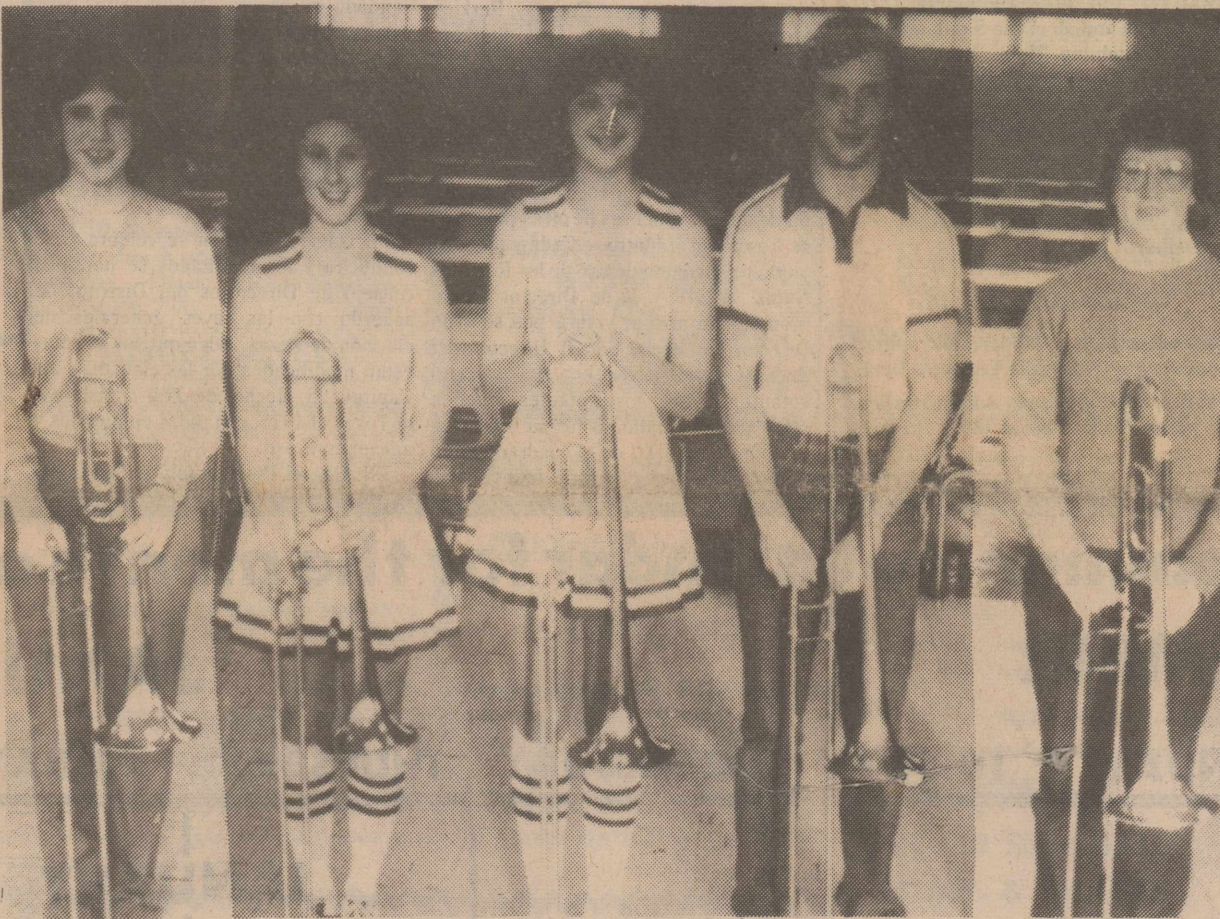

## Iced-over roads cause accidents; crash kills 2

The bitterest winter storm of the season swept across the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles over the Christmas weekend, dumping up to six inches of snow in the Stratford area and plunging temperatures to near zero.

Residents of the area greeted with mixed reactions the blizzard, part of a mammoth cold front that stretched across several states and played havoc from Dever, Colo. to Nebraska. For children and the young at heart there was that always magical "White Christmas." And many farmers welcomed the badly needed moisture. But the blizzard also left highways and roads coated with a layer of ice and made driving extremely hazardous.

