Bank Statement Shows Slump In Deposits

The official statement of financial condition of First State bank at the corresponding period last year gave the deposits as \$328,303.58. In the statement published in this Review, deposits are reported as being \$270,579.67, a decrease of \$57,723.91.

Resources and liabilities totals for last year's report were \$409,180.94 compared with \$356,935.91 totals for the current statement. This is a decrease of \$52,245.03.

Class B League Activity To Be At Abernathy

Class B and rural school Inter-scholastic contests will be held separately this year, the county league executive committee voted last Saturday in a session in Plainview. Postal Receipts \$600 Higher In 1938

Postmaster George W. Ragland announces another increase in postal receipts for 1938. Receipts for last year totaled \$4,961.66 compared with \$4,361.86 for 1937. This is an increase of \$599.80.

Receipts for the last quarter in 1938 were \$1,478.30, and in the final period in 1937 they totaled \$1,451.39, a difference of \$26.91.

MARRIAGE LICENSES DROPPED LAST YEAR

License to wed was issued to 209 couples during 1938, 55 less than 1937, records at the office of Miss Inez Ott, county clerk, show. During 1937 265 licenses were issued. The 1937 number showed a gain of 50 over that for 1936 when 215 marriage licenses were issued.

Rain Boosts Crop Prospects

Caliche Paving, Sewer Projects Discussed By City

In a regular monthly meeting Monday night the city council discussed a caliche paving project which has tentatively been approved by PWA, pending future allotment of public works funds. The city sewer project application is still in the PWA office.

The caliche project calls for paving post office street from the highway east to Abernathy Motor Co. and from there to the depot a 50-foot width of caliche, from Abernathy Motor Co. north to Hazel blacksmith shop and west to the highway, two blocks of 50-foot wide paving, from highway to corner by Delmar hotel, from highway to school building.

Also included in that project application was an extension of water mains to the gins and elevators.

The city purchased three acres of land from Kenny Rankin in the southeast part of town. Consideration was \$150. A caliche pit will be dug on the acreage if the project is granted.

Condition of Noel Johnson, Abernathy High school Junior and son of Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Johnson, was said to be critical at press time Wednesday. He is under treatment in a Lubbock sanitarium for pneumonia and an attack of appendicitis.

The first January rain here in many years Saturday night and Sunday brought broad grins to the faces of farmers and much needed moisture to young wheat. The small blades have been struggling to remain alive and green through several months of dry weather during the fall and early winter months. Although some of the wheat did not survive the drouth, farmers believe the rain will bring most of it out and start it growing.

The fall was general over a large area and in this territory it measured 2 5-8 inches, said W. A. Goeth. He has a rain gauge on his farm about 2 1-4 miles west of town.

The earth has sufficient moisture to start row crop farmers preparing land for the 1939 cotton and grain sorghum crops.

Several garages, outbuildings and signs were torn down by the wind last Saturday night. Weldon Crow's 1937 Ford sedan was slightly damaged when the garage it occupied fell in on it during the wind.

More moisture came Tuesday night and Wednesday morning when the territory was covered with a blanket of "wet" snow.

AGED CAUTIONED ABOUT OUTSIDE AID FOR PENSIONS

People eligible for old age assistance in Hale County are receiving letters from the Texas Pension Union, Capitol Station, Austin, asking if they have received a full pension of \$30 and intimating that for a \$1 investment they will reap great benefits through the organization.

Fearing that some of the Hale County pension eligibles may be misled by this or similar agencies, Joe Owens, manager of the Plainview old age assistance commission office, makes the following statement:

"The contribution of money to such unofficial agencies will not help eli-

"So far as administering the present law is concerned, no outside agency or individual can help any aged person in any way, either as to getting on, staying on or in the amount of the assistance."

Representative A. B. Tarwater said that at the forthcoming session of the legislature he was going to ask a thorough investigation of all agencies purporting to extend aid in the securing or enlarging of pensions. "Any agency that is not set up to exploit the interests of the people and is purely a selfish agency should be dealt with severely," Mr. Tarwater said.

The address of the above agency is confusing to many of the aged as they associate it with the Texas Old Age Commission, Owens stated. The organization has twice been denied a charter by the state of Texas and now has another application pending, according to its own statement.
