Baskin Announces His Candidacy For Commissioner of No. 1

Charles Steven "Steve" Baskin has announced his intention to seek the office of County Commissioner of Precinct No. 1 in Sherman County.

Baskin, 30, who is a farmer-rancher on the family farm southeast of Stratford, believes the business and government of Sherman County should be taken care of locally rather than on the state or national level.

"The people of the county are entitled to an efficient and thrifty use of their tax money," he said in declaring his candidacy. "Any government should not try to be all things to all people."

Baskin, who has been a resident of Sherman County his entire life except during a six month period in Alamosa and while attending school at Texas A&M, ran for the same office in 1979 as a write-in candidate.

During his time in Stratford, Baskin has been a director of the Sherman County Farm Bureau for six years, a delegate to the Farm Bureau Convention for two years, and is currently serving as secretary-treasurer to that organization.

In addition, he teaches Sunday School in the Youth Department of the First Baptist Church.

Baskin is a 1969 graduate of Stratford High School and holds a Bachelor of Science degree in animal science from Texas A&M.

He is married to the former Sandra Allen of Dalhart and has three children: Tommy Don, Megan, and Hillary.

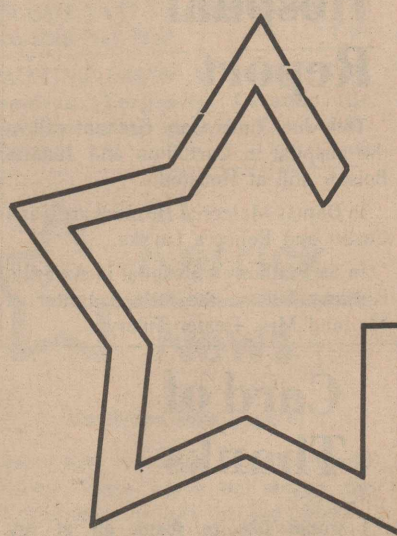

Are You Really A Registered Voter?

Surprisingly, the answer may be No. "If you did not receive a new salmon orange voter's card from our office in the last week, now is the time to contact us about your registration," said Zelda Pickens, Tax Assessor Collector.

No orange card indicates either you

are not registered, or we have made an error, or your mailing address has changed and your card was returned by the Post Office. When your card is returned by the Post Office we must cancel your voter's registration.

Please look carefully at your voter's card. On the left side under your name should be your street address or section number. On the right side should be your current mailing address. Please bring your card by our office if either of

these is not correct. Check to see that you have the correct voting box number--the cards show this to be precinct number.

Have you moved, even just across the street? This can change your precinct.

We certainly don't want anyone to miss voting, so please check your new orange cards. If you have any questions, please call us at 396-2150.

Appraiser Notifies Tax Units of Estimated Value Losses

Marillyn Albert, Chief Appraiser for the Sherman County Appraisal District, notified each taxing unit in the district of the estimated loss in value for each unit due to the total exemption of livestock from the 1982 tax rolls. Mrs. Albert also

called to the taxing jurisdiction's attention the possible loss in tax revenue on exemption of implements of farming and ranching. At the present time the Attorney General's office has not given an opinion on the extent of this

exemption. It is hoped this opinion is forthcoming in the immediate future. Loss of revenue district wide, due to exemption of livestock and equipment, is expected to exceed one half million dollars in tax dollars. Mrs. Albert stated, "While each of us would like to see more exemptions on our own property, the fact remains that each time any category of property is exempt from the tax base, the remaining property has to bear a heavier share of the tax burden."

There has been no precipitation in the past week nor are the prospects for any very good. The temperature dipped to 6 degrees F. last Friday night but day time temperatures reached up to 68 F. by the next Tuesday.

After the dedication ceremony, Walter Lasley, then president of the board of the Stratford Hospital District, and Mrs. Hazel Dunn, the administrator at that time, cut a red ribbon to officially open the home. The following day the 38 bed nursing home was ready to admit the first patients.

"It is a privilege to be part of a community that shows concern for meeting the needs of the elderly," said present administrator Jack Gore, of the facility's success. "This home has a reputation that far exceeds those of other facilities in our area. It is known for giving good patient care and for its great volunteer program."

