Actions of the Commissioners Court

The Kent County Commissioners court held a very interesting meeting Monday. Items brought up for discussion and passed upon, as dictated by the minutes in the office of County Clerk Zana, are as follows:

Order To Pay Bill
A motion was made by George Taylor and seconded by J.H. Parks to approve all bills presented before the Court. Vote on this was unanimous.

Purchase of Fuel
A motion was made by Sarah Byrd and seconded by Donnie Carriker that since the Court is duly advised for gasoline, diesel fuel, and propane and that firm bids have been received that are acceptable, therefore, until the energy conditions are changed, the Court purchase fuel on the open market at the lowest available price. Vote on this was unanimous.

Report Any Strange Weather to Sheriff

Library Shelving
A motion was made by W.H. Parks and seconded by Donnie Carriker to buy shelving for the Library from Hunter Millworks, Inc. for \$1,520.00 as per contract. Vote was unanimous.

County Treasurer's Report
A motion was made by Sarah Byrd and seconded by Donnie Carriker to approve the County Treasurer's Report for the period beginning on the 1st day of October, A.D. 1974 and ending on the 31st day of December, A.D., 1974. Vote on this was unanimous.

Kent County Farmers Apply For Crop Loans

389 claims, in the amount of \$443,060.61 have been filed by Kent County farmers for losses due to disasters that are covered by the disaster provisions of the Agriculture Act of 1973.

The Act provides that a producer may be eligible for compensation if substantial loss was sustained due to a disaster for wheat, grain sorghum or cotton. A disaster is described as drought, flood, wind or hail.

The final date to file is not later than 15 days after the crop is harvested or if none of the crop is harvested, then before any use is made of the crop includes grazing, plowing, etc. This program is administered by the Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service Offices. The Kent County Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service Office is currently up to date with payments. Some counties are running behind due to the number of claims filed.

The ASCS personnel urge that you contact them if you feel that you may be eligible for a payment. A claim for payment must be filed for, they are not automatic. Proof of production must be furnished along with evidence showing the loss was due to a disaster. All questions on this program should be directed to your county ASCS office.

Easter Seal Appeal letters will arrive at homes in the county between Feb. 15 and March 15. The Easter Seal Representative is the person to contact to request services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

FERTILIZER CONSERVATION FOR GARDENERS

With continued high fertilizer costs due to low supplies, home gardeners are urged to use fertilizer wisely during the coming months. A vegetable specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service advises having soil tested, using only light applications of fertilizer, using organic fertilizer and compost, using mulch to keep plant nutrients in the soil, and applying fertilizer as a sidedress when plants grow slowly or lack good color.

Farmers Union Group Plans Lobbying Trip To Austin 18th

Over 100 farmers, ranchers and their wives will take on the role of "citizen lobbyists" as they assemble in Austin, Tuesday, Feb. 18, to participate in the Texas Farmers Union Legislative Day activities.

The Farmers Union members will be petitioning their representatives in Austin on matters of great importance to rural areas and agricultural production in the state. Emphasis will be placed on informing urban members of the Legislature with problems faced by rural citizens.

Among the key issues to be discussed by the farm organization members will be the creation of a state Public Utility Commissions. Rapidly increasing utility rates and marginal service are critical issues affecting many parts of livestock to be taxed at its productive value. Many farmers and ranchers are being forced out of business by high property taxes they are paying due to the high market value of land created by speculation and its location relative to other land uses.

Other issues which the "farm lobbyists" will be discussing include an in-

creased appropriation for the Senior Texans Employment Program, a work program for older low-income Texans administered by the Farmers Union Community Development Association, and the establishment of a committee to study the feasibility of a state young farmer land transfer program.

The Legislative Day activities will begin with an early morning breakfast and briefing session. Several state office holders and key committee chairmen will brief the Farmers Union members on important legislation dealing with rural areas.

The day's activities will conclude with an evening reception for members of the Legislature and State Officials sponsored by Texas Farmers Union.

Wassail

1 quart hot tea
1 quart cranberry juice
1 quart apple juice
3 sticks cinnamon
12 whole cloves
1 cup sugar
2 cups orange juice
¼ cup lemon juice

1 orange, sliced
1 lemon, sliced

Combine all ingredients except orange and lemon slices. Bring to boil. Pour into a bowl and float fruit slices. Serves 16 to 20.

