White Urges Sophomores, 1:00 p.m.; Hog Cholera and Juniors, 2:00 p.m. Prevention

AUSTIN-The first hog holera case in 16 months in Texas shows the need for continued attention to preventive methods. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White advises.

A 100-square-mile area in Deaf Smith and Castro counties has been quarantined because of an outbreak discovered in Hereford July 4. state-federal task force is in the area working to eliminate the disease and investigate the source of the outbreak.

'We are asking all farmers to watch their herds carefully and report sick animals immediately to local authorities," White said. Uncooked garbage should never be fed to swine.

Hog cholera is highly infectious, but it does not affect other farm animals and is not transmitted to humans. The virus can be carried from affected farms to other areas on shoes, clothing, and vehicles.

Texas No. 1 In '74 Export Complete Line of Gift Items For the

Of Livestock AUSTIN-Texas remained

leading state in livestock exportation in 1974, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has reported.

Statistics from the USDA show the state to be the number one exporter of beef-breeding cattle in the U.S., having sold 13,450 head in 1974.

Texas hog producers placed the state second in exports of breeding swine, shipping 3,055, only 168 fewer than the first-ranking state of Illinois. In the sales of dairy breeding cattle, the state was eighth with a total

White attributed the increase in exports from Texas to intensive marketing activities by the livestock industry

'The Texas Department Agriculture has stepped up efforts to bring in more foreign buyers," White said. 'The Livestock Directory which the Department publishes has stimulated many sales.

Brahmans ranked highest in number exported from Texas with a total of 3,991. Santa Gertrudis, Herefords, and crossbreeds were other major choices of foreign

Texas supplied almost one third of the Charolais cattle shipped from the U.S.

Principal breeds of swine sold from Texas hog farms were Duroc, Yorkshire, Hampshire, and crossbreeds. Dairy cattle breeds exported from Texas included Holsteins, Jerseys, Brown Swiss, and Guernseys.





We were actually surprised at the down-toearth personality of Rogers. He was very easy to talk with and a very comfortable man to be around. He seems very easy going and seems to stay in a good mood despite the hectics of filming a motion picture and putting up with curious onlookers and

ROGERS, WHOM evto as 'Roy', was born in 1912 in Cincinnati, Ohio, as Leonard Slye. He rode his first horse, which was actually a mule, at age 7 and got his first real horse at age 11 from his grandparents.

He hired out as a ranch hand in New Mexico at age 17 and a few years later formed "The Sons of the Pioneers' singing group after he began trying his hand at western songs. The group became popular and he soon got his break into movies.

Rogers always worked Pioneers' but stepped out of a role in the group and was replaced by Pat Brady, who later became pickup accident two years ago, but Rogers' still has Nelliebell, Brady's beloved jeep, in his Roy Rogers Museum in Apple Valley, Calif.



There was an August this century that changed the lives of almost every human being on earth-August 1914. The war that erupted in that month, exactly sixtyone years ago, ended a way of life, a style of living, an idealism that was partly romantic and partly chivalry, and introduced communism into the world through

America, it is now known, went into that war against Germany largely on misinformation and propaganda. The famed liner "Lusitania" was indeed carrying contraband when torpedoed and sunk. And Germany had a valid claim to conduct unrestricted submarine warfare in view of the fact that the British Navy was starving the German people systematically with its worldwide

But the German Emperor (Kaiser) was a blustering, proud and pompous man, not very effective in the field of public relations. In addition, the Germans thought they could win a war in central Europe. Of course, American sympathy went out to its mother country because of the common language and heritage.

But the question remains whether the defeat of Germany in 1918 produced anything good. The treaty of 1919 embittered Germany, made a new war certain and also produced Adolf Hitler. Some New Values Are Found For The Old Honored Cow Chip

Beef cattle manure has been found to yield significant amounts of ethylene, an important product derived from petroleum and natural gas.

The discovery was made at Texas Tech University by a research team working on a project supported by the U. S. Environmental Protection agricultural Agency's waste research program located at the Robert S. Kerr Environmental Research Laboratory at Ada,

EPA provided 73 per cent of the \$108,000 project. Additional funding was supplied by Pioneer Natural Gas Company of Amarillo, and the Texas Cattle Feeders Associa-

Ethylene is the back-bone of the plastics industry which provides a large variety of conveniences and necessities for

The process which, with minor adjustments, can be made to produce anhydrous ammonia synthesis gas also produces quantities of methane and ethane along with the ethylene. Synthesis gas is used in the manufacture of fertilizers while methane and ethane are major components of natural gas used for fuel.

The researchers are Dr. James E. Halligan, chairman of the Texas Tech Department of Chemical Engineering, Dr. William J. Huffman of that depart-

mated 12 to 14 million tons of cattle manure produced in feedlots annually in the United States. The objective of continuing research," Kreis added, "is to optimize the process to increase the yield of ethylene.

evidence to date indicates that the process appears to be economically feasible for large concentra-tions of feedlots, and the commendation would be to place the ethylene production plants at the feedlot because it is easier to slip the gas by pipeline rather than transport the

for the operator to feed the gas directly into a pipeline already in exis-tence for ethylene transport. He would not estimate the economic value of such a plant to a feedlot operation because, he said, the value depends upon the market price of ethylene.

There are the extra values of disposing of manure and getting some return on the process, Halligan explained. With an estimated two to four million tons of manure produced annually by the cattle industry in West Texas along, he said, it is evident that this new process is a constructive solution to the problem. Dr. Huffman explained

that the production of ethylene depends upon the time-temperature factor in the reactor. 'In the reactor we have

achieved a different timetemperature history of both solids and gas -- different from that of others who have experimented with similar processes, he said. "This allows us to generate significant quan-tities of useful petrochemical intermediates.

The manure in the pilot plant process yields several products -- ethylene and other sages, tars and a wastewater which must go through a purifying system, and an inert resident containing a large proportion of ash.
"The tars," Huffman

said, "can be put through the process a second time. We would like, however," he said, "to do further study on the tars before we make a recommendation as to their disposals. The dry residue may be

made into charcoal briquets to fuel the process, with the ash being used for playa lake fills in areas where there are playas, like the Texas high plains. The ash also could be used for a variety of other purposes such as road fills or in construction. Specific recommenda-

tions for cleansing the water product have not been made yet.

'There is no effort to at the manure before it is put into the reactor," Huffman said. "We don't dry it, but we do grind it. That's all we do.

Huffman said that in wetter climates it would be necessary to add a drying process, and this would reduce the income from the total procedure.

He said the economics of the process favored the drier areas of the country from the plains states westward because the wastes could be put into the process directly from the feedlot without any processing except natural sun drying. The research plant con-

structed at Texas Tech has 1,600 tons per day, depending upon the type of venture.
