idential race, voters tend to be skeptical and stay away from the polls.
After a four-year term which seems successful, voters turn out in greater percentages. Likewise, records indicate an incumbent chief executive enjoys a decid
ed advantage in election years. If the nation is pros od advantage in electioh years. If the nation is pros-
perous and at peace voters tend to retum the President in office.
These statistical facts are accepted by Democrats and Republicans; they are more disturbing to Democrats, who have a new candidate and are likely to be

bureaucrat who is elected by no one and is only esponsible to the unelected head of a certain agency.

bills. For instance, last week a bill was overwhelmingly approved by the House of Representatives known as the "Government in the Sunshine Act." The Senate has already passed such legisiation unanimously.
The purpose of the legislation is to open the
agencies to the public whan rules and regulations are being drawn. As a matter of fact, when rules are proposed by the agencies, they are printed in the
Federal Register which gives notice to the public before being finally adooted. Technically, under this legisiation, two officials who may be in a policy-making cup of coftee or at lunch without a full transcript being made of their conversation. The si. nated cost is $\$ 45,000$ for each agency.
The proposed legissation would require rules and
regulations be submitted to the Congress for a period of so days before they are adopted, reserving to the Congress the right of approval or veto.
There is already provision for "oversight" in every Committee which supposedly performs this function. As a matter of fact, it is so time-consuming and complicated Government Operations has the function of overseeing executive administration of the Government but, here again, it is so overpowering that, although they do the best they can, it h

If politicians continue spending more money than the nation has in the treasury, promising more govem-
ment aid, jobs, benefits and care than the country can afford, our grandchildren will see the nation forced into bankruptcy. It can't go on forever. New York City found out. Great Britain is leaming the lesson now. In addition to the eight states on record in favor of

currently considering the question.)
