Police Department To Conduct Alcohol Safety **Education Program**

The Stratford police department will kick-off a six week alcohol safety education program beginning this week. Included in the program will be the distribution of, "The National Alcohol Awareness Test" at the public schools; free anti-DWI bumper stickers and other items that the police department will utilize to educate both parent and young people on the ever increasing number of people who drink and drive. Also, through the cooperation of the "The Stratford Star" The Police Department will implement a series of public service advertisements.

"In the time it took you to read the first sentence of this paragraph, at least one teenager was killed or injured in a drunk driving accident, and chances are, the drink involved was beer. What most kids don't know, and what most parents and teachers don't teach, is that a typical 12 ounce can of beer is just as "strong" as a glass of wine or a cocktail with liquor." says Chief Dennis Davis.

"The goal of the Stratford Police department is to provide the necessary education to our young people emphasizing the point that a drink is a drink is a drink. Too often, young people have the misconception that one particular type of drink containing alcohol is "not as bad" as another; this program is being implemented to dispell that misnomer." Davis continues.

The Police Department acknowledges that many young people do not drink and probably will never drink. However, there will be or already exist a large percentage of young people who will experiment with alcohol--many of whom will do so while operating an automobile.

"We feel that we need to teach equivalence because the public has been seriously misled. There is no television advertising for liquor, but there is for beer and

wine. Television tells our kids that beer is part of sports. Mountain streams are the backdrop for "Refreshing" beer commercials. Wine is the key to sophisticated entertaining. The most powerful medium in the world brings beer and wine into our living room and makes us comfortable with them. Along the way, our society got the impression that beer is just a "Thirst Quencher", and wine is "Light", and we forgot about the alcohol. Our educational program will help set the record straight. It is a fact that 12 ounces of beer, 5 ounces of wine, and 11/4 ounces of liquor are equal in alcohol content. Let's not let another kid get behind the wheel of a car thinking it's safe to drive because he drank "Just"

beer, Davis states. DWI is the most urgent traffic safety issue facing us today. Eight thousand teenagers and 20,000 adults are killed each year as a result of drunk driving. Nearly 30 percent of the police officers who die in the line of duty are the victims of persons abusing alcohol. Two-thirds of the drivers in those accidents were drinking

beer. We all know that kids need to understand that drinking and driving do not mix. But it is equally important for them to know that beer and wine are just the same as

liquor. Chief Davis encourages citizens to obtain an "Anti-DWI" bumper sticker from the Police Department.

One simple, unbreakable rule about alcohol and driving: Drinking and driving

just don't mix.
All too often, people forget the true nature of what they're drinking. They get behind the wheel of a car thinking they've only had a "couple of beers" or "just a little wine."

The fact is that a 12-ounce glass of beer, a five-ounce glass of wine or 1-1/4 ounces of liquor contain the same amount of pure alcohol, about half an ounce. So, whether it's beer, wine or liquor - none of them mix with driving.

The Mall

Small towns are takin' a beating. The depressed agricultural and oil economy has a lot of 'em staggering. But there is another more insidious menace that's been closing the small town businessmans door. It's that hangout of teenagers and out-of-work Santas alike; the shopping mall.

I've always preferred to park in front of the store I was shopping in. Parking at a mall requires a wilderness guide. There are three million cars crammed on six sections of bubbling asphalt or glacier ice. Unless you are driving a pink 18-wheeler with a load of giraffes, you may never find your car

When you walk through a mall you could be in Abilene, Edmonton, Des Moines or Denver. The stores are alike. The merchandise is the same. The air is filtered and maintained like a hog confinement shed, and interchangable robots take

you money. I appreciate a merchant rememberin' my name, not having to call the IRS or the

KGB to take my check and offerin' to order something for you if they're out.

But not everybody likes it that way. Many prefer to shop anonymously. There is no such thing as loyalty to a chain store in a mall. You can always look for the cheapest price without feeling guilty. It's convenient, one-stop shopping. And they take that universal bus token; the credit card.

Small town businesses depend on local resident to survive. But good roads, cheap gas and chain store advertising lure even the most civic minded small town citizen to drive a hundred miles to buy furniture, clothes, cars, even groceries.

Those of us in agriculture should understand. You know how we feel when our neighbors buy Argentinian beef or New Zealand lamb. "Buy it at home!" we say, as we get in our Toyota, put on our Mexican boots and drive to the nearest big city shopping mall.

Small town businessmen have no God given right to survive. They are not a protected species, anymore than farmers or ranchers. But we need each other. Our purchases, even little ones, are important in small towns. In a shopping mall you're just another blank face with plastic money.

Beat Check By Dennis Davis

For at least the next four or five weeks, I would like to alternate a two-week compilation of "Beat Check" with

a "Crime Prevention" topic. Due to several of our local citizens having questions concerning door-to-door salesman, I felt that the following information might prove helpful.

One of the most frequent consumer "Rip-offs" is the door-to-door sale scam. Products frequently sold door-to-door and misrepresented include home improvements, such as siding and storm windows, funeral service contracts, books, and magazines. Naturally, not every door-to-door seller of these products makes misprepesentations. However, when someone solicits you at home, you should know your rights and how to avoid becoming a rip-off victim.

