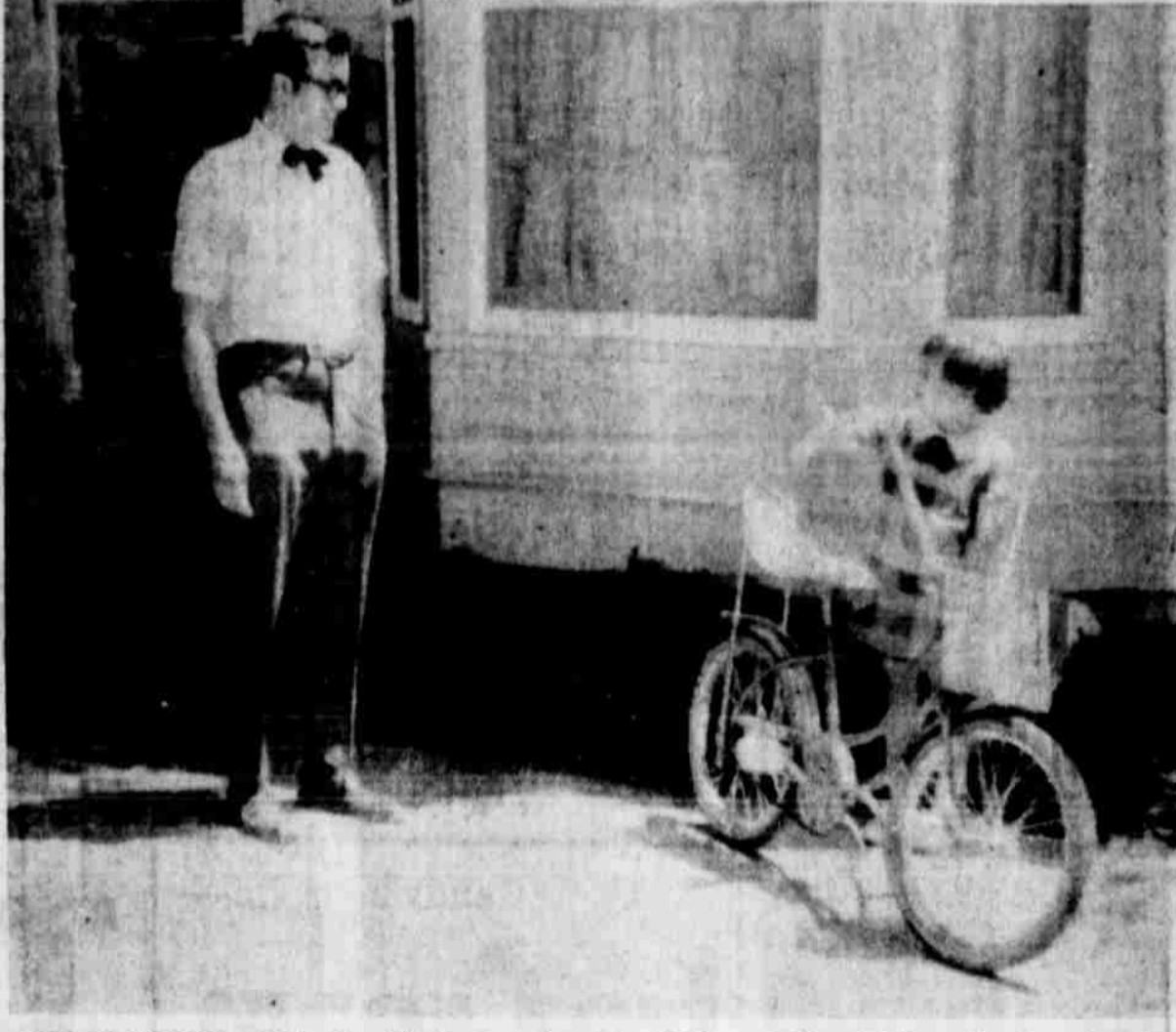

Longtime Haskell High Principal Is Teaching Math In Junior High

Most changes are subtle and sneaky, but not the changing of chieftains on the Haskell High school Indian Reservation! For twenty-four years Principal William P. McCollum has stood his ground bravely as chief of HHS administrative affairs.

Not to see his familiar figure in THAT office is just not a subtle change. A slip of the tongue may yet send an erring student to see "Mr. McCollum" for disciplinary measure.

In twenty-four years any working relationship becomes a way of life. Tenure teachers and principal know each other well, and how to help each other effectively to get the teaching job done. He will be missed.

Not only by teachers though. Some students who, with regularity, have seen Mr. McCollum about their infraction of various rules, will find a new principal figure awkward at first.

Fortunately Mr. McCollum is not leaving the reservation, only switching positions. He will teach mathematics in the form of algebra and related mysteries.

A native of Clyde where his parents still live, Mr. McCollum graduated from high school in 1933. By August 1937 he had worked and studied his way to B. S. degree from Abilene Christian College, with a science major.

The following September he was teaching plane geometry, history and algebra in the Haskell school. C. B. Breedlove was superintendent then, George Wimbish principal.

daughter of Mr. J. M. Diggs and the late Mrs. Diggs, was off to college about that time. She graduated from Texas Tech in 1941 and in September of that year she and Mr. McCollum were married.

WWI rearranged their plans somewhat. Mr. McCollum became a civilian flying instructor for the Army flying school in Stamford. By 1944 he was on active Air Force duty in various parts of the world. The end of the war in August 1945 found him on top of the world, flying over the Himalayas that is, Australia, Calcutta, India, Kunming and Shanghai, China, were among many places he touched in his service carrier.

In 1946 he came home. In September 1946 Mr. McCollum began his twenty-four years as principal of Haskell High School.

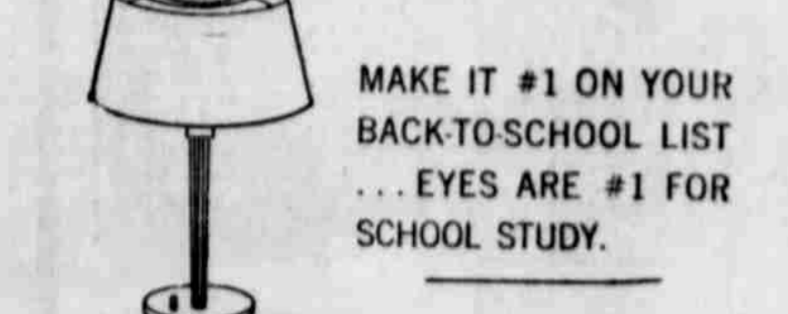
