race for president? Back when LBJ was United States Senator, and wanted to be president, they messed up our whole primary system, just to help LBJ.

Then the primaries were held in July and August. But, so LBJ could be protected, in any eventuality, the primaries were moved up to May and June.

This way LBJ was running for reelection, for reelection as Senator. Also he was a candidate for president. If he missed being president, he would still have his Senatorial Seat.

This was known as the LBJ law. Do you remember this how John Tower became Senator?

He was a candidate against LBJ in that race, but LBJ beat him out and was elected Senator, at the same time he was elected vice president on the ticket with Kennedy.

If he and Kennedy had lost, he would have remained in the Senate. After being elected vice president, then at his own time, LBJ resigned as Senator.

In a race that had 70 candidates in it (yes that is right, 70) John Tower was elected to the Senate, and has been there since.

Another special law, passed to effect one man, was the Yarborough runoff law. This was passed even before the LBJ law, if I remember correctly.

There was a vacancy in the U. S. Senate from Texas. A man was appointed temporarily, until someone could be elected.

Ralph Yarborough, who had made four unsuccessful bids for Texas Governor was a likely candidate.

What this meant was they were trying to head off the potential of Yarborough getting into a big race with many people in it, and then he being the top man, be elected.

Yarborough had enough friends to head this off, and he did not have to go into a runoff, but so much had been said about the runoff, that they went ahead later and passed it.

As a result, now, in school boards, and city elections, a full majority is required, which sometimes means a runoff.

Its kind of sickening to see special laws passed, just to help, or try to stop one individual. This is what we term "class legislation."

But my original thought, is that the Legislature has passed a law which will be of great aid to Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen in his bid for president.

I am glad Bentsen is running for president, that is fine. But it is too bad we have to pass special laws just to help individuals.

That is one of the great faults with American politics--too much of it for the benefit of too few--and not enough of it for the good of the masses.

Unless, of course you are going to put the General Motors interpretation on it--You know it was said once that what was good for General Motors is good for the USA.

Maybe we can say what is good for Llolyd Bentsen is good for Texas and the USA. If so, then fine.

I heard a discussion the other day, that sounded like Watergate.

It was stated that a mere were representatives of huge corporations.

One of them said their greatest problem, was handling their books.

He said constantly they were being "knocked down" by city and state politicians and men in position who extorted money from them, and they felt they had to pay it.

And yet they felt they had to get this on their expense accounts some way in order to make it tax deductible, and this was their bookkeeping problem.

College Station -- Years ago a nursing home was an old house at the end of the street, operated by an elderly couple who had space in that house for others to share.

But today's nursing home operations are a blooming \$4 billion industry. Mrs. Vivian Blair, family life education specialist, pointed out this week.

The specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, named urbanization and changing

family patterns as contributing factors in this change.

"Licensing standards become more rigorous each year in an effort to upgrade the quality of nursing home care.

In Texas, the licensing program has been in effect since 1970, and there are 958 licensed nursing homes in the state with 82,593 beds.

"The State Health Department's Nursing and Convalescent Homes Division is responsible for state licensing. Each nursing home must comply with certain standards

to qualify for participation in the state and federal assistance programs, including the State Welfare Department, federal medicare and medicaid programs."

The specialist explained that a nursing home is classified according to the care it offers. A "skilled nursing care" facility must have a registered nurse as its director of nursing and have licensed vocational nurses (LVNs) on duty at all shifts.

A home rated "intermediate care facility III" must have an LVN as its director of nursing with LVNs on duty during the

Pizza Loaf

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
 - 1 8-ounce can (1 cup) tomato sauce
 - 1/4 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
 - 1/4 cup chopped onion
 - 1 egg
 - 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons monosodium glutamate
 - 1/4 to 1 teaspoon oregano
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 6-ounce package sliced Mozzarella cheese
- Combine all ingredients except cheese; mix thoroughly. Divide meat mixture in thirds. Pat 1/2 in bottom of 9 1/2 x 5 1/2 inch loaf pan; cover with half of cheese. Repeat layers, ending with meat. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 1 hour. Makes 5 or 6 servings.



Parmesan Meat Loaf

- 1 pound ground beef
 - 1 8-ounce carton (1 cup) large-curd cream-style cottage cheese
 - 1/2 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
 - 1 egg
 - 1/4 cup catsup
 - 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
 - 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - Dash pepper
 - 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- Thoroughly mix all ingredients except Parmesan cheese. Lightly pack meat into 8 1/2 x 2 inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 20 minutes. Sprinkle top with cheese. Bake 10 minutes longer. Let stand 5 minutes; cut in squares. Makes 6 servings.

SOUTHWEST FARM SHOW OPENS

Just as surely as March follows February, the Southwest Farm Show opens on Friday morning, March 7, and continues through Sunday night, March 9.

New and interesting farm tractors and equipment, shown for the first time in the Southwest, will be on display for the over 50,000 farm-oriented people expected at the Tarrant County Convention Center in downtown Fort Worth.

County agents and key farmers from throughout the state will begin arriving at the Convention Center Friday morning for the "New World of Agriculture" Forum. Speakers with world knowledge of farm-related subjects, will discuss the farmer's role in the crucial years ahead. The Forum will conclude with a luncheon with the principle speaker being Congressman Jerry Litton from Missouri. The Forum is co-sponsored by Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Tickets are required.