The central core of the Coldwater Manor structure, including kitchen and administrative offices, was designed so it could be expanded to a 60-patient facility if the need were to arise.

The facility was made possible by the approval of a \$550,000 bond issue in 1975. Work on the home began in early 1976 and was completed in late December of that year.

Two residents, Mary Dietrich and Mary Sheets, have remained at the facility ever since the opening day. Additionally, two employees, Jewel Lewis, R.N., and Betty Garrison, L.V.N., have been with the staff since the beginning.

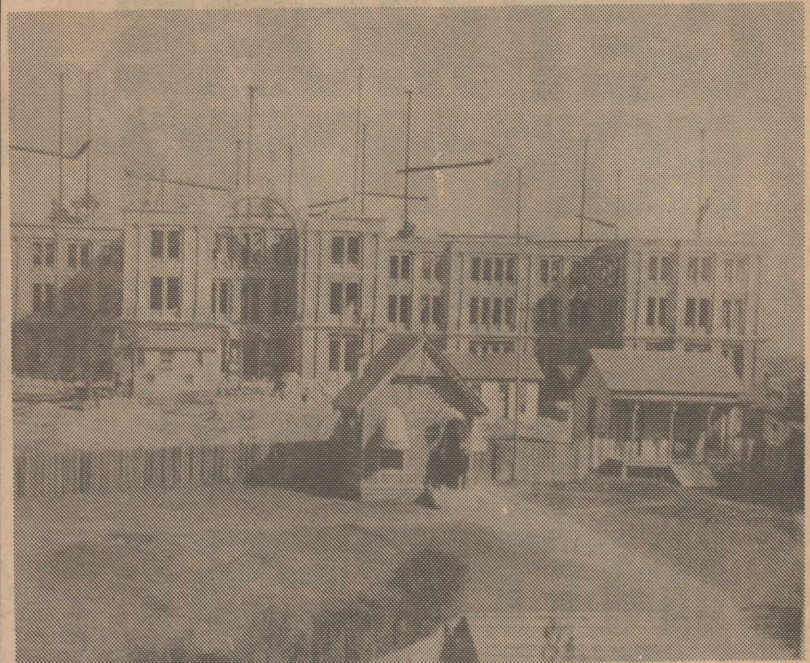
Three Terms to Expire on Hospital Board

Lawyers in Illinois have been ordered to switch to 11 inch paper for their legal briefs and other legal documents. Since time began (or at least since the beginning of the Perry Mason T.V. series) lawyers have used paper 14 inches long.

Illinois courts, however, seemed to feel the change to standard business size would be more convenient for everyone involved. The lawyers, of course, disagreed.

The Wall Street Journal published the objection of the head of a leading Chicago law firm. Among other things, he protested the immense cost of buy all new 11 inch cabinets.

A few days later, the Journal published a letter to the editor from a Wisconsin teenager. The youngster pointed out that 11 inch paper will fit quite easily in a 14 inch cabinet.

Stratford Hospital District Board approved payment of bills for Stratford Ambulance Service, Coldwater Manor, and Stratford Hospital District.

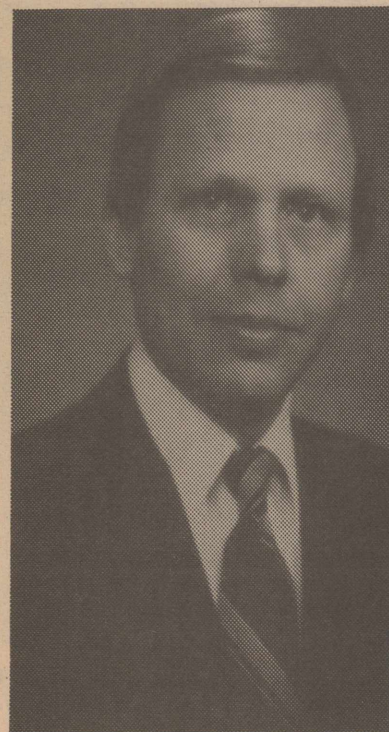
Boulter Announces Candidacy for Congress in 13th District

Beau Boulter, Amarillo attorney and City Commissioner, announced for U.S. Congress Wednesday, January 27, 1982. In news conferences in Amarillo and Wichita Falls, Boulter said he felt that the people of the 13th District deserve a representative who reflects their conservative views.