The weather is believed responsible for two major traffic accidents in Stratford this week, one of them causing the death of two persons.

Two members of Yuma, Ariz. family--5 month old Amanda Cook and the infant's grandmother, Mrs. Nyla Carr, 42--were killed Tuesday morning in a head-on two car crash on U.S. 54 near Cut Rate Grocery and Family Center at the eastern city limit.

Seriously injured in the crash were Jeff Cook, his wife Kelli, and their son Jason Cook, 5.

The Cook car was reportedly eastbound on U.S. 54, and skidded out of control on the icy road, sliding sideways, before being in collision with

a westbound auto driven by Gary Sefton, 24, of St. Peters, Mo. The Sefton family, including Gary, his wife Debra, a son Christopher, 4, and twin daughters Jessica and Elizabeth, 3, were reportedly moving to Arizona. The Sefton car was pulling a for-rent moving trailer.

Justice of the Peace John Woods pronounced Mrs. Carr and the Cook infant dead at the scene. The surviving Cook family members were treated at Stratford Clinic then transferred to Dumas Memorial Hospital. Members of the Sefton family were treated at the clinic here, then dismissed.

The other major accident was an automobile, locomotive crash. It occurred at about 5:55 p.m. Monday at the icy intersection of South Fort St. and the Santa Fe tracks.

According to the investigating officer's report, William Lester Roberts of Stratford was headed alone in his 1981 Oldsmobile when it was in collision with the locomotive. He had reportedly been watching a pickup ahead of him having difficulty crossing the tracks on the icy road, and when he saw the train could not stop in time.

The car stopped with its front bumper just onto the tracks, and the locomotive ripped off the front end of the vehicle, spun it around and heavily damaged the rear. Roberts was believed at the time to have only suffered minor injuries. □

## 'Big Blue Band' dominates competition

Keeping alive the tradition of champions--and a long winning streak extending back more than a decade, the Stratford High School Elk band dominated the All-Region band tryouts for IA and IIA schools held Dec. 13 at

Sanford-Fritch High School. Band Director Randy Hunsaker said he took 40 members of the Elk band to the region tryouts and 34 of them placed, by far the tops in the area. Only senior Janet Pleyer won a first

chair or division rating--in trombone competition--but the strength of the Stratford performance was not in its number top individual ratings but in the overall depth of the band--the number of students who placed well in the competition.

Lisa Zak won first alternate in clarinets, Melanie Hembree, first alternate in flutes, Stacy Rolen first alternate in baritones, Karen Waters first alternate in alto saxophones and Sharon Muir first alternate in bass

clarinets. Pete White captured second alternate honors in tubas.

Winning ratings of two were Piper Bennett, snare drums, and Kathy Payne, alto sax. Three were won by Cara Brite, trombone, Lisa Wiley, french horn, and Becky Goad, snare drums. Michelle Sewell and Collin McKinney took fours in clarinet and baritones respectively.

Fifth ratings were won by David Limer, tuba, Diann Riffe, french horn, and sixes by Donita Gibson, clarinet,

and Krisan Reese, trombone.

Other SHS band winners in the region tryouts included with place in parenthesis/Coronets: Lance Willard (9), Nanette Boardman (10), Sabrina Palmer (11), and Greg Wright (14); Clarinets: Christy Lancaster (7) and Marci K. Engelbrecht (16); trombones: Brian Kendrick (8) and Lea Ann Armstrong (11); Flute: Ramona Martinez (8), Sheila Robertson (9), Zenith Burton (11), Deana Lane (12), Kathy Durham (14); and Tubas: Byron Campbell (8). □

## Local homemakers may enter state meet

The 12th annual Natural Fibers Fashion Review is being planned for the 1983 Southwest Farm and Ranch Exposition. The fashion contest and show will be held on March 5 in Fort Worth.

The contest is open to any homemaker from the Southwest Farm and Ranch states of Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico, who is involved in agricultural production, an agriculture-related business, or is a member of an agriculture-related organization.

