and manageable on the place, according to Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Extension Service.

"The carver needs proper cutlery or tools. The standard carving set contains a sharp knife with a curved blade about eight or nine inches long, a matching fork and a steel.

This set, or an electric knife, can be used for any cut of meat," she said.

"When carving at the table, the carver may stand or sit. The platter of meat is placed in front of the carver, with stacked plates close by.

Before carving, it is best to carve enough for everyone, she notes.

"Thick cuts of meat are carved across the grain. This makes the fibers shorter, yielding tender slices. Cuts that are too thin to carve across the grain--such as beef briskets--are carved diagonally across the grain.

Very tender loin or rib steaks may be cut with the grain," she said.

Timely Tips On How To buy A Coat

As cold weather moves in and warm clothes and winter wraps come out, purchasing a new coat may be necessary.

Some thought before purchasing will help insure a serviceable and pleasing garment, according to Claudia Mitzel, consumer education: clothing and textiles specialist with the Texas Extension Service.

"First consider how the coat will be used. If it will be worn throughout the day at work or school, the best choice is a well constructed garment made with high quality fabric.

"But if an occasional or dressy coat is all that is needed, a more delicate fabric or a less expensive garment may serve," she said.

Also, the climate and wearer's preference for warmth determine a great deal about which weight coat to select", she said.

"Before trying on a coat, consider its construction" she said.

- Is this the stitching straight and even?
- Is the hem inconspicuous?
- Are the buttonholes well made?

- Do the seams that may ravel have some sort of seam finish?

- Are plaids or stripes matched at the seam lines?
- Are all parts of the coat in the same direction especially with a pile fabric or a one-way design?

Sometimes garments can be reinforced if their construction is not up to par. Generally cost rises as construction quality improves. But the only way to really know how well a coat is made is to learn what to look for and then examine each coat carefully.

She suggests that when

trying on a coat, consideration should be given to how it fits, how fashionable it is and how suitable it is to the wearer's figure.

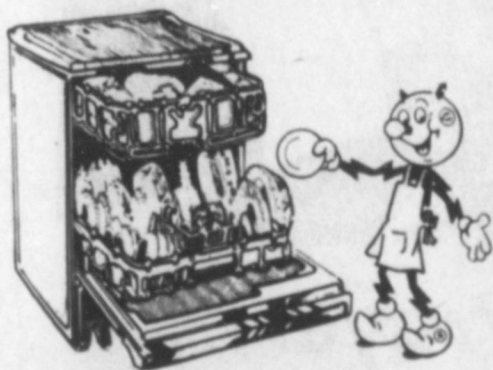

DISHWASHER SAVER-TIPS

A dishwasher will usually hold a whole day's dishes. It takes as much hot water and energy to wash 1 dish as it does a full load. Stack your dishes out of sight in your dishwasher and wait until you have a full load to turn it on.

Use only detergents manufactured specifically for dishwashers. A wetting agent helps prevent water spots on glasses and silverware.

Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.

WATER HEATER SAVER-TIPS

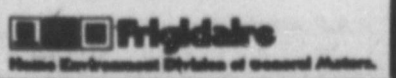
It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute will waste 300 gallons per month.

To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.

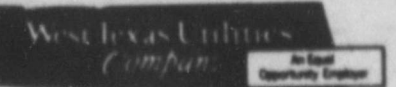
The thermostat controlling the water temperature is usually pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150° F. This setting has proven satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.

