Sewing Machine Routine Checkups

Do you ever sit down at your machine to sew and have everything go wrong? This dilemma can easily be avoided by giving your machine routine checkups, advises Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Home Demon stration Agent.

Sewing machines should be cleaned regularly. To perform Weinert Matrons well, a machine needs to be lint-free and oiled

To clean, use a soft brush to remove lint and loose threads. Then apply a drop of oil to all points which normally need oiling. Remove excess oil by stitching on scraps of fabric. When the machine seems to

be performing slower than usual, the gears may need lubrication. Apply the lubricant according to directions in your machine instruction

When the top tension thread keeps breaking, re-thread the machine. If this doesn't help, check for correct needle size the upper tension. Sometimes be wound too full. tension may be too tight.



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

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