There are some specific legal definitions of door-todoor sales, what is covered, and what isn't. A door to door sale (under the law a "Home solicitation transaction") takes place whenever the consumer is at his residence or the residence of another person and purchases goods or services payable in cash or installments of more than \$25.00. *Sales of farm equipment and insurance are not regulated under this particular law.

*If the consumer purchases real estate, the cost must be more than \$100.00 and he must be at his own residence, without an attorney or broker to assist in the transaction.

*The solicitation must be made in person, not over the phone in order for the law on door-to-door sales to apply. But the law will apply if any part of the soliciation involves the seller coming to your home or workplace.

Be suspicious of anyone who tries to sell the service or product by playing on your emotions.

For instance, some sellers suggest you are neglecting your responsibilito your family if you don't buy their product.

Be suspicious of anyone who tells you he is selling the service or product at the lowest price or who tells you his competitors do bad work.

Also, be suspicious of anyone who says he has done other work in Stratford, but refuses to give you the names of some past customers, no matter what his excuse.

If you buy from a local business, you can always take a product back. If you buy from a fly-by-night seller, chances are you'll never see him or her again.

Under the Texas Home solicitation transactions act, the door-to-door seller must do the following:

(1) Provide you with a copy of the contract or receipt at the time of the sale in the appropriate language. For instance, if the salesman and the consumer spoke in spanish during the sale, the contract must also be in Spanish.

(2) The contract or receipt must show the date of the sale, the name and address of the merchant, and a statement to the buyer of his right to cancel the contract. Under Texas law, you have three days to cancel your purchase. After proper cancellation, the seller has 10 days to refund your money and return any trade-in item.



Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of October, our trooopers investigated 9 fatal accidents, 83 personal injury accidents, and 106 property damage accidents. There were 11 persons killed and 110 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. John Hood of Dumas stated, "In Sherman county, our troopers investigated 0 fatal accidents, 5 personal injury accidents, and 5 property damage accidents in the month of October. No persons were killed and 6 persons were injured in these accidents."

(3) Provide the consumer with a notice of cancellation giving the consumer the address where he may send written notice of the cancellation.

(4) Also, if the seller made any "Improvements" to your property and you want it restored to its original condition, the seller must do

(5) Unless the door-to-door salesman is selling insurance or farm equipment, Stratford city ordinance mandates that he be in possession of a permit issued by the city allowing him to sell door-to-door. Don't be too bashful to ask to see his permit! (The permit allows the police department to "Check-out" the subject and his product.)

If the seller has provided you with the right forms, you may simply sign the one titled "Notice of Cancellation," date it, and mail it to the merchant's address. In order to obtain a full refund, you must do this before midnight of the third business day after the sale.

Keep a copy of the form.

If the seller did not provide such a form, you may still cancel your

contract. Because the seller has violated the law in failing to provide the form, the buyer has extra time. But remember, you must cancel in writing. Be sure to keep a copy of the contract and your letter notifying the seller of cancellation. The sooner you do this, the better.

(1) After you cancel, the seller has 10 business days to either refund your money or return any note you may have signed in connection with the sale.

(2) The seller of the goods must notify you within 10 days whether he intends to retrieve the goods or abandon them. He may not require you to mail or ship the goods back to him.
(3) If the seller fails to notify you of his intention to repossess the goods within 20 days after cancellation, you cannot be forced to return the goods at a later date. You, the consumer, will not be required to return

money, your note, or both.

Don't be pushed into signing a contract or giving your money to a salesperson unless you're sure you want the product. Take time to think about it. You should always do some comparison shopping. Remember, any

You must receive a notice of cancellation under Texas law. You always have 3 days to cancel the contract,

regardless of whether you have received any goods or services.

Keep your receipt or contract and a copy of your notice of cancellation. You may need them if you must

seek legal help.



Conservation Compliance

A list of highly erodible and potentially highly erodible soils was released this week by the USDA Soil Conservation Service as mandated by the Food Security Act of 1985.

The list revealed that all land in Sherman County is highly erodible. All acres in cropland are considered as highly erodible due to the wind erosion susceptibility.

The conservation compliance provisions of the Act denies most USDA farm program benefits to farmers who farm highly erodible land unless the land is being farmed in accordance with a conservation plan approved by the Sherman County Soil and Water Conservation

The Act allows a grace period for those who are not using a conservation plan. They have until January 1, 1990 to develop and begin actively applying a plan. They have until January 1, 1995 to have the plan fully in

The provisions will have no effect on farmers who are using up-to-date conservation plans. If you are farming highly erodible land with a conservation plan, check with your local Soil Conservation Service office to find out if it meets conservation compliance provisions.


"We are ready to help anyone prepare a conservation plan that doesn't have ' Richie Brotherton, district conservationist for the SCS said. "We will be able to write a conservation plan containing the essential conservation practices to keep them in compliance with the 1985 farm bill." This plan simply tells farmers what they need to do

to maintain compliance. Such plans may include crop rotations, crop residue management, conservation tillage, and other measures.

Farmers with highly erodible land may also want to consider placing it in the conservation reserve, Blotherton said.