"Hightower claims he is a conservative, but a close look at his voting record reveals some alarmingly liberal tendencies. This District needs a Congressman who doesn't have to be pressured by his constituents to vote their convictions. Hightower's party ties prevent him from being able to vote as conservatively as this District mandates. While no one wants a Congressman who will just be a rubber stamp, we do need input and influence with the Reagan administration and Hightower just doesn't have it!"

Boulter said he had no intentions of running for Congress until friends and supporters began coming to him and asking him to run. Then, after Mr. Hightower had to be pressured by his constituents to support the tax cut bill, party leaders began to approach me about it. Next, volunteers I had worked with in the Reagan campaign and in the city election began calling me. It was a snowballing movement. Rosemary and I discussed it at length. We decided that I would wait and possibly run in 1984; but as more and more people came to me I realized that this District is in crucial need of effective representation and I owe it to my family, my supporters, my fellow Texans, and my country to start fighting for the principles we believe in and to do it now."

"Everybody knows that Jack Hightower is a nice guy. But when times are tough, we need more than a 'good ol' boy'. The facts are that Jack Hightower is more pragmatic than philosophical; he is more a man of compromise than of conviction. He is personable but he is not a fighter for principles. He is more concerned with popularity and power than with principles. Mr. Hightower claims he is a conservative, but he is a part of an outmoded Democratic machinery led by Tip O'Neil, Ted Kennedy and the liberal establishment. This machine has brought the country to near economic, military and political disaster. Hightower's Democrat party ties often make it difficult to vote his District and his party at the same time. When put to the test, he votes the party line. The President's tax cut got Mr. Hightower's approval only at the 'eleventh hour' after heavy pressure from his constituents. Until then he was committed to the Democrat's bill and for

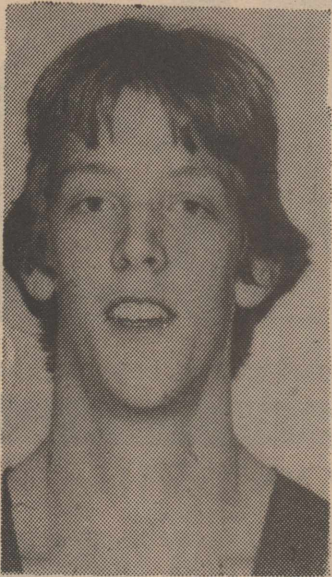

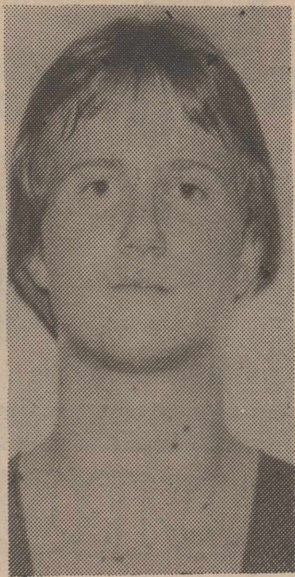

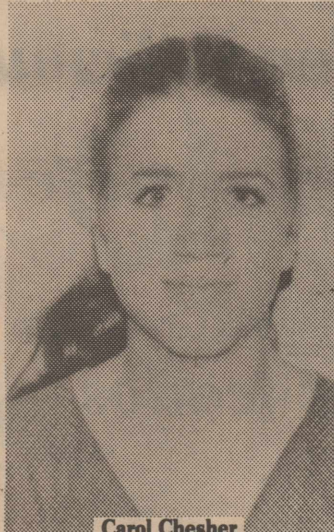

Chris Stanley was the only other Elk in double-figures with 12 points, Kevin Stanley and Joe Bill Boren each had five points.