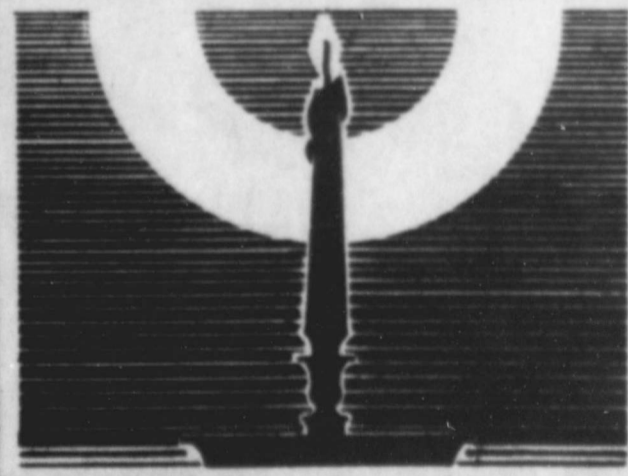


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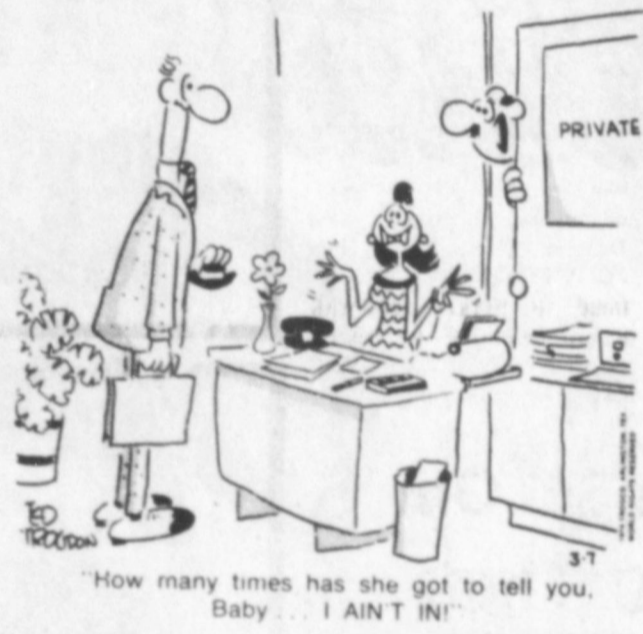