Spiced Tea

1 cup instant tea, lemon flavored
2 cups Tang
3 cups sugar
1 t. cloves

1 t. cinnamon

Mix well and keep in tight container. Put 2 heaping teaspoons to cup. Finish filling with boiling water.

Molasses Crinkle Cookies

¼ cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
1 beaten egg
¼ cup light molasses
2 ½ cups flour
¼ t. salt
2 t. soda
1 t. cinnamon
1 t. ginger
½ t. cloves
¼ cup sugar

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Peaches Source Of Delicious Dishes

LUBBOCK--Apple cobbler, peach preserves, apricot jam and pecan pie--just thinking about these delicacies is enough to make your mouth water.

"This is the time to do more than think about this year's harvest," said Dr. George O. Elle, professor of horticulture at Texas Tech University. "Now is the time to prune fruit and nut trees to make sure you get the best crop possible."

Elle will conduct a seven-week lecture-demonstration class in pruning fruit and nut plants Feb. 10 through March 31. The class will meet Mondays from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

For the first time, interested persons from the community will be able to enroll in the course on a non-credit basis. Enrollment will be limited to 25 persons from the community.

A \$10 fee will be payable at the first class session, Monday, Feb. 10, in Room 108 of the Plant Science Building.

The class is offered to the public as a community continuing education service by the Department of Plant and Soil Science in cooperation with the Division of Continuing Education.

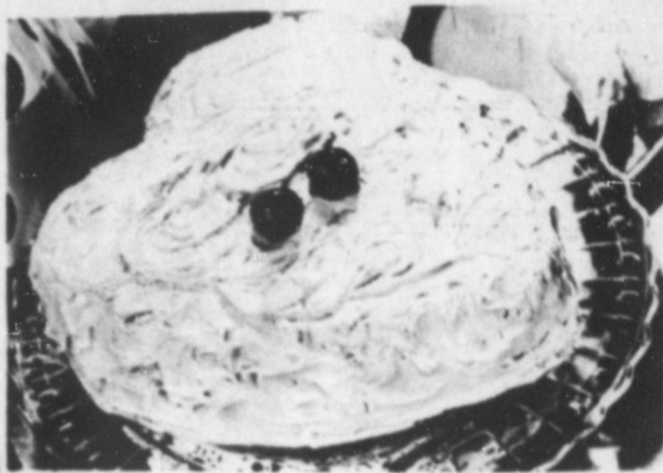
"Proper pruning and trained development of a tree's framework are important in getting the best crops and assuring the easiest possible harvest," Elle said. "The first five years are the most critical in framework development."

"The course will demonstrate pruning and training through bracing with spreaders to encourage good framework development," he said.

Major pruning should be done just before the growing season begins in March.

Sand Tarts

7/8 cup butter or margarine
2 cups flour
1 T. water
4 T. sifted confectioners' sugar
2 t. vanilla
1 cup chopped pecans
Cream fat; add sugar, flour, water and nuts and vanilla. Chill dough. Take dough by tablespoonful, roll, and shape into crescents. Bake on ungreased cookie sheets, 275° F. for 25 or 30 minutes. Roll in confectioners' sugar while warm.



HONEY CHOCOLATE CAKE
(For Your Valentine)

2/3 cup shortening
1 cup honey
2 eggs
2 cups sifted flour
¼ cup cocoa
½ tsp. salt
½ tsp. soda
2 tsp. baking powder
¼ cup buttermilk
1 ½ tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening. Continue beating while slowly adding honey. Beat in eggs one at a time. Sift together three times flour, cocoa, salt, soda, and baking powder. Add to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk and vanilla. Place in two 9-inch greased and floured pans or two heart-shaped greased and floured pans. Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 30 minutes. Let cool and top with favorite frosting. For special effect use a basic cream frosting tinted pink.

COMMUNITY GARDENS - HOW THEY WORK IN EUROPE



Pictured above is a community garden in England where individual plot-holders have even constructed greenhouses. Called "allotments," these plots are cultivated mostly by men with such a heavy emphasis on vegetables that the government is encouraging the cultivation of more flowers by officially changing their name from "allotment gardens" to "leisure gardens."

