Texas Highway Patrol **Check One Accident** In Kent County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural high-ways in Kent County during the month of March, 1975. according to Sergeant Frank Jircik. Highway Patrol supervi-sor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the three months of 1975 shows a total of one accident resulting in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock 1975, shows a total of 446 accidents resulting in 17

persons killed and 217 persons injured as compared to March, 1974, with 395 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 persons injured. This was 51 more accidents, six less killed and 45 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of March. 1975, occurred in the following counties: three in Garza; two each in Ochiltree and Oldham; one each in Gray. Haskell, Jack, Lamb, Lubbock, Montague, Par-ker, Swisher, Wichita, and Young.

AUGUSTA-The Lee Elder affair at the Masters this year was overdone. Crusading or color-writing sports reporters couldn't resist the story that the management at the Masters had purposely, willfully and systematically barred blacks.

Contrary to the popular belief, the winter months-which often bring three or four-day spells of bad weather-are not the greatest producers of moisture.

In most parts of the country nature has provided us with a water supply that arrives in close harmony with the needs of crops.

For example, the amount of precipitation usually begins to pick up in early spring, when things have been planted, and increases until about June, or even July, in some cases, and then tapers off. This fits in nicely with the needs of growing crops, most of which are harvested in the months following peak rainfall.





CLEAN YOUR CARPETS FOR PENNIES

Carpets should be cleaned thoroughly two or three times a year, Commercial cleaning will cost you, at current prices, about 15 cents per square foot, or \$16,20 for a 9 x 12 carpet. But look - you can do a professional cleaning job yourself - easily and quickly - for less than three cents a square foot,

But first, remember that the twice-a-year cleaning won't be sufficient if you permit your carpet to get excessively dirty or stained. Dirt is gritty and will abrade the tufts - thus shortening the life of the carpet - and stains, if not removed quickly, will be very difficult to get out. So attend to spills promptly, Here's a brief list of common stains and what to do about them.

Ink, grease, butter: Pour denatured alcohol or solvent on a paper towel; blot, don't rub,

Candle wax, oil, chewing gum: Scrape off, then use dry-cleaning fluid or a solution of equal parts of white vinegar and water.

Candy, chocolate, fruit juice, alcoholic beverages: Wipe with a detergent, then the vinegar and water solution.

Pet stains: Vinegar and water. Crayon, lipstick: Dry-cleaning fluid, then equal parts

of a detergent, vinegar and water, Now for the twice-yearly cleaning. Your best bet is

the home-cleaning method called the Host System, It is based on a cleaning compound made up of tiny plastic sponges dampened with a solvent. You spread the compound over the carpet (about three handsful a square yard), and work it into the carpet with a double-brush machine that you can rent,

You do three or four square yards at a time, working in different directions, let dry and then vacuum, The Host System is designed for home use as well as professional use and you can find the local source in the Yellow Pages. The compound and rented machine will cost you, probably, less than \$15, and it's much safer than a suds-type cleaner that exposes your carpet to the danger of overwetting, Another advantage is that the carpet cleaning machine actually lifts the pile while cleaning the fibers, thus removing deep dirt and adding to the life of your carpet,



spacious lawn, a few fruit

trees add the lovely color of their blossoms to any yard and within several years you can have a yummy fresh-grown harvest. Right about now is the perfect time to buy yearlings or two-year-old branched tree-lets for planting. Buy from a reliable mail-order nursery or your garden supply store. It's important to plant now because the trees are in their dormant stage and will need time to establish roots in your yard before the warmer weather to come inspires new growth. If you're a beginner try some of the dwarf varieties which tend to be less temperamental in their needs for attention and which also provide a good harvest of full-sized fruit, Ask at your local agricultural cooperative extension (should be in the phone book under US Gov't, offices) which fruit trees are hest suited to your area, Remember, that almost all varieties of plums, sweet cherries, apples and pears are not able to fertilize themselves and require mates for cross-pollination, Peaches, however, are independently self-fertile and can be grown in solitary splendor producing a couple of bushels of peaches in about four

Most of the common fruit trees require an open area with plenty of room for root growth as well as trunk and branch growth; 20 square feet is about right for dwarf apple or pear. Your idea! fruit tree planting area should be sunny and well drained. Planting holes should be ample enough to give roots lots of room and peat moss and/or compost should be mixed with the planting soil before you cover roots and fill the hole. On the bark of your tree you will find a soil line mark which shows the depth at which the young tree was previously planted, Bring the soil up to exactly this mark when planting, Mulching helps soil retain moisture and serves as a barricade aggressive weeds,




