The Jayton swimming pool is now open and operating for the summer. Here are the hours of operation

Sunday 2 to 6 p.m. Monday closed. Tuesday and Wednesday, 3 to 7 p.m. Thursday 6 to 10 p.m. Friday and Saturday 3 to 7 p.m.

Admission prices, all school children up through grade 12, 35c. Adults and college students 60c.

1. All persons must take a soap shower before entering the pool.

2. No pre-school age children will be allowed in the pool unless accompanied by a parent in the pool.

3. The life guards will be in complete charge of behavior of swimmers. Their word is law.

4. Only one person will be allowed on the diving board at a time. 5. There will be absolutely no scuffling in or out of

the pool Only one bounce off diving board.

No diving backwards, backward flips, or gainers.

8. Only one person on the slide at a time.

9. Slide users are to be Seated and go Forward Down the Slide.

10. No non-swimmers allowed on the slide. 11. No pushing, horseplay or profanity allowed.

12. No tobacco or tobacco products allowed inside swimming pool.

13. No glass bottles of any kind will be allowed inside (This is the area enclosed by fence).

14. Personnel will not be responsible for loss of 15. Absolutely no swimming when there is no life

Jayton 4H Youths Attend The State Roundup At A&M.

Texas 4-H Roundup brings together the top youth talents in the state in judging confests and various demonstrations and skill events. Their goal is to be the

Some 2300 4-H boys and girls and adult leaders will be converging on the Texas A&M University campus June 1 and 2 for the annual event which has become a highlight of the 4-H year. Competition is keen in the more than 30 events which range from public speaking and livestock judging to demonstrations on safety and use of electricity.

A major event of 4-H Roundup is the State 4-H Food Show on June 1, with judging of entries beginning at 9 a.m. All other competition will be on June 2, with some events beginning as early as 6:30 a.m.

Roundup headquarters will be the Rudder Center, and Activities will officially get under way with an opening assembly at 5:30 p.m. on June 1 in the Center auditorium, points out George McArthur, 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Roundup coordinator.

Featured at the assembly will be special salutes to the American Bicentennial and the Texas A&M Centennial along with an awards program recognizing 10 individuals, businesses and organizations that have made outstanding contributions to 4-H Winners of numerous scholarship awards will also be announced.

Extending a welcome to the visiting 4-H ers will be newly elected Texas A&M student body president Fred McClure.

In addition to the various contests and demonstrations on June 2, a special luncheon will be held in honor of 28 outstanding 4-H adult leaders in Texas. These leaders are selected on the basis of two from each of the 14 Extension Service districts, notes

Wrapping up Roundup activities will be a special recognition program at 8 o'clock that evening at which winners in the day's competitive events will be

State 4-H Roundup not only attracts a host of youth but also brings together some 600 adults, including county Extension agents, 4-H leaders, friends of 4-H, mass medial representatives, contest donors and members of the board of directors of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, the service organization of 4-H in the state.

Many in 4-H consider Roundup the top event of the year. It provides an opportunity for youth to grow and develop and to share learning experiences across a broad spectrum of activities. And really, that's what 4-H is all about.

Sponge Cake

(Has Early American Flavor)

Submitted by Val Matthews Sonoma, California

- 2/3 cup sifted flour
- 1/3 cup corn starch 6 eggs, separated
- 11/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp. grated lemon rind
- 2 Tbsp. water
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar

Sift together flour and corn starch 3 times. Beat egg yolks with mixer until very thick and light colored. Add vanilla, lemon rind, water. Continue beating, gradually add 1/2 cup of the sugar. Gradually fold in flour mixture. Beat egg whites until foamy. Add cream of tartar, salt, and beat until stiff but not dry peaks form. Pour yolk mixture over egg whites, fold together lightly. Pour into ungreased 10-inch tube pan, bake in 325 degree oven 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Invert on cake rack until cool. Remove from pan.

Mud Pie

2/3 (8 1/2-ounce) package dark chocolate wafers

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 gallon coffee ice cream
- 3/4 cup fudge sauce
- Whipped cream

Toasted sliced almonds

Crush wafers and mix with so ? and butter. Press into a 9 inch pie plate. Chill thorough, or bake at 350 degrees 7 minutes, then chill. Pack ice cream into chilled crust, smoothing surface. Freeze until firm. (Freezing before adding the fudge sauce is essential to keep fudge from slipping off). Pour fudge sauce evenly over pie and freeze until ready to serve. To serve, dollop with whipped cream and sprinkle with almond slices.

Note: Commercial fudge sauce is used by restaurants, but you may use your own recipe or the one

CHOCOLATE FUDGE SAUCE

- 5 squares unsweetened Swiss chocolate
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine i small can evaporated milk
- 3 cups unsifted confectioners' sugar
- 1 1/4 tsp. vanilla

Melt the chocolate and butter. Remove from heat mix in milk alternately with sugar. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring-constantly. Cook and stir 8 minutes or until thickened and creamy. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Store in refrigerator and use as needed. Makes 3 cups.