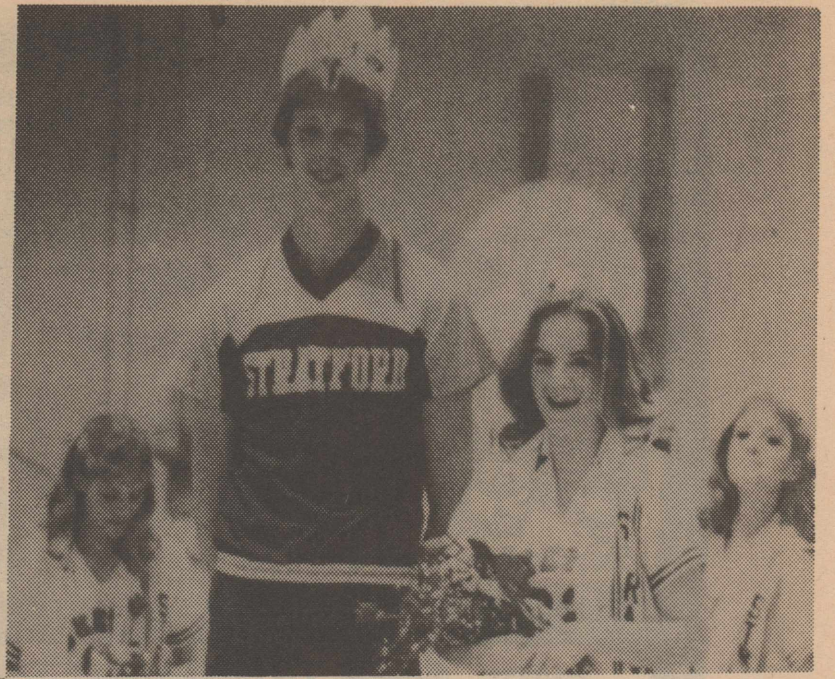
The Elks are now 21-2 on the season

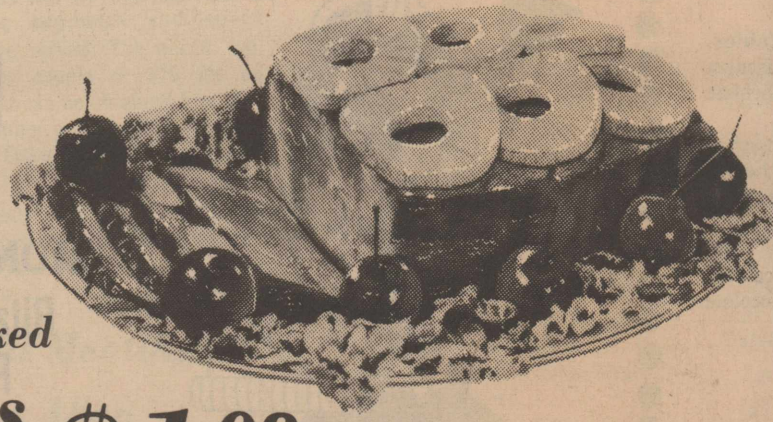

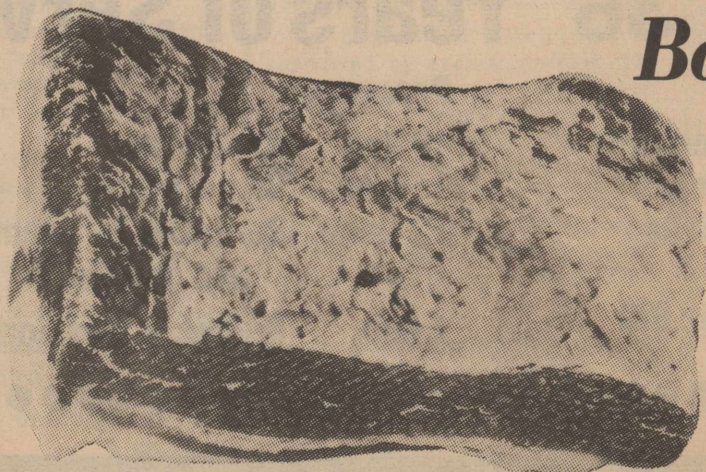

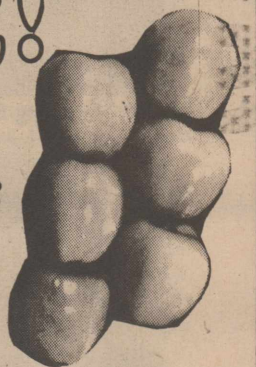

As a part of her training, Nancy has written the following news release. I feel that you, as a consumer, will benefit from the article.