THE FAMILY LAWYER

A pedestrian bumped his head on the awning in front of a grocery store.

A car owner bumped his head on the hoist at an auto repair station.

A beauty shop customer bumped her head on the air conditioning unit in a side window.

Each of these individuals suffered an injury, and each, in due course, filed a lawsuit demanding damages. But all three claims were turned down on the same ground: that the accident was the fault of the victim, not the management.

Generally speaking, the law expects you to keep "heads up" while you are on the move.

"A person must use his Providence-given senses to avoid injury," said one court. "A duty to look implies a duty to see what is in plain sight."

However, special circumstances can and do change this rule of law. For example:

A woman shopper, interested in buying a mattress, followed a furniture salesman into a dimly lighted corner of the store. There she walked into a low overhead rafter, suffering a concussion.

Here, the special circumstance was the poor visibility. Because of it, a court ruled afterward that the woman could not be blamed for colliding with the rafter. Instead, the management, whose salesman had neglected to warn her of the danger, was held liable in damages.

Another case involved a rickety, irregular stairway leading to the balcony of a hardware store. A customer, ascending cautiously one day, bumped his head against a metal bracing that he had failed to notice.

But again, a court decided later that the management alone was responsible for the accident. The court said the man could not be expected to keep his head up, watching for obstacles, when he had to keep his head down, watching the steps.

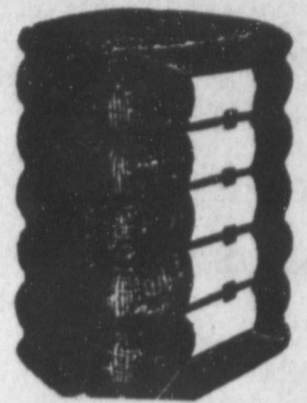

As It Looks From Here

EVERY COUNTRY IN THE WORLD* including our own, has had its national police and intelligence operations. OUR OWN COUNTRY MUDDLED THROUGH WARS AND CRIME WAVES without either a CIA or FBI. We did, however, during the American Revolution, have secret intelligence operations. Theodore Roosevelt founded the Bureau of Investigation which preceded the FBI by some 30 years.

NOW, WITH THE TREND TOWARDS LIBERALISM, there are those who have sound reason to want to dismantle all our intelligence agencies. Just recently, the old UnAmerican Activities Committee in the

House of Representatives was scuttled by the New Congress. Under the influence of Watergate, the CIA is under attack for conducting domestic surveillances, an authority which was never intended. Neither had the times of the 60's been intended or ever expected when the thousands of revolutionaries (their own term) marched in Washington and other cities across the Country. The question was always where did they get their finances. People who apparently lived well didn't come here from the four corners of the Nation by airplane for nothing. It may be an oversimplification but the role of the CIA, at that time, was to try to find out what foreign connections the leaders of these revolutionary groups may have had in financing these activities.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES OF BOTH THE HOUSE AND THE SENATE are being formed to investigate both the CIA and FBI. These agencies have grown to massive size and are accused of a serious challenge to popular freedom.

THE FBI IS NOW CHARGED WITH ASSEMBLING INFORMATION such as has come its way on Member of Congress. The CIA is charged with having kept file on 10,000 or more Americans in the course of trying to determine if the war protests of the 1960's were inspired or financed from foreign sources, and to what extent.

AS YET, THERE IS NO SIGHTED INSTANCE OF ANY member of Congress being intimidated by the FBI, nor any war demonstrator having been unduly hounded by the CIA. It could have happened in isolated instances without shaking the foundations of this Republic.

AS FAR AS CONGRESS MEN ARE CONCERNED, THEY ARE NO LESS free of peculiarities, and have human behavior like anyone else, but, although some are suspicious that they may have been investigated, nothing shows up yet that any such information was formally solicited but only that which came to them by reference.

THE POINT IS, THAT OUR HIGH CRIME RATE, and the foment in the Country, will continue as opportunity presents itself, but there are those in this increasingly assertive and permissive Democratic society, who seem to think there is a threat of oppression when laws are enforced or investigations are made of actions designed to overthrow and subvert this Nation.

