Contour Totracing Helps Hold Moisture
a


This picture shows contour farming being carried out on a farm in Kent
County last year. Farmers who plow and plant with their terraces lengthen the life of the terrace system while saving much
costly maintenance. costly maintenance.

Contour farming is one of the best practices a farmer can use to help protect
his land from erosion and to provide water runoff control. All farming operations on sloping cultivated land
should be done in such a way that plowing, land preparation, planting and cultivation are done on the contour,
using terraces as guidelines. Lister furrows and crop rows help hold the water and help prevent silt damage and
erosion. erosion.

It has been noted that there seems to be an increase in some farmers
plowing over terraces either at an angle or straight up and down the slope. This practice tends to increase the chance for
terrace damage and also causes more damage from erosion and silting. If the use of larger multi-row
equipment is causing the farmer a problem farming the older standard type terrace, he might do well to consider the installation of a system of parallel
terraces that will better fit modern equipment.
