Many Fine Animals Seen at the Kent County Stock Show

A successful stock show and sale was conducted at the Kent County 4-H Club barn in Clairemont on Friday and Saturday, February 27-28. A total of 124 animals were exhibited in the competition. Show judge Freddie Stuart of Roby was very complimentary in his praise of the quality of the animals and in his remarks about the cooperative spirit of the 4-H Club members, adult leaders, and parents.

Anya Hilton exhibited the champion lamb in the opening day of the two-day event. Her heavy weight Hampshire wether was judged the best in the barn over 80 other lamb entries. The lamb was bred by Clay Edwards of Dickens County. Reserve honors went to Chris Williams with a Suffolk ewe lamb bred by R.L. Williams of Jayton. Other blue-ribbon lambs that won their class included a finewool shown by Lex Dunham, a light crossbred shown by

Wes Fincher, a heavy crossbred exhibited by Rena Bural, and a light medium wool shown by Wes Fincher. All of these animals were considered for the championship and reserve champion honors. The lamb showmanship awards were won by Lex Dunham and Sally Sumner. Bill Sartain and Jim Bural are adult leaders who worked with the lamb exhibitors as superintendents.

In a competitive hog judging, Craig Hagar's blue ribbon medium-weight gilt was named the champion market hog. George Goodall won the reserve honors with his first place heavy weight entry. Todd Dunham showed the first place light weight. Showmanship winners were Craig Hagar and Todd Dunham. Adult leaders Herman Dunham and C.V. Hagar served as superintendents of the swine division. Swine judging was on Saturday morning.

Hank Cravey exhibited the grand champion steer with a heavy weight Hereford from his mother's herd, Mrs. Bettye Cravey. Scott Metcalf showed the reserve with a Hereford-Angus crossbred, bred by Ralph Riddel of Aspermont. Medium and light weight classes were won by Hank Cravey with Herefords. Showmanship winners were LaRhonda Carriker and Hank Cravey. Lanny Hall exhibited the rate of gain winner. Adult leaders Donnie Carriker and William Reeder assisted the 4-H Club members as beef superintendents.

A barbeque lunch was served at noon to approximately 400 people. Barbeque cooks were Leck Wall, Chuck McCurry, Ollie Bural and Hugh Turner. The Home Demonstration Clubs prepared cobblers for the lunch. William D. Hall and Gordon Cheyne served as chairmen to plan and serve the

barbeque, buy the meat, and make other arrangements.

A premium auction sale of the top 50 percent of each class was sold on Saturday afternoon.

Awards presented on Saturday afternoon included the championship and showmanship trophies. William D. Hall was presented an appreciation plaque for his service as barbeque chairman, former beef superintendent, and 4-H Leader for many years. County Agent M.A. Geeslin was presented a plaque and an engraved watch for his 25th year as a worker with the annual stock shows.

The show honored the memory of L.W. Bailey and R.D. Hooper in the award presentation. Memorial plaques were presented in memory of their services to the people of Kent County.

County Agent Mark Geeslin Honored

County Agent Mark A. Geeslin was presented an engraved watch and a plaque for his work with the Kent County 4-H youth and the Stock Show for twenty-five years. The Kent County 4-H parents, livestock committee members, and interested adult leaders sponsored the recognition for the county agent.

Recognition and presentation was made during the annual stock show at Clairemont on Saturday, February 28. Beryl Murdoch represented the 4-H Club supporters in presenting the awards to the county agent.

Geeslin has been Kent County Agent since January 1952 and has completed his twenty-fifth Kent County Stock Show. A number of Kent County 4-H Club members have been recognized for their accomplishments during these years. There have been eight state winners and one national winner in 4-H Club events during the county agent's tenure.

Geeslin had this to say about the honor:

My sincere thanks and appreciation to each of you for your thoughtfulness and generosity in presenting me with an engraved watch and plaque during my twenty-fifth County Stock Show last Saturday.

The experiences during these twenty five years have been very rewarding. I have seen young men and women use their 4-H Club training to become successful citizens, leaders in their communities, professionals and technical leaders in business, industry and the professional fields.

Certainly the success of the 4-H Club program depends upon cooperative parents, willing adult leaders, and supporters in the community.

On this 22 day of February, 1976, the Board of Trustees of Jayton-Girard Independent School District convened in regular session, open to the public...

WHEREAS, the term of office of Harold Parker, Jon A. Kelley, and Billy J. Harrison members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1976...

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF JAYTON-GIRARD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 3, 1976, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District 3 Trustees.

2. That all requests for candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered at Community Building in Girard, Texas, in said School District, with Nancy Sager as Presiding Judge and Clerk.

(b) In election precincts numbered at Community Building in Clairmont, Texas, in said School District, with Bill Wilkinson as Presiding Judge and Clerk.

NOTE: If additional polling places are necessary, follow the above form for each additional polling place and insert here:

At High School Building in Jayton, Texas in said School District with Minnie Lee Walker as presiding judge.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m.

4. SARA SHERRER is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and CORNELIA CHAGNE is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting.

5. By resolution heretofore adopted, this Board of Trustees determined that the electronic voting system shall be used in the above mentioned election for absentee voting by personal appearance; and in accordance with said resolution said the Election Code.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies required to hold said election.

7. Immediately after the polls have been counted, the officers holding said election shall close and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where voters are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 30 days before the date of said election.

