

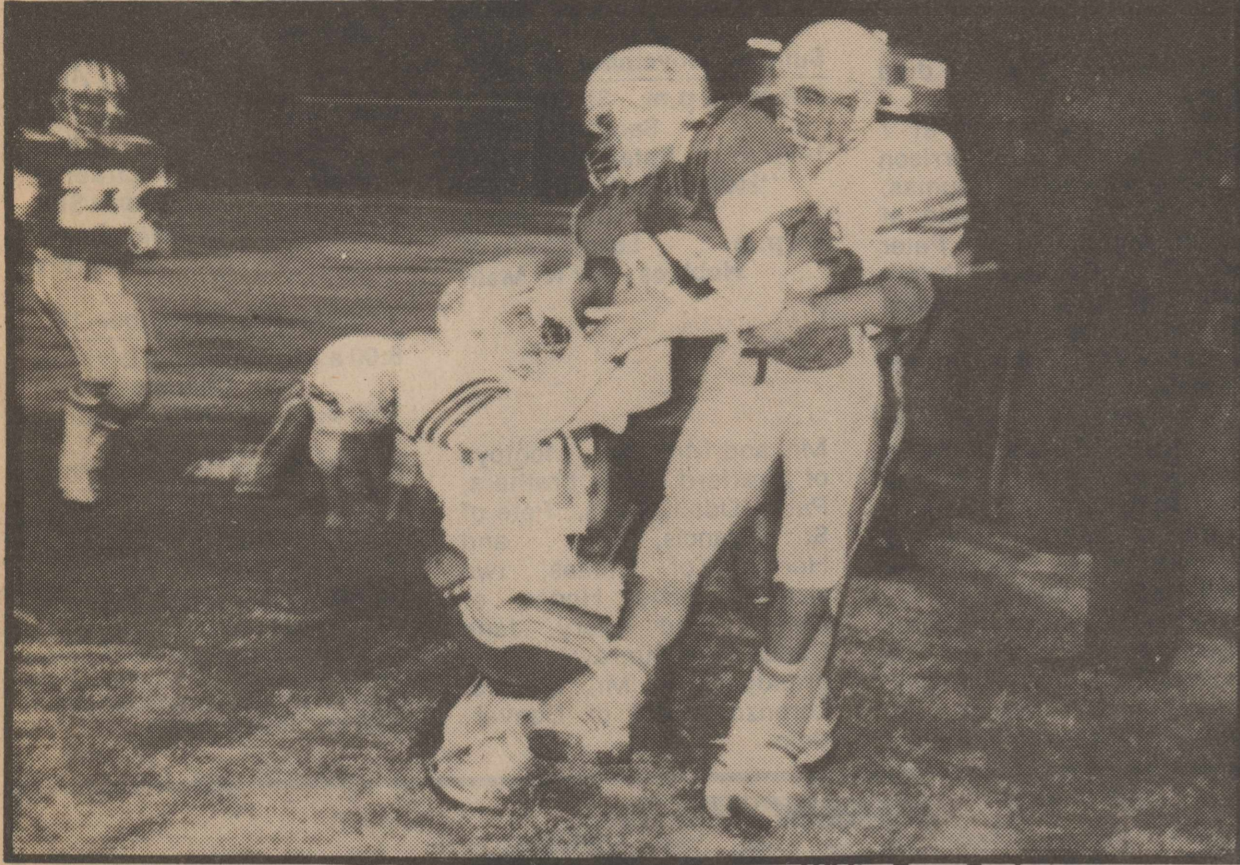

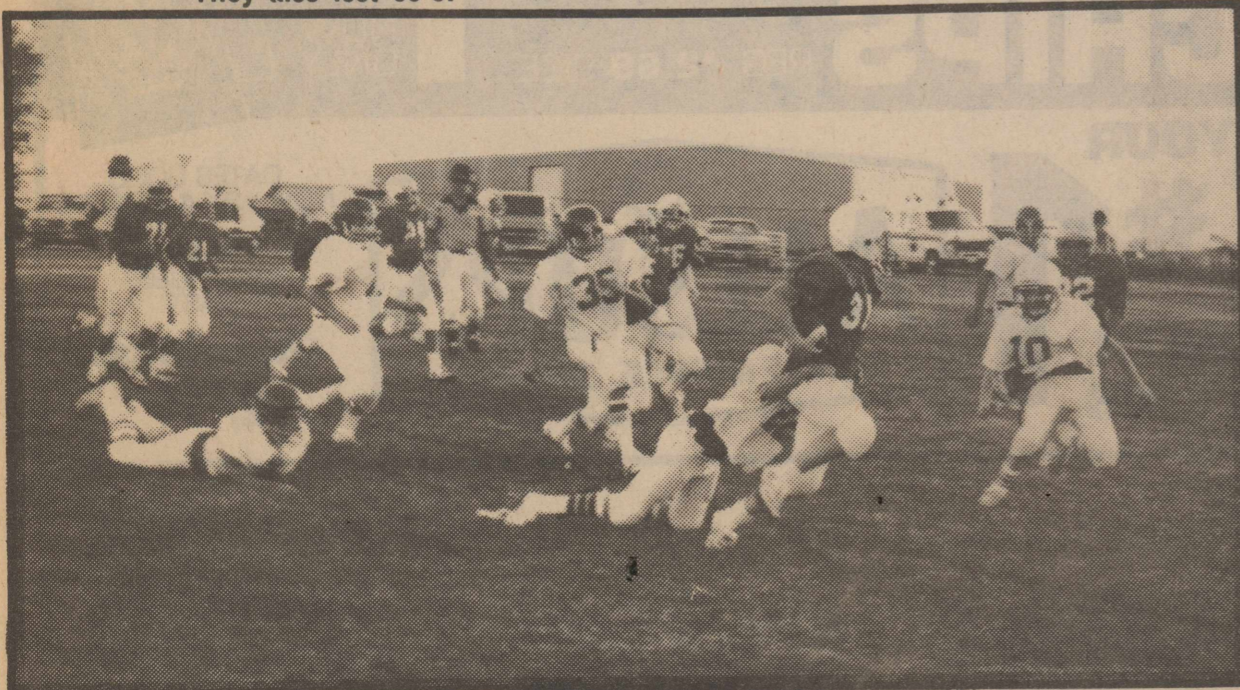
Dirk Davis being brought down by two White Deer Bucks but not before making a few yards. Also pictured #23 Lance Brooks. Stratford won 14-7.

Depot Museum Planning Brand Book

The Depot Museum is going to be printing a handbook of all the brands registered in Sherman County. Everyone needs to check and see if their brand has been recorded. If it is not recorded by January 1, 1987 it will appear in the Brand Book. The Museum will be doing this for a fund raiser.

The law for registering brands reads as follows: Not later than six months after August 30, 1981 and of every 10th year thereafter, each person who owns livestock shall have that person's marks and brands recorded with the County Clerk, regardless of whether or not the marks or brands have been previously recorded.

The person who, according to the records of the county, first recorded the mark or brand in the county is entitled to have the mark or brand in that person's name. If the records do not show who first recorded the mark or brand in the county, the person who has been using the mark or brand the longest is entitled to have it recorded in that person's name.

This was published in the newspaper August 30, 1981 when the new law was in effect. The 10 year period for rerecording of all brands will be August 30, 1991.

Federal Land Bank of Texas Reduces Interest Rates

Austin--Farmers and ranchers who finance with the Federal Land Bank of Texas will pay lower interest rates beginning December 1.

Variable interest rates on long-term farm & ranch land loans will be 10.75 percent, down from 11 percent. Rural residence and farm-related business loans will decrease to 11.25 percent, down from 11.50 percent.

According to Don Rogge, president of the Austin-based bank, the reduction, due to the drop in money cost, will save Texas farmers and ranchers more than \$6 million a year in interest.

The bank and its 44 Federal Land Bank Associations have more than \$2.5

billion outstanding to 40,000 Texas farmers and ranchers for terms of up to 30 years.