DEMANDS ARE NOW



Picture above shows Elbert Walker farm west of Jayton. It was planted in the cotton blanks late in summer, later shredded and then chiseled after cotton crop was harvested. This practice provides excellent protection from wind erosion as well as building up the soil where cotton is planted to the field year after year.

Tillage For Wind Erosion Control

A dense cover of growing plants or plant residue is the best protection against wind erosion. But when plant cover is not adequate or is depleted, other methods of controlling wind erosion are needed. Emergency tillage is commonly used to provide temporary protection.

The purpose of emergency tillage is to break up the smooth surface of a bare field into rough clods that resist the force of the wind. The protection is temporary because wind and rain eventually break down the clods and the field becomes smooth again.

Emergency tillage should be used only if standard conservation measures, such as cover crops, plant residues, and windbreaks fail to control erosion because of severe drought or other causes. Avoiding unnecessary tillage is important in soil conservation because tillage buries plant residues, hastens the loss of organic matter and soil moisture, and breaks down soil structure.

Emergency tillage is less effective on sandy soil than on medium-textured soils. Fewer clods form in sandy soil, and a single tillage may protect the soil for only one or two periods of strong wind. Generally more clods form in medium-textured and fine-textured soils, and a single tillage protects the soils longer.

Listers and chisels are most commonly used for emergency tillage. Their effectiveness depends on soil texture and moisture content, depth of tillage, speed of travel, spacing

between tools and the toolhead. Listers and chisels are more effective and are more widely used than moldboard plows because they are less power and also less of the plant residue.

Solid listing is the method for emergency tillage of sandy soils. If the stubble is on the face between the rows and the stubble on the ridges, a small amount of stubble control erosion.

The first listing should be fairly shallow and later listings can be deeper in the field and if more control is needed, subsequent listings should be between the first furrows.

In tighter soils, chiseling generally is the best method to control wind erosion. Chisels can be solid when residue is available or if you have crop residue chiseling between the rows leaving the stubble standing for added protection.

Additional chiseling may be needed, chisel between the furrows as chisels completely destroy the residues. In loose soils, chisels must run at greater depth to turn up clods. If the soil is compact, narrow chisels should be used but they can run at a shallower depth.

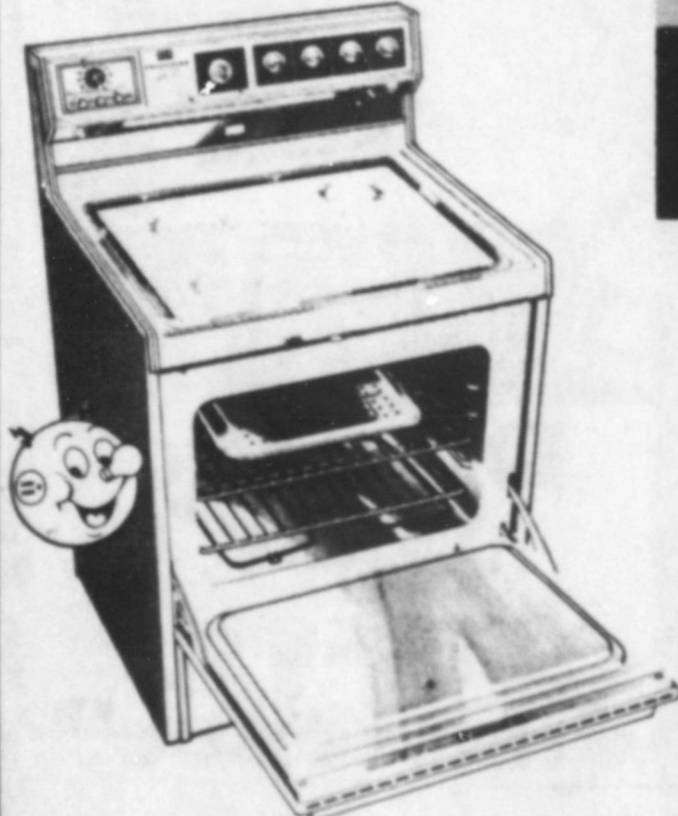
Chiseling sometimes is needed in a field of small grain if it gets to be due to dry weather or other causes. In this case spacing of chisels should afford some protection from blowing and still be possible to save most crop.