9. The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall not occur more than 30 days nor less than 15 days before the date of said election.

10. It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted notices of the date, place and nature of this meeting in the public hearing held in the general administrative office of this school district, a plain newspaper and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

11. It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Bent County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of the school district's pupils reside.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Ruddy Gallagher, Jon Allen Kelley, Billy John Harrison, Russell Wright, Johnny Fowler, Harold Parker, Sarah Gregory.

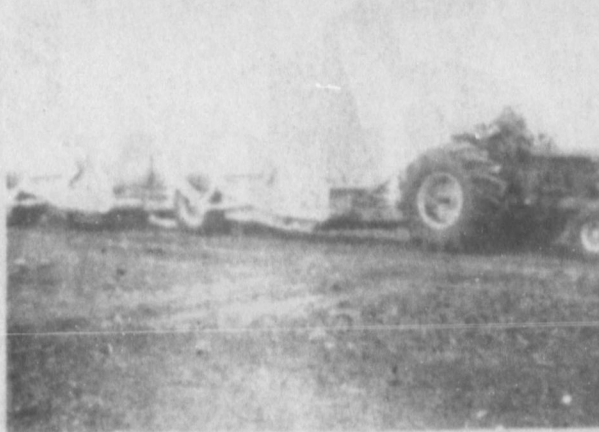

Prisons, Rain and Jaworski



We've had some comment since last week when we suggested local Chamber officials contact the Texas Department of Corrections about the location of a proposed prison farm in Hale County.

We've watched some other West Texas cities begin studying the idea of a prison farm near their cities and several have made contact with state officials. We read recently an interview with the publisher of a newspaper in a town where a prison farm is located, and he said there had been nothing negative about having the prison farm nearby. He said the prison farm was a real asset to the community and had provided another industry to the area.

Of course, the idea of a new prison farm in West Texas has only recently been proposed, and is still in the planning stages. However, we feel it deserved looking into as it could provide 200-300 jobs to the nearest town to which it locates.

About the closest thing West Texas has ever had in the way of a prison farm was back during WWII when Hereford was the site of an Italian Prisoner of War camp. The prisoners had been captured in action in Europe and were placed in the camp until they were shipped back after the war. They worked on farms in the Panhandle and several of the POW artists still have several murals on exhibit in Hereford and Umbarger where they were asked to leave a contribution.

We can all quit worrying about whether we will receive a rain the near future. Or, at least that's what Marshall Formby tells me.

Marshall tells me it will rain come April—and probably not before then. The Hopkins County Stew specialist has records to back up his claim.

He says the average rainfall for this area is less than five inches for the six months period from October 1 to April 1. He says we never have received much moisture during this six-months period and we shouldn't really expect it to be any different this year.

The rainfall for the area since 1880 shows that we receive an average of 1.76 inches in October; .66 in November; .77 in December; .65 in January; .62 in February; and .32 in March.

"So when the wind blows and the dust blows and no rain is in sight, cheer up...it will rain come April—and probably not before...We'll make it," says

We had the pleasure of sitting across from Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass last weekend during a banquet honoring former Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski. Bass is a very interesting man and had some interesting views concerning upcoming politics in local and state-wide races.

We were most impressed by the speech and answers of Mr. Jaworski as he received the Thomas Jefferson award. The award is presented by the Mass Communications department at Texas Tech and goes each year to a public official who has done most for the protection of the First Amendment right of freedom of the press.

Jaworski held a news conference immediately before the banquet and answered many questions about the Nixon-Watergate affair which he became the main authority on as he investigated the case. He gave main credit for exposing Watergate to the "free press" which refused to be intimidated. He agreed that there have been some illegal activities carried on by former Presidents (especially in the areas of political contributions), but said the attempts to obstruct justice and cover up criminal activities had been carried on in the Nixon Administration to a far greater degree than any attempt he had ever seen. He said there was no question in his mind that the Watergate affair was the worst scandal of any Administration in the history of the United States.

The Houston lawyer pointed out other countries which have become dictatorships and noted that in each case, freedom of the press was the first right that was taken away by the countries leaders. After that,

he said all other individual rights fell in line.

"Even though I have felt the sting of what I considered to be unfair comment by the news media," Jaworski said. "There is no question that we must retain the right of freedom of the press in order to preserve all our other rights. I have at times felt I was unjustly criticized. But once I removed myself from the situation and reflected back up on, I can see that I was probably wrong."

Jaworski said he felt public officials, on national, state and local levels, need "searching and probing" reporters looking over their shoulders all the time.

"Officials will be more fair, more conscious of the taxpayer and the public, and more cautious when making the important decision if they know that the news media is closely watching their every step."

We've had some questions about when Daylight Savings Time goes into effect.

Normally we move our clocks up one hour the last Sunday in April. However, this year it is being proposed for earlier on March 7. However, Congress must approve the early date and as of early this week it was still in limbo.

We suggest you watch for the change in case it comes at the last minute. However, we expect Congress will give about one week's notice before they put the change into effect.

Another grey area concerns the voter registration issue. Voter registration cards were mailed out to voters who live at the same addresses they did last time they registered.

You should have received a new voter registration card in the mail. If you did not, we suggest the simplest thing to do to be sure you will be able to vote is to call the Hale County Tax Office and clarify your situation. Next election will be April 3 and voters must be registered by March 3 in order to be eligible to vote.
