Their move may be-and should be-the beginning of a trend toward lower supermarket food prices. Prices paid farmers for foodstuffs have been declining for months. There's no reason some part of that decline shouldn't be passed on to consumers.

As prices fell in the Jewel and Dominick's Finer Foods chains, a spokesman for the National Association of Retail Grocers also predicted food prices were coming down. Drowning Time

Already drownings are occurring in some sections of the nation-in the ocean and in lakes and streams.

One precaution swimmers should observe is to try to swim in groups, especially in the oceans. This offers any swimmer in distress immediate help and it also affords protection from sharks and other dangerous fish. It is always shocking to read of persons who are unable to swim going out in boats without life preservers --and many drown in this way every year. Others underestimate currents or their ability to swim or the distance involved. And such mistakes are often paid for with life itself.

Too Much The recent use of Navy ships and planes to recover thirty-nine merchant seamen from the communist Cambodian regime was necessary, and won the "face" contest in Asia, but too much has been made of it by a Washington press corps with little else to write these days. To begin with, the Cam-

bodians were almost defenseless at sea against the might of the U.S. Navy in the Gulf of Thailand. Secondly, we lost a number of American lives in this operation. We estranged Thailand, by using Thai bases to mount the air-marine strike.

It was a military operation deemed necessary and timely for various reasonsand the nation and Congress backed the President. But it was also a resort to force, a necessary one, which is best described as regrettably necessary.

Crop Insurance Reduces Risk Federal crop insurance

Washington, D. C. -- SPUNSURED BY ELEVEN. SENATORS AND ELEVEN MEMBERS of the House, an all-day conference was held last week on "Economic Planning in a Free Society." The meeting was moderated by Martin Agronsky with eight well known economists participating. THE INVITATION TO PARTICIPATE (which we

were unable to accept because of other pressing duties), posed these questions for discussion: Is long-range economic planning feasible in a Democratic society? Can it be decentralized? Humanized? What would be the legislative role in the planning process? DURING THE DEPRESSION YEARS PRIOR TO

WORLD WAR II, an effort was made to administer our resources throug national planning. The idea abandoned the concept of free markets. The Supreme Court finally ruled that the National Recovery Administration was unconstitutional.

PORPOSALS NOW IN VOGUE FOR ECONOMIC PLANNING are wrapped in a package labeled "progress." A new group called the Initiative Committee for National Economic Planning is now advocating programs which ignore our free market system. Seemingly, they believe that free enterprise can no longer cope with present-day economic situations. They take advantage of the moods in this time of recession and appeal to those who feel that further progress in unlikely. A controlled economy as an alternative, they say, is the answer. NO ONE CONTENDS OUR ECONOMIC SYSTEM IS

PERFECT but it is inextricably tied to personal freedom and has produced the highest standards of living and the greatest liberty the world has ever known

THE IDEA OF A MANAGED ECONOMY is based on the assumption that we, as citizens, are simply not smart enough to decide how to spend the money we earn and therefore we need to be told what is needed and how much.

THE PLANNER OMIT ANY REFERENCE to the fact that the loss of economic liberty is always accompanied by the loss of individual liberty. Those who advocate central planning assume they are smarter than the market-place and it follows that it is they who will

control the country. THE NUMEROUS REGULATIONS NOW IMPOSED ON THE PEOPLE of this Country already encroach on our freedom. The enforcement of regulations requires force but the advocates of further and more strict controls are usually able to get into their format something about freedoms such as the conference last week with the title "Economic Planning in a Free Society." If the proponents of centralized planning said they were building an economic police state their cause would collapse. Instead, they creep up with component parts of schemes which, when and if finally put together, would constitute a total change. If the total change were inaugurated all at one time the American people would not accept it and would label it for what it

THE PROCESS SEEMS TO BE TO ADOPT PROGRAMS with laudable purposes, delegate to the bureaucrats arbitrary powers to enforce each decision and try to teach people to understand that the will of the

planners if for their own good. THIS NATION WAS FOUNDED ON THIS CONCEPT of economic freedom as well as all other freedoms such as political, religious and the press. Each sector is a part of the other and an attack on one undermines the rest.

WE, AS A PEOPLE, HAVE ALWAYS been distrustful of the concentration of power. This fact motivated our founds to guard against it. Greater concentration of power in Washington can eventually destroy both our personal freedoms and our ability to produce. We need to preserve both or we may lose



That may sound good to a job-hunter, but our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division lawyers urge that you use caution if you decide to answer this type of help wanted ad.

Often the outcome is that you sign up for the course for a fee that may range into hundreds of dollars. If you do sign up, what are you likely to get? FREEZER TIPS

It's always been a pretty small world.

In the back of almost everyone's closet we can dig out stories and memories of the past. On of those memories usually revolves around the phrase "I knew him long before his ship came in." We all usually have memories of shaking hands with some great politician or movie star, or maybe we actually knew that person before he became great.

Back in 1948 our father owned and published a small weekly newspaper in Stonewall County. We were only a small tad of a lad (to borrow a phrase from Joe Don) and really don't remember much our father's political or civic activities other than he doubled as town editor and fire chief, mainly because his print shop was next door to the fire station. In his spare time he dubbed in as local justice of the peace and also was county Democratic chairman.

During the much-publicized election of that year there was a young man down south bidding for a U.S. Senate seat. He had just won the Democratic primary by 83 votes through some political manuevering by the Duke of Duval and earned himself the title of 'Landslide Lyndon.''

Lyndon Johnson wasn't operating on as large of a campaign budget as he had in later years, and he did much of the traveling statewide on his own and in his own vehicle. He would mainly hop from county to county just visiting and shaking hands. We know we have heard Dad tell of several times he and Johnson met alone for coffee or a meal at the local cafe.

Later that year, after Johnson was elected to U.S. Senate, he sent an autographed picture to our father as his appreciation for helping his successful campaign. The picture wasn't really that important and we can't recall ever seeing it until the fall of 1963 when Johnson assumed the Presidency. Then, from out of an old trunk somewhere, our father dug out that old autographed picture, brushed away the dust and cobwebs, and hung it on his front office wall - where it still hangs to this day.

In a little lighter vein, we were visiting with a brother-in-law recently about his days in the college dorm at Texas Tech in the mid-'60s. Presently running a farming operation around Seminole, Felix was recalling how he used to go down to the lobby of Thompson Hall with his trusty guitar and join a couple of

other students in passing the time.

He remembered one student his age--with sandy blond hair -- from Fort Worth who was a "pretty fair guitar player and singer, not to be a professional." Felix said he remembered at the time how the fellow had one of those "wierd names that always kind of sticks with you -- John Dutchendorf." That friend later dropped out of Tech and Felix said he figured he'd never hear from his again. However, Mr. Dutchendorf wandered out to the

West Coast, wrote and recorded himself a couple of songs and changed his name to something a little easier to spell -- John Denver.