SELECT CATTLE ON

GROWTH PATTERNS An animal scientist for he Texas Agricultural Experiment Station says to consider lifetime growth patterns for weight and other factors in beef cattle selection programs. Such measures as weight at weaning post-weaning average daily gain and yearling weight are commonly used. Since selection br weight at one age will afect weights at other ages, cattlemen should onsider the lifetime gowth pattern in deciding upon a specific selection program. Once the best growth patterns are identfied, breeds should be chosen and combined. breeding stock selected, and the cattle managed to errespond to the optimal growth patterns.



We would like to be able to go a complete year without finding something wrong with the government about which to complain.

But trying to believe that would be like thinking that Kojak could go a whole television show without a tootsie

It seems that almost every day we find out about something new. Lately we've heard a lot about Rep. Hayes of Ohio who is reputed to have been paying his mistress \$14,000 of public money to keep her on his payroll.

This week we picked up a couple of other facts we thought might be interesting about how our government is saving us money. These seem almost too ridiculous to believe but we felt we needed to pass them along.

We can't remember the dollar figure which was quoted in describing the cost of this special government program, but the intent of the project was to discover the danger involved and the accidents which occur when people are taking a bath.

Hard to believe that thousands of your dollars went to fund such a project? We couldn't believe it either. But now let's take a look at the results found by this highly-paid team of government researchers working on this life-or-death matter

The government team's two main results found were (1) that most accidents connected with the bathtub happen when the person is either getting in or out of the tub; and (2) that second-most number of accidents occur when the person is changing from a sitting or standing position in the tub.

I've got a 10-year old nephew who lives in Arkansas who could come up with a better answer than that. After weeks of study and thousands of tax dollars spent (and we should not forget the importance of such a study in the first place) their answer is like saying that the main cause of injury in most airplane crashes is a result of the plane hitting the ground.

Now we have another one for you; And alas, also true.

The National Observer this past week gave a "Faint Fanfare" to the Commission on Federal Paperwork. The commission was created in an effort to reduce the amount of paperwork needed to run the government.

Recently the Commission sent each member of Congress a letter asking help in reducing paperwork. That's fine we praise them for seeking new ideas.

However, the letter sent out had a misprint in that two lines of printing instructions had been inadvertently

left on the letter. So what was their solution? Simple. Just send out a second letter deleting the

two extra lines However, it looks pretty stupid for an efficient arm

of Congress to make such a mistake. So what do they do Again, the answer is simple. The Commission to

reduce federal paperwork sends out a third letter to all members of Congress apologizng for the first letter.

So in order to convey the one message asking for help in reducing paperwork the agency sent out 1,605 sheets of paper.

About Vacations

Millions of Americans face summer with the unshaken conviction the entire family must be carted off, somewhere, on a twoweek summer vacation at the beach, in the mountains and or with Aunt

Burleson Reports From Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Remember Mehitabel, the fun-loving cat who claimed to be cleopatra in an earlier

It seems Mehitable was perpetually producing kittens which were promptly forgotton about. An inquiry made as to the well-being of her offspring was met by blank stares of innocence, "what kittens?"

Like Mehitabel, the Congress has for years been happily producing programs--health programs, education programs, energy, environmental, transportation, welfare of one kind or another--all sizes, shapes and prices.

These trends came out of a time when the horn of plenty seemed inexhaustible. Like Mehitabel, the Congress never checked very far into the success or well-being of its progeny. Each new program is sent into the world to fend for itself and grow willy-nilly. During the last dozen years the number of Federal domestic programs multiplied from 50 to nearly 1,000. The Federal budget climbed from \$158.2 billion in 1967 to an estimated \$413 billion for the coming fiscal year of 1977.

It is being recognized that the good old days are over. Vietnam, inflation and recession and all these programs have gotten the Federal budget all out of shape. There is no longer money in the Treasury to feed all the ambitions of a Congress bent on taking care of everybody and everything.

Now there are moves to look into every program to see what they are accomplishing, rather than to continue to pour money on failures to try to make them work. Proposals are in motion to look into this vast bureaucracy; to look at performances and to try to evaluate what is being accomplished under them. All programs would be reviewed every three years and automatically abolished unless specifically re-authorized by the Congress. All expenditures would be brought under budgetary controls with a limit on how much could be spent. This would force the Executive Branch and the Congress to examine the total Federal effort and when an evaluation is made, the Government would apply what is called "zero-based budgeting" which is a fancy way of saying the program managers would be required to explain what would happen if no funds were provided for its continuation.

This legislation has been dubbed "sunset" meaning at end unless found justified for continuance--a concept which has the prospect of catching on across the

Some states are already in the process of looking at their regulatory boards and commissions for the same purpose. If they make it work it should be a pretty good signal to Washington that it better work here before this Country goes totally broke. By this it is means, before the Nation's credit runs out.

Federal Agencies have never been required to justify their existence and they never will unless forced to do so. When this effort is seriously underway, special interest groups with a stake in their existence will descend upon Congress to plead their cause. One needs only to look at the protest presently under way in opposition to efforts to cut down on the food stamp program. Suits have been filed in the Courts to prohibit reforms and we will see whether the Courts will run the Country or if needed changes can be effected in this particular area.
