"I believe I am qualified for the office for which I am announcing for a third term," said Hooper. "I do not believe I am asking too much, since the three gentlemen who preceded me were all elected for their third terms."

They created a bigger demand than they could fill, and so bigger factories, increased employment, and constantly better automobiles resulted. And today we can buy an infinitely superior car for about one-fifth of the price, while half a million men are directly employed in the industry, compared to a few thousand at the time this picture was taken.

CHURCH OF CHRIST E. V. Wilson, minister OUR 1938 CALENDAR

According to our present plans, we have one of the fullest and most promising calendars for 1938 in the history of this church. Demonstration Clubs Have Busy Year

Pantries of 123 Hale county home demonstration club members were supplied with 67,454 quarts of food, besides approximately fourteen tons of edible products, during the past 12 months period, records of Miss Chloe Huffaker, home demonstration agent, show.

In carrying out the home food supply program for the year, the Hale county club members prepared 6,100 cakes and prepared at home various dairy products foods. Pantries were improved, there being 19 ventilated pantries built during the year and 35 improved.

A total of 74 foods preparation demonstrations were given under the direction of the home demonstration agent during the year. The demonstrations were carried out in response to farm home needs prevailing among the club members. Club women also studied meal planning, there being one demonstration based on dietary standard of one pint to one quart of milk per person daily, with yellow, starry, leafy vegetables and citrus fruit or tomatoes, one other fruit, a cereal, butter at every meal and a protein rich food. Eighty-six women made and followed daily meal plans for their families.

The production and manufacture of dairy products was studied. Neuf-

chatel cheese as a dairy product was introduced in the county and became popular and the diet of club members.

Remarkable improvement was made in case of many pantries that until this year had been little more than corners to store food, club members declared.

Mrs. Mike Benson of Cotton Center told of how other members of the family became interested in pantry improvement when they were called upon to visit the cellar which had been used for canned food storage. "One morning my husband went into the cellar for food. He was gone so long a time that I went to investigate. When I reached the cellar, Mr. Benson was killing rats and water dogs furiously." Mrs. Benson said that following the incident her husband remarked, "It's time we fixed that cellar pestproof and convenient." Improvements were made forthwith, at a cost of \$4.40 and a certain amount of labor. Mrs. Benson said she had canned 678 quarts of fruits and vegetables, several bushels of apples and potatoes and several hundred pounds of cured meats and poultry produce.

There are eight home demonstration clubs in Hale county, with a membership of 123 women. Club members declare it is almost impossible to estimate the value of foods they have stored and canned this year in connection with club work and under supervision of A. & M. college representatives, and that the knowledge of proper dieting and preparation is indeed inestimable. Home Improvement Stressed

During the past twelve months 123 Hale county homes have been made more liveable and more beautiful thru the program of women's home demonstration club work.

Striving to improve the homes from the standpoint of comfort, convenience, cleanliness and charm, 123 women co-operated in the program of improvement of interior of homes to as near as possible perfect the five requirements of bathing, dressing, storage, study and rest as related to bedrooms, the feature of the home which Hale county women were especially interested in.

Starting in January, 1937, the 123 Hale county home demonstration club women cooperated continuously in the 12-months program. At the end of the year, 123 homes have profited by the efforts of the cooperators. A total of \$977.44 was spent on improvements of bedrooms, by far most of the improvement being represented in planning and work.

An expenditure of \$12.90 by Mrs. Paul Hammer, 24 miles west of Plainview, resulted in the creation of a beautiful, modern furnished bedroom. Mrs. Hammer, at a cost of \$1.55 for materials made an easy chair for her bedroom, a lamp made from a bottle cost 25c, and other items in proportion. The biggest item of cost was for materials in making a candlewick bedspread to add to the finishing touch of charm to the bedroom which at the start of improvement was crowded with a lot of useless furniture and two beds.

Mrs. A. E. Johnson, 7 miles northwest of Plainview, modernized her bedroom at a cost of 16.70, refinishing the woodwork and floor, adding new curtains, securing new slats for the bed, making a cover for the mattress and spring covers, and other items. Harmony of wallpaper and furnishings gave the bedroom an air

of charm and rearrangement provides convenience.

At a cost of \$7 Mrs. W. S. Noel, 6 miles southeast of Plainview, revolutionized the appearance of her bedroom. The biggest item of cost was \$3.11 for wall paper. Varsish brushes, enamel and upholstering for a chair were among other items. "My rocker was a hard looking chair," Mrs. Noel said. "When I finished it, I could hardly believe my own eyes, for the improvement changed the appearance so much." The cost was 69c. Mrs. Noel made the improvements in addition to caring for a family of ten.

Mrs. J. P. McGarr, 7 miles south of Plainview, spent \$28.30 improving her bedroom. Addition of a clothes closet, which Mrs. McGarr built herself, was among the larger items of cost. Two wool blankets to complete the bed accessories were the largest cost. Difficult features of a slanting ceiling and rough floors was overcome with appropriate wall paper and combination of rugs and linoleum paneling.

During the year thirty demonstrations of bedroom improvements were directed by the county home demonstration agent. Demonstrations dealt with furniture arrangement, dressing centers, bedroom accessories, refinishing furniture, dresser scarfs and upholstering.

Miss Huffaker, home demonstration agent, said that she considered the fact that the membership of Hale county home demonstration clubs participated 100 percent in bedroom improvement was significant. Of the 123 members all improved bedrooms to the extent that as many homes were materially, as well as artistically improved.
