Finances Are Good In County

Close readers of the Jayton Chronicle, will notice two important financial matters. First, the Kent County State Bank statement the bank had a total of \$4,138,000.00 assets in its statements as of March 31.

Also it listed deposits of \$3,921,000.00. Its loans amounted to \$1,218,000.00.

With basic capital structure of \$150,000.00 at the beginning of the bank, and with issuing dividends regularly, the bank now has a capital structure of \$213,000.00.

This is the best statement the bank has ever made in its 14 years history.

Also on the Kent County financial statement you will notice that the county has no bonded indebtedness as of March 31st.

SELECT RIGHT POULTRY BREED

Both the large poultry operator as well as the small flock owner should select the right breeds of chickens for the right job, contends a poultry specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The leghorn-type bird is best for producing high quality white shelled eggs while Cornish-cross birds with predominantly white feathers are best for high quality meat production. Hens should lay 240 eggs the first year of production while meat-type birds should weigh four pounds in eight weeks.

TOMATOES POPULAR BUT FICKLE

Most home gardens just wouldn't be the same without at least a few tomato plants. Growing tomatoes can be both rewarding as well as frustrating, notes a horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. For success, first of all select adapted varieties that are resistant to common diseases. Plant tomatoes where they will receive at least six hours of sunlight a day. Set them somewhat deeper than they were originally growing and apply a starter solution. Provide some protection from wind and heat while plants are young. Use stakes, trellises or wire cages to support plants as they begin to grow. Fertilize plants weekly once they begin to set fruit.

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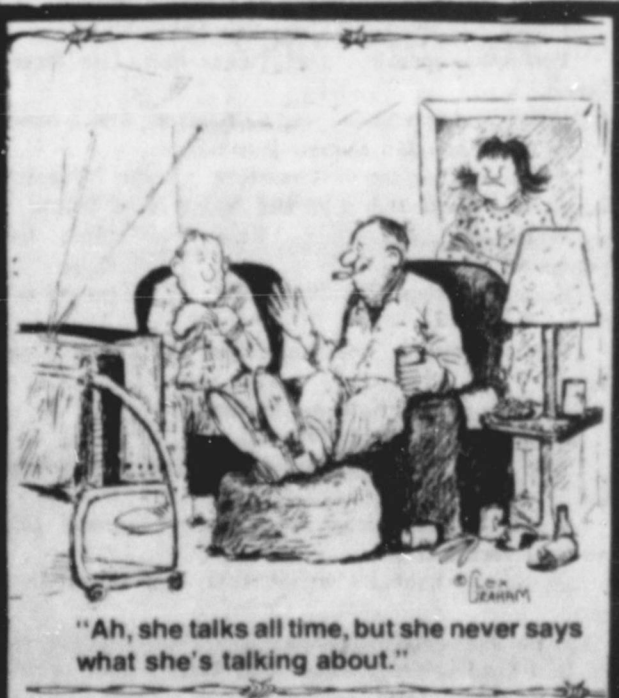

