Since Christmas plants usually come from a greenhouse where they get plenty of water, frequent
watering is necessary in the home, usually every other watering is necessary in the home, usuaily every other

"All new plants nesul a good light source," says

 might be a little insight as to where some of our early soldiers got their courage for many of those heroic battles: "A reminder on our Coast Guard vessel's bulletin board that fresh water is at a premium aboard ships on The USS Constitution ("Old Ironsides") as acombat vessel carried 48,600 gallons of fresh water for combat vessel carried 48,600 gallons of fresh water for
her crew of 475 officers and men. This was sufficient to her crew of 475 officers and men. This was sufficient to
last six months of sustained operations; she carried no evaporators.
However (Historical Note): from Boston. Sheleft with 475 officers and men, 48,600 gallons of fresh water, 7,400 cannon shot, 11,600 pounds of black powder, and 79,400 gallons of rum
Her mission--to destroy and harass English Making Mamaica on October 6 , she took on 826
pounds of flour and 68,300 gallons pounds of flour and 68,300 gallons of rum. Then she
headed for the Azores, arriving on November headed for the Azores, arriving on November 12. She
provisioned with 550 pounds of beef and 64,300 gallons provisioned with 550 pounds of beef and 64,300 gallons
of Portuguese wine. On November 18 she set sail for of Portugu
England. In the ensuing days she defeated five British
men-of-war, and captured and scuttled 12 English merchantmen, salvaging only the rum. By January 27, Unarmed, she made a night raid up the Firth of Clyde. Her landing party captured a whisky distillery
and transferred 40,000 gallons aboard by dawn. Then she headed home. The USS Constitution arrived in Booton on
February 201799 with no cannon shot, no food powder, no rum, no wine, no whisky, and 48,600

Research Committee of the Association of Texas Soil Research Committee of the Assoc
and Water Conservation Districts.
The report titled, "Conservation Problems in
Texas," lists 29 conservation problem areas. Information within the report is based upon appraisals of current or potential conservation related problems made by 980 farmers or ranchers who serve as district
directors on local soil and water conservation districts. directors on local soil and water conservation
Texas has 196 SWCD's.
The Taxation was cited as the number one pro
and the economics of conservation listed as third. "By combining the two and adding in normal agricultural production costs, many conservation
practices' initial cost is so great that landowners cannot practices initial cost is so great that landowners cannot
afford the investment even though it would be sound afford the investment even though it would be sound
on a long term basis. We are sellinf: cattle for less than what they bought 30 years ago, but pickups, tractors, and other expenses cost 3-10 times more than what
they did in 1947," said Kenneth Kuykendall, president hey did in 1947," said Kenneth Kuykendall, president
of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

This situation makes it hard for landowners to apply conservation practices which would temporarily
reduce their income even though it would be best for reduce their income even though it would be best for the land in the long run. Today the taxation on farm and
ranch is out of balance with the land's productive ability which in many cases have forced agricultural lands out of production," he added.
Undesirable brush and weeds
Undesirable brush and weeds were ranked as the
econd major problem because of their suppressing the econd major problem because of their suppressing the
rowth of a productive grass cover which protects the growth of a productive grass cover which protects the
soil, efficiently used available water and stabilizes soivestock operation.
"Most Texans don't realize that scientists estimate
about one hundred thirty-eight million acre feet of about one hundred thirty-eight million acre feet of water--almost 38 percent of the state's average annual
rainfall--is used up by undesirable weeds and brush," said Kuykendall.
Examples of other identified conservation problems included in the report are difficulty of grass establishment, overgrazing, water erosion, loss of soil
moisture, and absentee ownership. moisture, and absentee ownership.
esearch, education and provisions for economic research, education and provisions for economic
incentives are necessary to correct soil and water conservation problems.
In gathering data for the survey, districts
responded to four major conservation problem areas responded to four major conservation problem areas.
These included water-related problems, soil These included water-related problems, soil
management problems, plant management problems and other problems, issues and policies.
"It is interesting to note that in "It is interesting to note that in the areas of
agricultural and silvicultural non-point source agricultural and silvicultural non-point source
pollution the soil and water conservation districts rated such a problem over the state as slight to none," "said Kuykendall identified non-point source pollution as pollutants conveyed by water and uncontrolled by