SALES, SALES, AND MORE SALES

by Nancy Bigby

While shopping around this month, you have probably noticed that every store seems to be having a sale. If you're like me, you found that what you wanted wasn't on sale or if it was you hadn't saved enough money for its purchase. You might often wonder when do stores usually have sales and what items will be featured. Most retail stores follow a time cycle in selling certain items at reduced prices. The following guide will cue you in to their pattern.

January--White sales, storewide clearance, resort wear, winter clothing, furniture sales, Christmas cards and decorations.

February--Furniture and home furnishings, silver, china, glassware, houseware, mattresses.

March--Housewares, china, silver, garden supplies, spring and Easter promotions, luggage, spring clothing.

April--Men's clothing, Spring cleaning supplies, paints, house wares, outdoor furniture, women's accessories.

May--TV sets, auto tires, summer sportswear, air conditioning fans, bridal business, garden supplies, outdoor furniture.

June--Sportswear, bridal gifts, camp clothes and supplies, vacation needs,

swimwear, home improvements. July--Appliances, floor coverings, air conditioning, July 4th clearance, sporting goods, women's shoes, sportswear.

August--Furniture sales, back-to-school fall fashions, fall fabrics, white sale.

September--Back-to-school, fall fashions, men's and boy's sportswear, home furnishings, china, glassware, flower and vegetable seeds, accessories.

October--Women's coats, suits, men's and boy's outerwear, hat accessories, lingerie, home furnishings.

November--Ladies coats and dresses, nursery plant close-out, Christmas toys, pre-Christmas value promotions, Thanksgiving weekend sales, china, glassware, table linens, blankets.

December--Christmas campaign, gift promotions, winter clothing, resort wear, north and south.

After reading the chart it would be helpful to make a list of all clothes, school supplies, grooming aids, gifts, and other budget items you will need. On a calendar, write what you plan to buy each month. If it is a major purchase, put aside money monthly so that you can buy the item at a reduced price.

Additional tips on sales are knowing the store's policy on returns and exchanges. Always be sure the sale price is really lower. It could be the regular price in another store. Also, you find the best selection when a sale begins and the lowest price as it ends.

Following sale patterns will be beneficial in saving money and the frustration of not having money when that certain item is on sale.

County Agents Report

The crucial issues of agribusiness, world hunger, rising food costs, and nutrition are brought into focus by the 16th Courses by Newspaper offering entitled "Food and People", that begins nationwide in late January.

West Texas State University's School of Agriculture joins the more than 400 newspapers and 250 colleges and universities that are expected to participate in "Food and People".

The course, offered for continuing education credit units, is co-sponsored by the Texas A&M Extension Service. It consists of two public forums and 15 articles which will run in the Amarillo Daily News on consecutive Thursdays beginning January 28. The first forum, scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 13, will feature Congressman Jack Hightower. It will be held at the A&M Extension Service Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard, from 9 until 12 noon.

The course combines scientific, social, historical, ethical, and economic perspectives to explore such questions as:

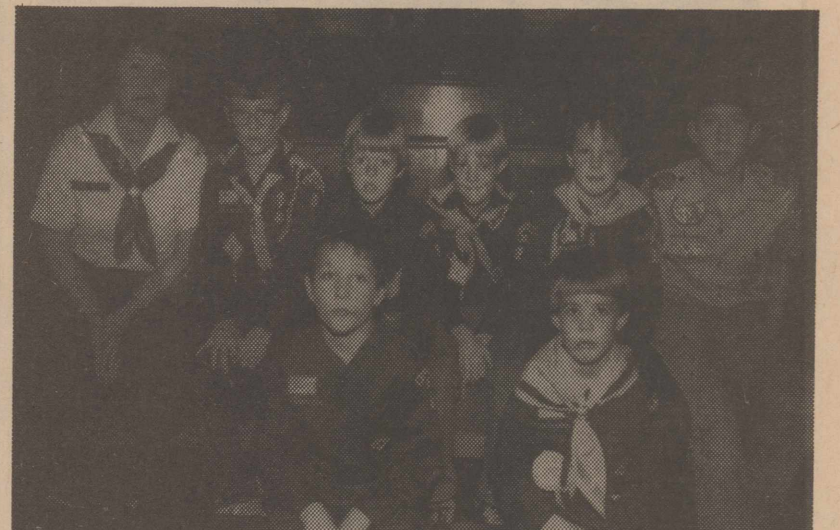