The Fashion Review is designed to promote the use of Southwest natural fibers and to emphasize excellence in garment construction and fashion in home sewing.

Garments entered in the show must be made of a minimum blend of 50

percent cotton or 50 percent wool and/or mohair.

The competition will have four divisions: day wear, evening, mother and child, and former grand award winners. The contest provides a showcase for exhibiting designs made from natural fibers.

Prizes will be awarded to first, second and third place winners in each division. Special awards will be presented to the best cotton, mohair, and wool garments. The Grand Award winner will be selected from the winners of the mother and child, day wear, and evening wear division.

Sponsors of the event include the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Southwest Hardware & Implement Association and Progressive Farmer.

Entries must be submitted by February 18, 1983. Contest rules and entry blanks may be obtained from the Sherman County Extension office, P.O. Box 1108, Stratford. The phone number is (806) 396-2122.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held within and for Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River in Texas, on the 15th day of January, 1983, at the polling places hereinafter set out, within said District in accordance with a Resolution adopted by the Board of Directors of said District as follows, to wit:

"Be It Resolved by the Board of Directors of Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River:

I. That an election shall be held within and for said Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River (hereafter referred to as "The District") on the 15th day of January, 1983, in the election precincts hereinafter set forth and at the polling places hereinafter set forth, all within said District, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified resident taxpaying voters of said District the election of one (1) Precinct Director for Precincts III, IV, and V of the District for a two year term, and the election of two County Committeemen from each county composing the District, for a four-year term.

II. Upon each of the ballots used in said election shall be placed the names of the candidates for Precinct Director to be elected as follows:

Precinct III: Sherman County, Neal Spurlock - Director  
Precinct IV: Moore County, Gaston Wells - Director

Precinct V: Hartley County, Robert Thompson - Director

III. Upon each of the ballots used at said election shall be placed the names of the candidates for County Committeemen to be elected for each county composing the District as follows:

Sherman County, H.H. Caraway, Johnny Crownover, Walter Lasley, Duane Schafer, Horace Sneed  
Moore County, C.C. Burnett, Herbert Clark, J.A. (Pete) Hall, Jess Starkey, Berkley Stringer

Hartley County, Gene Atkinson, Cleo Ledbetter, Richard, Stonecipher, Jack Thompson, Richard Wilson

IV. Blank spaces shall be left in order that the names of other persons may be written in. Each person (voter) residing in Precincts Nos. III, IV and V, as set forth above, shall vote for only one Director, namely for Director for the Director's Precinct in which the voter resides. All voters may vote for the candidate of their choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race and leaving the name of such Director on the ballot. All voters desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot may do so by writing the name of the person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all other candidates appearing on the ballot for Precinct Director. Each person residing in the counties composing the District, as set forth above, shall vote for two (2) County Committeemen for the county in which the voter resides. Each person may vote for the candidate of his choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race and leaving the name of the County Committeemen on the ballot. All persons desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot, may do so by writing the name of that person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all but two candidates appearing or written in on the ballot.

V. The area comprising the District is hereby divided into the following election precincts, to include all or that part of the county designated which lies within the district, such election to be held at the polling places indicated and conducted by the following election officers:

Election Precinct No. III--Sherman County. Polling Place: Sherman County Courthouse, Stratford, Texas. Election Judge: Wilma Jean Knight

Election Precinct No. IV--Moore County. Polling place: Moore County Courthouse, Dumas, Texas. Election Judge: Roy Brockman

Election Precinct No. V--Hartley County. Polling Place: Hartley County Community Building, Channing, Texas. Election Judge: John Frantz

VI. That such election shall be held and conducted and returns made to the Board of Directors of the District, in accordance with the general election laws of Texas, except as same are modified by the provisions of Chapter 25, Acts of the 39th Legislature of Texas of 1925, together with all amendments and additions thereto.

VII. That the President and Secretary of the District shall give notice of this election causing a substantial copy of this resolution or notice containing the same to be published once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation published in the bounds of the District, the first publication to be not less than twenty-one (21) nor more than thirty-five (35) days prior to the date of the election.