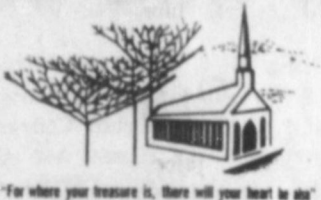

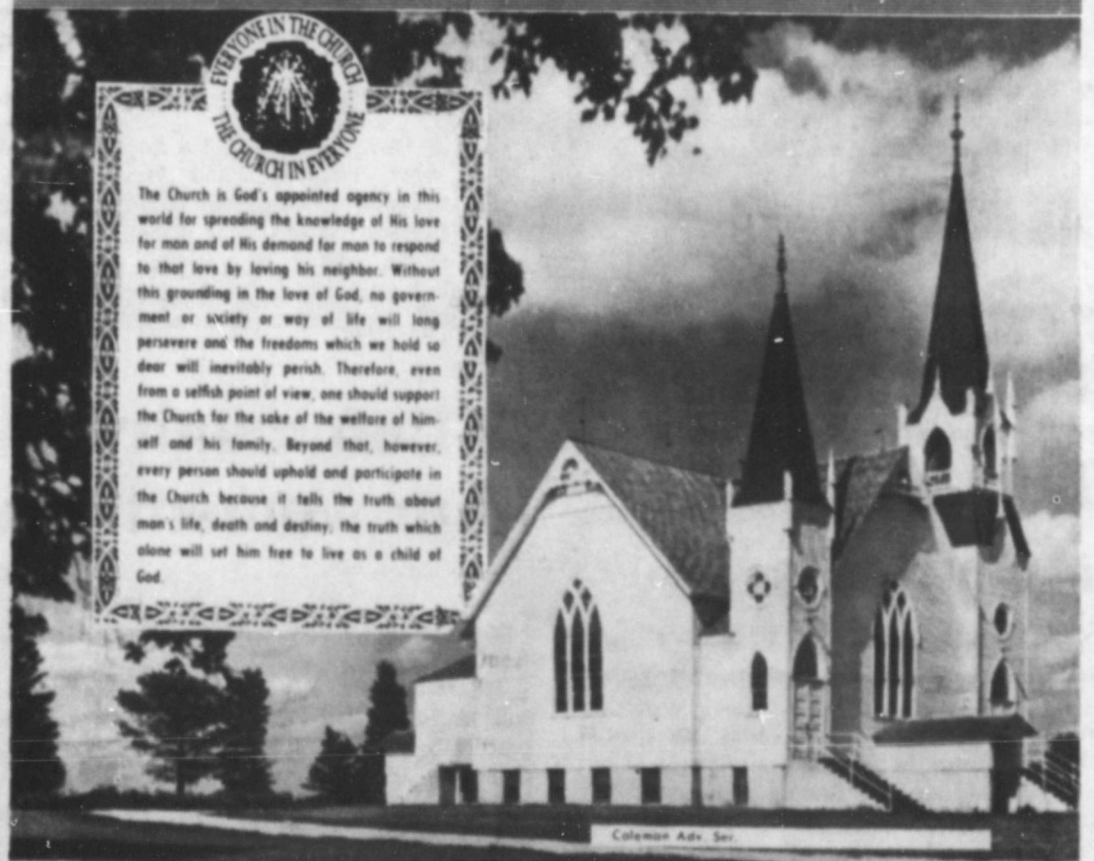

Grass Planting



The picture above shows a stand of Kleingrass planted by a local rancher.

Several acres of Klein grass were planted in Kent County last year and still more is being planted this year.

Kleingrass is a native of South Africa. It comes from an area of 15 to 18 inches of annual rainfall. It has slender stems and abundant leaves. It is a bunch type grass and grows to a height of 3 to 4 feet. It is a warm season, perennial, drought resistant grass and produces high yields of good quality forage. The leaves green in the fall until the temperatures drop below 25 degrees. It also comes out earlier in the spring than most of our local grasses. Kleingrass shows a good adaptation to the climate in this area.

The best planting dates for Kleingrass are March 1 through May 1. Seedbed preparation is important in obtaining a good stand of grass. Kleingrass should be planted on a clean firm seedbed when planted in old fields, but good stands have been obtained when seeded following brush management operations such as rootplowing and roller chopping. Kleingrass will also respond to fertilizer, which is very important when it is seeded on an old field.

If you are considering Kleingrass in your forage program contact the Soil Conservation Service working through the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District.

It Is Time For Cost Sharing

It is time to apply for cost-shares for practices to be started in May through August. The sign-up period has been set as April 19 through April 27.

Practices available include mesquite spraying as well as tree doing, root plowing, grass seeding, livestock water facilities, wells, and pipelines.

Also available is cost sharing on terrace systems. All cost-sharing are based on 50 percent of the actual cost.

If you need cost-share assistance to help you in applying any of these practices on your land then come in and make your application.

It is pointed out that May 3 is the first day mesquite will be eligible to be sprayed. Extreme care must be used in applying the spray to see that damage is not done to susceptible crops.



We happened to be out at the new Lubbock airport Sunday afternoon for the first day of its operation.

Bentsen is what is called a favorite son candidate. Those delegates pledged to him, he will use them to what he considers to be the best advantage. Persons favoring someone other than Carter and Wallace, would probably want to vote for the Bentsen delegates, or the uncommitted delegates.

Both Ford and Reagan have already brought their candidates to Texas, and there will be a lot of politicking in Texas during the month of April by candidates for both parties.

During the month of April, Kent County will be planning aerial spray of mesquite and this be carried out in May and June. Technicians of Soil Conservation Service encourage farmers and to also plan at least a three month rest during growing season following chemical aerial spray. This period will allow the native grasses to reestablish their root systems without grazing pressure.
