A federal judge recently ruled-as requested by those who brought suit-that commercial television's family hour policy was unconstitutional because it limited
crime, violence and sex before nine p.m. Those bringing suit bed vested interest many of these producers and others found their shows many of these producers and others found their shows
and films barred until nine p.m. They want the "freedom", to invade every American home with sex, violence and sadism in the hours when children are likely to be
watching television. Thy hailed the decision as a watching television. Thy hyalled
great victory for individual freedom!
The judge based his ruling partly on the claim that the Federal Communications Commission had put undue pressure on the networks to clean up its shows
during the early hours. But the networks are not comduring the early hours. But the networks are not com-
plaining; in fact, they say they will continue to observe the famiiy hour.
It seems likely the ruling will be overturned by a
higher court, since the public welfare is involved. higher court, since the public wel fare is involved.
Also, the FOC's authority over the powerful networks is more of a joke than anything else. The networks
adopted the family hour policy because the public was becoming increasingly outraged at the crime, violence, sex and sadism shown in early evening hours. The FCC acted only after public reaction became
strong, and, if the action was typical of strong, and, if the action was typical of FCC policy
in the past, probably inconvenienced the networks as in the past, probably inconvenienced the networks as
little as possible with the weakest of reforms possible, so as to appear as if it were guarding the public insterest. That realization alone makes the recent decision in California more idealistic than practical.

Blacks Decisive For Carter
sought to encourage blacks to register and vote in the recent presidential election, reports that 2.4 million Of that number, 92 per cent voted for Jimmy Carter Thus Carter received more that 2.2 million black votes in winning the White House. Those 2.2 million votes were decisive, for Carter's final victory margin was less than 2 million.
In the South, where Carter's percentage victory was tically every state) the black vote margin was even tically every state) the black vote margin was even
higher. VEP estimates it at more than 95 per cent! These figures reflect an historical and even ironic change in the political complexion of Dixie, once the conservative stroting black voting power and also a bloc-voting patterm.
Most Americans would agree greater voter participation is desirable but many would view the one-sided pattem of voting as indicative of less than the desired

This is the dream--and goal-of all married coupies. But it doesn't happen automatically. Good
marriages require work on both partner's parts to achieve happiness, Dorthy Taylor, a family life education specialist, says.
"It is true that in the past, and even today in many parts of the world, not much notice had been taken of the
private dreams of the bride and bridegroom. Often the family has arranged the marriage for its own onvenience.
'But even when young people were used as pawns in a game, or when marriage was judged only by the number dreams about happiness in marriage. These dreams have been handed down from generation to generation in love songs and love stories," she said.
Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension "People wonder whether dreaming. leads to a happy marriage on the whole-or even to a great increase in happy marriages.
"Nobody knows, or will ever know. The fact that there are more broken marriages today does not means that some of the unhappiness comes to the surface. We have no way of judging how many couples
would have separated in tormer times if it had been would have separated in
possible for them to do so.
"We do know that, whatever may nave been true in the past, many men and women are failing to reach the goal they have set for themselves--the goal of a happy
marriage. Add this up and you get a disturbing picture of frustration, disappointment and misery. This has led many cynics to suggest that marriage has been
