 Several acces of Klein grass were planted in KentCounty last year and still more is Kleingrass is a native of South Africa. It comes from
an area of 15 to 18 inches of annual rainfall. It has slender stems and abundant leaves. It is a bunch type
grass and grows to a height of 3 to 4 feet. It is a warm season, perennial, drouth resistant grass and a warn high yields of good quality forage. The leaves green in the fall until the temperatures drop below 25 degrees. I also comes out earlier in the spring than most of our climate in this area.
The best planting dates for Kleingrass are March
through May 1. Seedbed preparation is important in obtaining a good stand of grass. Kleingrass should be planted on a clean firm seedbed when planted in old
fields, but good stands have been obtained when seeded ollowing brush management operations such as
ootplowing and roller choping. Kleingrass will also respond to fertilizer, which is very important when it is eded on an old field.
