

This picture shows contour farming being carried out on a farm in Kent County last year. Farmers who plow and plant with their terraces lengthen the life of the terrace system while saving much costly maintenance.

Contour farming is one of the best practices a farmer can use to help protect his land from erosion and to provide water runoff control. All farming operations on sloping cultivated land should be done in such a way that plowing, land preparation, planting and cultivation are done on the contour, using terraces as guidelines. Lister furrows and crop rows help hold the water and help prevent silt damage and erosion.

It has been noted that there seems to be an increase in some farmers plowing over terraces either at an angle or straight up and down the slope. This practice tends to increase the chance for terrace damage and also causes more damage from erosion and silting.

If the use of larger multi-row equipment is causing the farmer a problem farming the older standard type terrace, he might do well to consider the installation of a system of parallel terraces that will better fit modern equipment.

# **Burleson Reports From Washington**

Omar Burleson, M.C. 17th District, Texas

WASHINGTON, D.C .-- A Hundred years ago this month, March, 1876, it was known that Alexander Graham Bell had invented the telephone. It was at that time he was granted a patent for this curious instrument which has had an effect on the lives and dispositions of untold millions.

An old doggerel of several years ago went like this, "Misery, misery, mumble, moan--someone invented the telephone." Our gratitude goes to Mr. Bell for the convenience and, at times, inconvenience of this great development in communication.

The telephone has both liberated and ensnared us. given us wings to our wildest wishes and shackled us in our own bad habits.

Of course, the same might be said of many other inventions and developments in comparatively recent years -- the automobile, radio, television and even the hairdryer. The telephone, however, possesses a difference in degree from these other marvels--it can be more demanding and intrusive but, again, our gratitude to Mr. Bell.

"Every Sweet Hath Its Sour," wrote Mr. Emerson. The problem it seems is that the sweet seems to diminish at times when the telephone rings at 2:00 in the morning and a voice on the other end says it is the wrong number. Sometimes, it's one of those inebriated voices and you have not the faintest idea to whom it belongs. Then again, there is the call you are anxiously awaiting --- like the news of a loved one who has had an accident or who is sick, and on answering, someone asks if you want to subscribe to some sort of a publication.

But then, harkening to the words of Mr. Emerson, we must think of the loneliness the telephone has relieved, the personal misadventures which have given comfort and even the lives it has saved.

The invention of the telephone clearly has served us well in our daily lives, even if at times it provides annoyance. Like the many, many technological advances made over the years, we would not even try to get along without a phone. So we might as well accept the sour and the sweet and leave this communicative device and its successors to get about the business of greater improvement. The successors in time will be a video arrangement already in use by some business executives. It can be assumed that not everyone would be required to have a picture telephone and if they did have one surely a switch would be provided to turn it off.

Otherwise there would be a rush to comb hair or maybe the lady to touch up the lip-stick before saying hello.

Mr. Bell would, of course, not recognize the advances made in his 1876 invention. Neither could he, at that time have envisioned the tremendous growth of the company bearing his name. He could hardly have imagined the attempts made to break up that company and other "big businesses" by the Federal Government simply because they are too big. He might however, have understood the need for anti-trust and anti-monoply provisions now in our laws.

One final note is a question: Why would you suppose that Alexander Graham Bell felt that the proper salutation in answering his instrument was, Hoy, Hoy''?

Dr. McCauley emphasized that the program is aimed primarily at assisting private laboratories in improving their performance of diagnostic tests. He said the tests normally contain specimens that individual labs can expect to see in their day-to-day operations.

Dr. Sweet says that if a laboratory director feels that personnel need further refresher training, they can attend one of the workshops given by the Department of Health Resources Laboratory each year. The Bureau provides about 12 workshops a year, most often in Austin, on a varies list of topics.

Dr. Sweet said there are no state laws governing licensing of laboratories or personnel qualifications, but there may be one in the future. Federal law now is very strict if laboratories accept specimens across a state line. And, a new federal law is under consideration which would impinge upon every laboratory in the country. All states would have to comply, or perhaps have statutes calling for equal requirements. Laboratory personnel



# **Only One Accident** In Kent County In February

The Texas Highway Patrol inve igated one accident on rural highways Kent County during the month February, 1976, according to Serna Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervi of this area.

These crashes resulted in no personal killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summ for this county during the first months of 1976 shows a total of accidents resulting in no persons kill and one persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summ for the 60 counties of the Lubh Department of Public Safety Region February, 1976, shows a total of accidents resulting in 17 persons ki and 243 persons injured, as compared February, 1975, with 435 accide resulting in 12 persons killed and persons injured. This was 19 accidents, five more killed, and 44 m injured in 1976 at the same period time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the mo of February, 1976, occurred in t following counties: Two each in Baile Castro, and Hutchinson; and one each Dickens, Knox, Lubbock, Parker, Ten Wichita, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Swish and Wheeler.


