

Since 1959, about 30 million high school students have taken the test, which measures verbal and mathematical abilities

This year, the PSAT/NMSQT will be offered Saturday, October 19 or Tuesday, October 22 at almost 20,000 high schools nationwide.

Through the PSAT/NMSQT students are selected for the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Program, which enables talented students to compete for scholar-

In addition, students can use the test as a guide to see how they ranked nationally among other

As preparation for the 100-minute, two-part test, students receive a Student Bulletin containing a complete sample test with an answer key and scoring instructions.




