### Beat Check By Dennis Davis

In a relatively quiet twotwo-week period, the Stratford Police Department conducted the following investigations:

An officer of the police department was called to two soft-drink vending machines located by a local service station. A supervisor on the soft-drink route had detected some tampering to pad locks that secured the machines. Apparently, over a period of several months, unknown persons had developed a method of "picking" the locks and taking various amounts of change. The supervisor could not be certain of a monetary amount, but advised the officer that the loss would be several hundred dollars. The supervisor stated that the

route salesman should have noticeed the shortage at a much earlier date. The locks were changed and more "burglar proof" type of lock installed. The police department has questioned two local subjects in connection with the reported that

On Thanksgiving Day, a Colorado man contacted a police officer via citizens band radio and stated that he needed help. The officer met the subject and learned that a semi-trailer had allegedly driven in a very reckless manner almost causing the Colorado man to wreck his RV. The incident occurred about 12 miles north of Stratford, in Dallam County. The police officer was able to stop the semi-trailer rig just South of Stratford and real saga began. The driver of the semi-trailer rig jumped out of the cab and stated that the officer was hindering him his capacity as a U.S. Marshal and undercover agent for the secret service. The officer requested some type of identification from the self proclaimed 'Rambo'. However, he was unable to produce any. conversations that followed, the officer was told by the driver that "This stop is going to cost you your job-You don't mess with Federal Agents!". officer contacted the Dallam County Sheriff's office who advised the officer to obtain a signed complaint from the Colorado man, a written statement and have the driver of the Semi-rig post a bond for "Reckless driving. The officer requested municipal Judge Don Owens to meet the parties and himself at City Hall for the necessary formalities. After a two hour ordeal at city hall, the man posted bond and was allowed to go his way and fight his own little war as a self-proclaimed U.S. Marshall, secret service and Rambo combination.

In another incident involving the driver of a semi-trailer rig, an off-duty, out of uniform police officer happened into the local convenience store to make a purchase. The off-duty officer, the store clerk and the driver, who by the way had parked in the no-parking zone on U.S. 287, were the

only people inside the store. The driver began giving the clerk a difficult time on various matters concerning the store, etc. After a few began to check-out at the counter. continuing to give the clerk a difficult time and in a very rude manner. The off-duty officer made mention of the fact that the subject had parked in a no-parking zone and that if the duty officer came by, he would be subject to receiving a traffic citation. The driver turned to the off-duty officer and said a few 'choice' words to which the off-duty officer took exception. When the off-duty officer identified himself as a police officer, the driver did like so many folks do when face to face with a policeman, he got very polite. However, the damage was done and the off-duty officer called the duty officer and together, with a big grin from the clerk, they all left headed for city hall. The driver was filed on for disorderly conduct by language and parking in a no parking zone. He was released after posting bond.

The police department responded to a number of miscellaneous calls including two reports of suspicious persons which proved unfounded; a request from the Dalhart Police Department requesting assistance in locating a vehicle reportedly heading toward Stratford that had left a convenience store in Dalhart without paying for Gas and several other miscellaneous calls.

#### Mary Allen School News

The description of a balanced elementary mathematics curriculum has been in transition. It now has neither the heavy emphasis on vocabulary and abstract concepts of the "New Math" nor does it emphasize only the narrow interpretation of mathematics as arithmetic. The mathematics program now consists of a blend of critical components of both these philosophies presented within a framework of stressing understanding, -

experience, and application.
Students develop mathematical concepts through concrete experiences with manipulative materials. The development of concepts and skills are to be developed through activities deliberately designed to emphasize understanding and applica-

tion. In all areas, a priority is placed on applying skills in problem solving situations.

The basic learning objectives include understanding place value, numbers, addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Also included in the basic math component are problem solving skills, measurement concepts, geometry, graphing and estimation for the reasonableness of answers.

During the spring of 1986, Mary Pat Williams attended a week long institute to develop activities and methods which would meet the needs of children in developing true understanding of mathematics through work with concrete concepts and manipulatives. On Nov. 26, she provided inservice for the faculty on the use of manipulatives such as counting cubes, attribute blocks, and base ten blocks.

Inservice was also provided by Viola Kautz in classroom techniques to promote learning in students with limited English proficiency. Included in the program was a description of specialized programs in phonics which can be used with all children.