The Farm Show does include plans for the women. A cooking school will be held on Friday morning and a fashion show on Saturday afternoon. Homemakers with a talent for sewing will model their garments made from natural fibers to interested fashion-minded people. The show begins at 4 p.m. The winners will be announced at the tractor pull Saturday night.

F.F.A. teams from the ten Texas districts will show their skill as farm tractor mechanics at 6 p.m. on Saturday. This contest has become a feature event of the rapidly growing, nationally recognized Southwest Farm Show.

Each night thousands of sports fans will enter the big indoor arena to watch the fire-belching tractors roar down the dirt track dragging a weighted sled. Drivers from throughout the United States will be pulled for their share of over \$18,000 in purse money. Added to the excitement this year will be the mini-tractors garden tractors with 350 plus horsepower engines. Tickets to the tractor pulls each night may be purchased at the ticket office at the Farm Show.

March could come into Texas like a lamb, but it should begin to roar like a lion in Fort Worth the week-end of March 7-9.

SCOTLAND YARD — Juvenile crime in London rose by 15 per cent in 1974 with 32,000 children between the ages of 10 and 16 being detained by police for offenses ranging from theft and larceny to muggings, robbery and burglaries.

Of the 32,000, about 4,500 formed a "hard core" of young criminals. About 1,000 children under 10 also came into the hands of police. — CNS

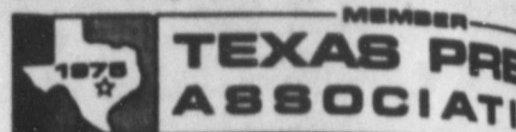

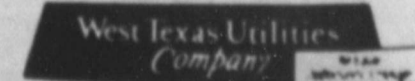
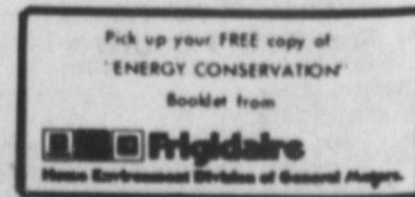

PUBLIC NOTICE

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

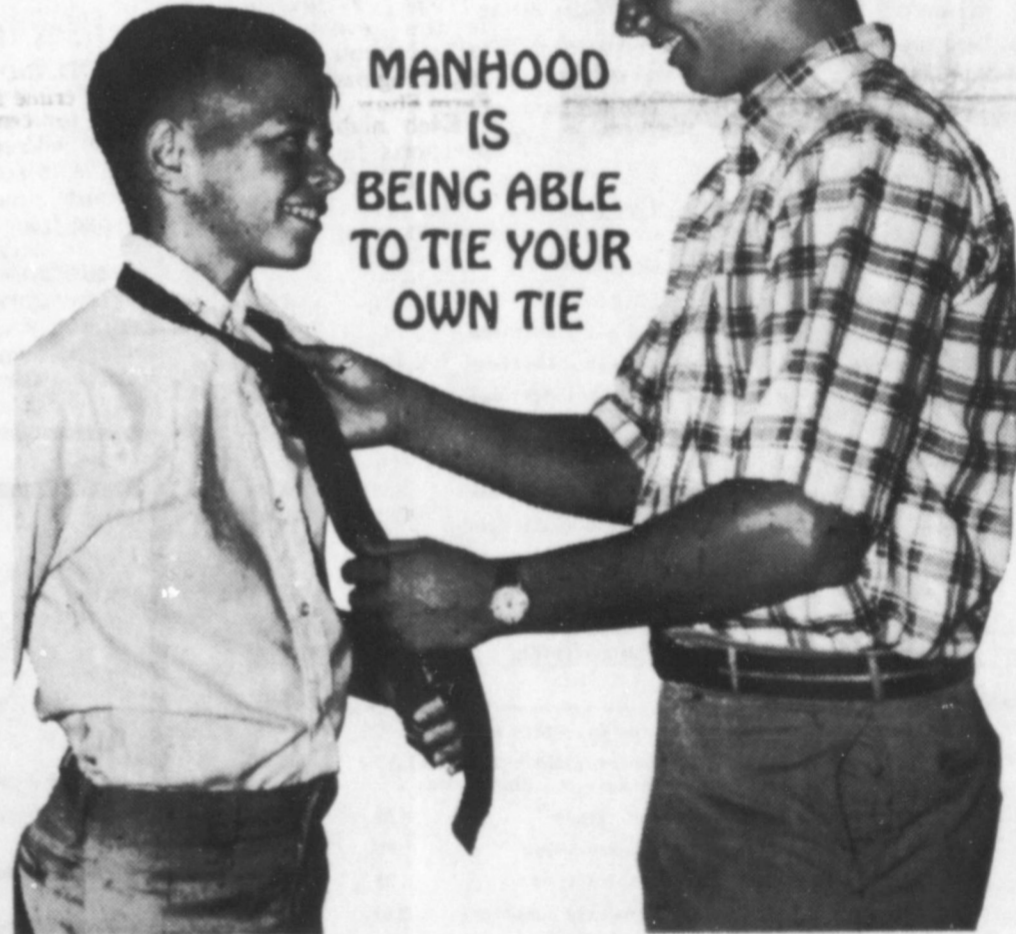

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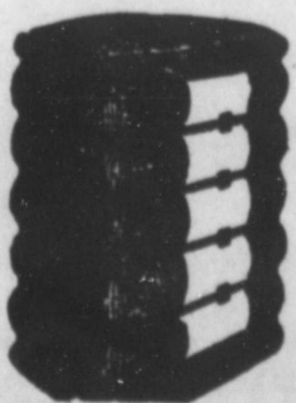