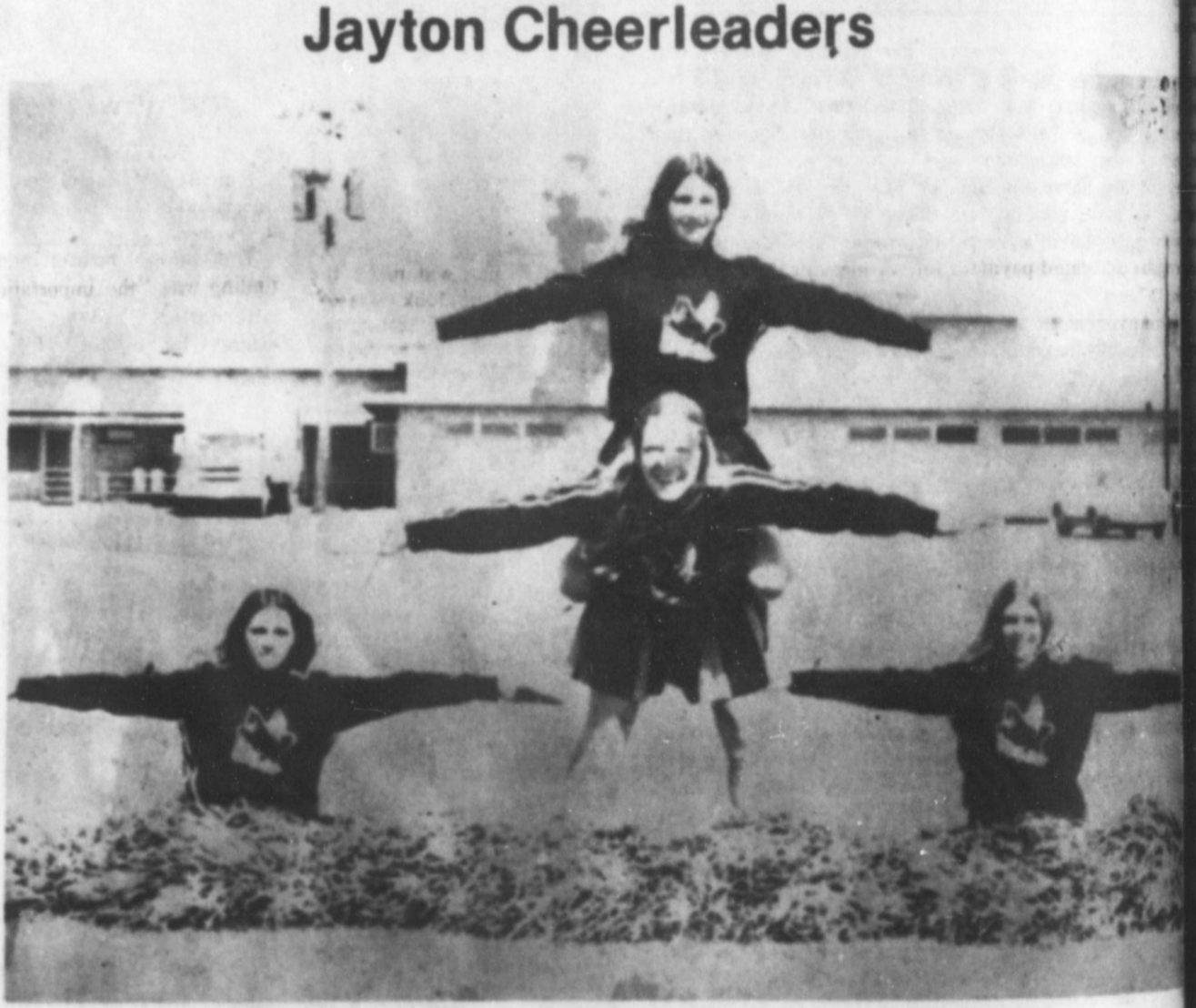

The USDA Announces Additional 1975 Cotton Program Plans

Washington, Nov. 14--The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that the 1975 upland cotton program will have a national base acreage allotment of 14,802,000 acres and a national production goal of 12,559,000 standard bales of 480 pounds, net weight. The acreage allotment is the same as for 1974 and the production goal compares with 14,802,000 bales for this year. Also announced today were a target price of 38 cents per pound unchanged from 1974--and apportionment of the national base acreage allotment to states. The Department had announced other major program revisions earlier. On Aug. 26, USDA said there will be no acreage set-aside or conserving base requirements under the upland cotton or the feed grain and wheat programs next year (release 2433-74). On Oct. 31, the department announced preliminary loan rate of 34.27 cents per pound, applicable to ginning one-inch upland cotton (micronaire 3.5 through 4.8) weight, at average U. S. Location, and a seed cotton loan program for the 1975 crop. (micronaire is a measure of fiber fineness). The Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 provides that if the average market price received by farmers during calendar year 1975 is below the target price of 38 cents per pound, participating producers will be paid the difference between the target price and the higher of the loan rate or the average farm price. The 1973 Act also provides participating farmers with some protection against disasters. Producers who are prevented from planting any portion of their allotment to cotton because of a natural disaster or other condition beyond their control or who, because of such disaster or condition are prevented from harvesting at least two-thirds of their normal production may qualify for disaster payments on the production shortfall at a per-pound rate equal to the higher of regular calculated payment rate or one-third of the target price (12.7 cents). Total payments to any person under one or more of the disaster programs for cotton, feed grain or wheat are limited to \$10,000.

White Warns Of Possible Food Deficit

AUSTIN--Calling the United States "one gigantic food production machine," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White recently warned that food shortages similar to the oil shortage can develop if farmers are unable to produce at a reasonable profit. "If we run our own producers out of business, we are going to become more dependent on imports for food," White stated in remarks to a state meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District officials in San Antonio. White said between 1972-73 imports increased 29 percent to a record \$5.52 billion, lowering wholesale prices of American-grown products without comparable decreases to consumers. In 1974 imports rose another 30 percent to \$9.5 billion. "Meat and dairy products are especially hard hit at present," White said. The commissioner cautioned that a faltering agricultural machine will lose the country its position of world leadership. "When our food supplies become a tool of foreign political units, we can have a disaster that will make the fuel shortage look minor," he said. "We are setting our feet on that very same road in food production that we did in oil."

