People Killing Concrete Medians Are Torn Out

If you don't get out and move around a bit sometimes--you never know what is going on.

This past Sunday afternoon, for the first time in several years, I drove on Texas Highway No. 70, from Rotan into Jayton. And how surprised I was, when I got to the triangle intersection of the road, about half way between Jayton and Clairemont.

The old people-killing concrete median down the road, in the Jayton-Clairemont part of the intersection has been torn out.

Back when this intersection was planned and built about ten years ago, this writer immediately recognized it for what it was-a people killing monstrosity.

I still well remember the first time I ran through this intersection. I went from Jayton to Clairemont, and I made the trip over alright, but on my way back I really panicked. Going east into the intersection toward Jayton, suddenly I was faced with this broad, high concrete median, with only a narrow lane for traffic to travel in. I panicked, and ended up over in the other lane. If there had been an oncoming car, We would have met head-on.

Also the complex of the three-way intersection was so confusing that all along, people missed the proper

As usual, we howled about this thing, in the paper, which the people at the Texas Highway department read,

but marked us off as just being crazy.

Not long after that two men coming north from the Rotan direction piled across this median, and both were killed in the vehicle, as it plunged through the barbed wire fence, and out into the cow pasture to the north.

From time to time after this, we checked this intersection, and we noted that every sign post in the intersection, at one time or another had been knocked down, and then reset into the concrete base.

We continued from time to time, in print, to fuss about the extreme safety hazard which this interesection presented. Finally, the Highway Department sent out an engineer from Abilene to visit with us. He didn't offer any suggestions. I guess they thought if he came out and let us blow off steam, we would quit riding them--and I guess it worked because we have had nothing to say about it. But this is in the main because we haven't travelled through this intersection lately.

This whole thing proves a point. While you are bouncing them, they will not budge. But when the noise settles down, they will finally correct their blatant errors.

In the early 1960's this editor raised a big fuss about the big trailer speed limit signs on the road, and their cost. There was one at the county line between Girard and Spur. But nothing happened--until about a year later, that is, when suddenly we noticed they had been moved--all over the State.

In the year 1960, there were stop signs at all three

lanes in the triangle just south of Jayton. In one year the Texas Highway Patrol issued tickets which prought in more than \$1500 for people rolling through these signs. We spearheaded a drive to get yield signs put up. Texas Highway Department officials were slow to move on this, but with aid from Dale Moore who was local maintenance foreman here then, the stop signs were taken down and the yield signs put up. Moore confided privately that if there happened to be a rash of accidents at these interesections, we would be in trouble. But in so far as I know there has been none in all of these years.

Recently, we understand there have been more serious accidents at this people-killer intersection between Jayton and Clairemont, so finally Highway Department people have seen the light, and torn out these monstrous concrete medians.

There will probably be no more accidents at this intersection, if so they will not be the serious kind that critically or fatally injure people.

The Texas Highway Department, or what ever the new name is, has some fine people working for them, and many smart engineers, but from the way they do some things, you would think they must havehad a nightmare the night before, and then went out and made their designs.

I am going to have to get out and ride around a bit

Easter Egg Candy

- 1 c. hot mashed potatoes
- 2 tbsp. butter 1 c. shredded coconut
- 1 tsp. vanilla

3 1 lb. boxes confectioners' sugar 1 8 oz. package dot chocolate

Combine potatoes and butter; stir in coconut and vanilla. Add sugar gradually, mixing well after each addition. Form into egg shapes, using 1 tablespoon mixture for each egg; place on waxed paper. Let harden for 1 to 3 days. Melt chocolate over hot water; dip eggs into chocolate, using 2 spoons. Place on waxed paper to harden. Unsweetened chocolate or chocolate bits with 1/8 cake paraffin may be melted over hot water if dot chocolate is unavailable. Chopped nuts, candied fruits or peanut butter may be used instead of coconut.

Peanut Butter Eggs

- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 to 2 c. peanut butter 4 to 5 c. powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 Hershey bar
- 1 6 oz. package semisweet chocolate morsels

Mix first 5 ingredients in order listed; form into egg shapes. Melt Hershey bar and chocolate morsels in double boiler. Dip eggs into chocolate; place on waxed paper until

Easter Carrot Bars

- 1 pkg. coconut macaroon mix
- 4 eggs
- 2 c. sugar 1 1/2 c. vegetable oil
- 3 jars carrot baby food
- 2 c. flour
- 1 tsp. vanilla Frosting
- Chopped nuts

Mix macaroon mix with 3/4 cup water; set aside. Beat eggs slightly. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Spread 1/2 of the carrot mixture in 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 inch jelly roll pan; spoon macaroon mixture over mixture in pan. Spread remaining carrot mixture over top. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 45 minutes; cool. Spread with Frosting; sprinkle with nuts.





New Banana Fudge

- 3 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup (8 oz. container light cream)
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 3 tbsp. light corn syrup cup mashed ripe bananas
- (3 medium bananas)
- Tbsp. vanilla 1/2 cup chopped (mediumfine walnuts)

Into a heavy 2 1/2 quart saucepan turn the sugar, salt, cream, butter, corn syrup and banana. Over moderate heat, stirring constantly, bring to a boil; over low heat continue boiling, still stirring constantly, until mixture reaches 238 degrees on a candy thermometer or a half-teaspoon of it, dropped into a cup of very cold water, forms a soft ball when it is removed to the palm of the hand.

Cool without stirring until the temperature on the candy thermometer drops to 110 degreees or the bottom of the pan feels warm to the touch. Add vanilla and nuts and beat until candy becomes thick and begins to lose its gloss. Turn into a buttered 8 by 8 by 2 inch cake pan. Let stand until firm; cut into 1 inch squares. Makes 64, about 3 pounds.






