Project Christmas Card began in 1962 with the suggestion of Dave McReynolds, editor of The Stratford Star, when GFWC/Prospectus Study Club adopted the long range project of a new library building. The club had really begun supporting the library at the fourth meeting after its organization in October 1956. A city-wide book drive with the help of Boy Scouts, Lions, Beta Sigma Phi, Embroidery Club and Home Demonstration Clubs brought in 500 hardback books! The library was located in two small rooms where the City Hall is today, and was much too

The club instigated the formation of a county library board and the raising of the library allowance from \$150 a year to \$400. Mrs. Jessie Hodges faithfully worked with the library for many years. Mrs. R.M. Buckles, a club member, was elected

first president of the Board.

brought in \$1,727.50 in the
first year and this was during

Do you remember the four outstanding musicals performed by over 100 people of all ages in each? Club was blessed with talented Gail Carter, director and Janet Riffe, co-director and script writer. Mrs. Riffe is the current club president. Every member worked on these projects.

The property, consisting of four lots, was purchased from Claude Sloan of Amarillo for \$4,500. The building was designed by the architectural firm of Notestine & Jones, was built at Artco Construction Co. of Stratford at a cost of \$27,678.28. An additional \$7,357.90 was spent for furniture and shelving. The Stratford Garden Club donated the landscaping and the underground sprinkler system. The salaries of employees, maintenance and operating expenses will be paid from funds provided by Sherman County and The City of Stratford. These funds will be administered by the seven member

In the second of a series of special articles, I felt that due to the large number of skunks and bats that have been seen inside the city limits of Stratford lately, the following information might be beneficial to all residentsespecially pet owners!

Man and all warm-blooded animals are susceptible to rabies, which is almost invariably fatal. The disease is transmitted by an infected animal's biting or licking. The virus enters the victim's body through a break in the skin, or rarely, through mucous membranes (eyes, nose, throat).

Rabies affects the central nervous system. It may take from ten days to a year to develop; however, exposed people can be successfully treated before the development of symptoms by a series of vaccinations. Rabies infection is detected by laboratory examination of

the suspect brain tissue. Wildlife rabies is a major source of infection domestic animals, including pets. The disease may be transmitted to man either by infected wild or domestic animals. Contrary to popular belief, rabies occurs in all seasons and in all sections of

the country.
THINGS TO WATCH OUT

Bold, "Friendly", or "Apparently tame" wild animals. Night animals, like skunks and foxes, that are seen in the daytime. Pets that have difficulty walking, eating, or drinking. Signs of excitement or viciousness in normally quiet animals. Animals that tear at or scratch an old wound until it bleeds. Cattle that "Strain" for long periods. Bats that are unable to fly.

In the early stages, the personality of pets may change. A normally friendly dog may stay alone, another may begin to seek more attention. Some animals scratch at the place the virus entered their bodies. Later, symptoms follow a "Furiious'' pattern, a 'Dumb' pattern, or a combination of

"Furious" symptons include excitement, viciousness, roaming, unusual noises, and a tendency to attack anything attracting the animal's attention. Such animals may snap at anything, including them-selves. They tend to 'Drool', and their saliva may be mixed with blood. They may swallow objects such as stones and sticks. These symptoms progress to eventually death.

'Dumb' symptoms include difficulty in chewing, swallowing, and drinking, or trouble walking. An animal may not be able to close its mouth. People have been exposed by trying to clear the throats of such animals, which may seem to be choking. Paralysis spreads throughout the body until death. Parts paralyzed by rabies are limp, not rigid or stiff. A veterinarian should be consulted immediately when any of the above signs are first noticed.

If bitten by an animal, treat the bite as if the animal

(5)If possible, have the biting dog or cat tested for rabies or placed under observation. If it is alive and normal after ten days of observation, the animal was not infective for rabies at the time of the bite. The ten day observation period is not valid for animals other than dogs and cats because no information is available as to when virus is excreted in the saliva of other animals.

CONTROL RABIES! (1)Immunize all dogs and cats over three months of age-annually.

WHAT WE CAN DO TO

(2)Report stray dogs and cats to the Stratford City Hall. (3)Keep your pets on a leash or in a fenced-in area.

There are 500,000 people bitten each year in the United States. More than thirty thousand require anti-rabies treatments.







hunt or fish using your license, or to possess more than one hunting license. RESIDENT HUNTING: \$10.00. Required of ALL Texas residents who hunt any wild bird or animal EXCEPT for residents who qualify for the SPECIAL RESIDENT HUNTING LICENSE, residents holding a RESIDENT COMBINATION HUNTING AND FISHING LI-CENSE, and residents holding a LIFETIME RESIDENT COMBINATION HUNTING AND FISHING LICENSE or LIFETIME RESIDENT HUNTING LICENSE. A resident is defined as a person with United States citizenship, or an alien who has officially declared their intention to obtain citizenship, who has resided in Texas for more than six months

SPECIAL RESIDENT HUNTING: \$6.00. Valid for and required of any resident under 17 years of age or 65 years old or older and certain disabled veterans while hunting any wild bird or animal. A qualified disabled veteran is one who has a service connected disability, as defined by the Veterans Administration, consisting of the loss of the use of a lower extremity or of a disability rating of 60% or more and who is receiving compensation from the United States for the disability.

any federal installation within the state for more than 30 days.

Artificial light of any form may not be used to take game animals and game birds. Cables, chains, ropes or other devices connected between moving objects may not be used when hunting pheasant.

Game Birds: All wild varieties of turkey, grouse, prairie chickens, pheasants, partridge, bobwhite quail, scaled quail, Mearns' quail, Gambel's quail, chachalacas, and all migratory