Aspermont FFA Wins Dist. Contest

The Aspermont FFA chapter competed Monday, Nov. 18 at Hamlin in the annual FFA leadership contest. The Double Mountain FFA district is made up of 15 schools. There are six divisions in the contest. The Aspermont FFA Chapter participated in five of the five and the chapter placed one first, two seconds and one third. The FFA Quiz team which consisted of Julie Hawkins, Clint Cook and Judge Ward will compete for area honors at Big Spring Sat. Nov. 23rd.

Water, Inc. Takes New Look At Water Importation Plan

Water, Inc. officials have taken a positive stance on the Bureau of Reclamation, Corps of Engineers study of an important plan for West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. They have viewed the study as a giant step forward, a "poor press" not withstanding. On the positive side, the study found that a supplemental water supply is needed on the High Plains of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico, that surplus water is available in the Mississippi River system and that from an engineering standpoint, facilities could be built to transport the water. The single disconcerting finding was "the importation alternative plan just cannot be economically or financially justified using present procedures."

The national production goal of 12,559,000 bales (standard bales of 480 pounds, net weight) is equal to the sum of the estimated domestic consumption and estimated exports for the 1976 marketing year which begins Aug. 1, 1975, plus an increase of 5 percent of the total market expansion, plus an allotment to provide carryover stocks equal to 54 percent of average offtake for the three preceding marketing years. The national base acreage allotment is apportioned to states on the bases of the acreage planted (including acreage reseeded as having been planted) to upland cotton within the acreage allotment in the years 1969 through 1970, and the base acreage allotment in 1971 through 1973, with adjustments in these acreages as required by law. The 1975 allotment for Texas is 4,677,073 acres. The state acreage allotment will be apportioned among counties on the county allotments among farms according to provisions in the law and regulations issued by the secretary of agriculture. The farm allotment does not limit the amount of cotton a farmer can plant, but is computed only for the purpose of determining payments should a payment be required. Failure to plant at least 90 percent of the farm allotment will result in a reduction in any payment due and could result in a reduction of 20 percent in the 1976 farm allotment.

What is an occluded front? What causes them to form? An occluded front is always formed when a cold front (which travels up to 35 m.p.h. or sometimes even faster) overtakes the slower-moving warm front. The cold air mass pushes the warm, often moist, air upward and there is a mixing process which may confuse the observer on the ground and even the professional in his forecasting office. A characteristic of an occluded front is heavy rain and often strong winds. Often, however, the cold front which overtakes the warm front will speed up the weather and clearing will become more rapid than had the warm front passed unopposed.

About The ATT Suit

The following statement has been issued by Leslie H. Warner, chairman and chief executive officer of General Telephone & Electronics Corporation, concerning the civil antitrust suit filed Wednesday (Nov. 20, 1974) by the U.S. Department of Justice against

American Telephone and Telegraph. "We are shocked and appalled that the Department of Justice has decided to take this action against ATT. "If the Department of Justice prevails in its attempt to break up ATT, it will seriously undermine the high quality and efficient telephone service which has contributed so much to the growth and development of this country

and is the envy of the rest of the world. Obviously, this certainly would not be in the best interest of the public which, after all, the antitrust laws of the country are primarily intended to foster and protect." General Telephone of the Southwest, with headquarters in San Angelo, Tex., serves over 1,108,000 telephones in 400-plus exchanges in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Arkansas and is a subsidiary of General Telephone & Electronics Corp. (GTE).

GTE telephone companies constitute the largest non-Bell telephone system in the U.S. serving nearly 12 million telephones in portions of 33 states including parts of Southern California, the West Coast of Florida, a number of midwestern states, the Pacific Northwest and Hawaii. Warner continued, "We are particularly shocked by the timing of the action taken by the Department of Justice at a time when our country is in the midst of a recession, the stock market is in a shambles, and ATT and other telephone companies are already finding it almost impossible to raise the enormous amounts of new capital required to construct the facilities needed to meet their customers' service demands. The fact that the announcement was made at a time when ATT is involved in the largest debt financing ever undertaken by any company in this country is further evidence of the department's lack of awareness of the extremely serious economic problems confronting telephone companies and other utilities at the present time.