"Lower interest rates will give Land Bank borrowers some financial relief," says Rogge. "We feel that each time we bring interest rates down even a few basis points, we are helping stabilize the overall farm economy and Texas land prices, in particular."

Since August 1 the bank has lowered interest rates 3/4 of 1 percent. This represents almost \$19 million a year less in interest rates for farmers, according to Rogge.

The Land Bank, this year, has averaged almost \$2 million a month in net earnings, before aid to other districts and loan loss reserves.

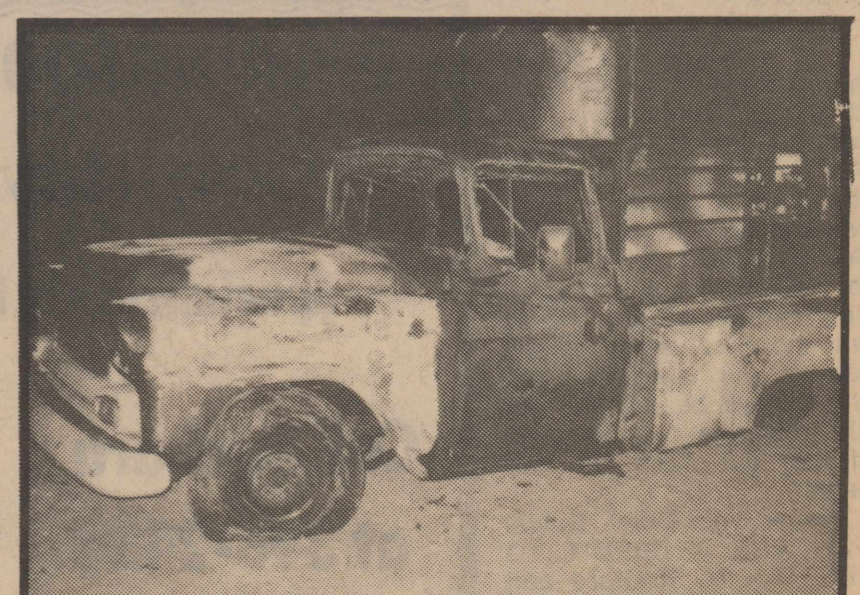
Another Fender Bender

Kerrick had a big turnout.

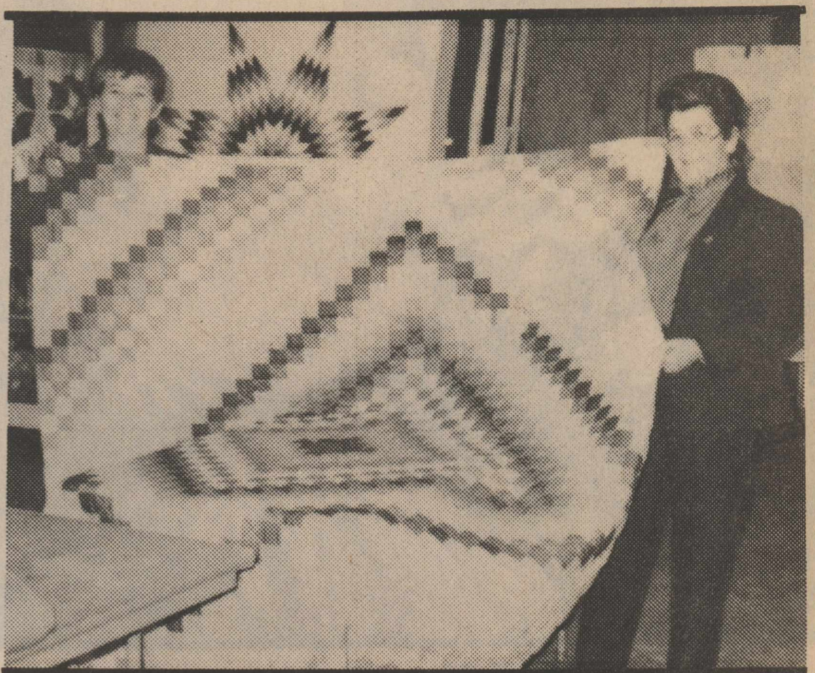
