County ASCS Office. The delegates also selected Manford Reid and A. R. Eaton as chairman and member of the three-member county committee, and named Colen Hammer and Leon Burson as first and second alternate committeemen. The County ASC Committee is responsible for local administration of Government farm programs such as acreage alletments and bases, price sup-

servation cost-sharing on agricultural lands. The vacancies were filled and the county ASC Committee officers named by delegates who are newly-elected ASC Community Committeemen. Community committees assist the County Committee in farm program administration and help keep farmers informed of program provisions.

## **Chaplain Barnett Retires From** Military Service; Awarded Medal

(Colonel) Robert Chaplain Barnett, after completing 25 years in the Army, has retired at Fort Hood, Texas where he was Post Chaplain. He was awanded the Meritorious Service Medal, and was presented a retirement Certificate of Appreelation from General West-morland, and a Soldier of God Citation by the III Corps Chaplain

Chaplain Barnett entered the Army in 1942 while Pastor of Pinkerton Baptist Churc's. He was one of two 30th Infantry Division Chaplains who hitchhiked from the 9th Replacement Depot in England through Holland and France to the World War II front lines without using normal replacement chanrels. It took them two weeks, After a few incidents in the front lines and incoming artillery, he wondered why he was so anxious to get there.

In 1946 Chaplain Barnett left the Army to finish his Seminary degree and was again pastor at Pinkerton. He re-entered the Army in 1948. He served in the 30th Infantry Division, 101st Airberne Division, 71st Infantry Division. 4th and 5th Infantry Division, and III Corps.

During the Berlin Airlift, he served with the 1st Infantry Division in Berlin. He served in three Infantry Basic Training Divisions, and was the Training Division Chaplain at Fort Ben- ice. ning. Georgia before coming to Fort Hood, Texas. While serving at Fort Lewis, Washington in 1957 he was nominated for the award of "Chaplain of the Year.'

He has served over 10 years in Europe and the Far East and other places on overseas tours. Besides the awards mentioned above, he was awarded four battle stars from the 30th Infantry Division and the Bronze Star Medal from World War II. has been awarded three He Army Commendation Medals, and numerous citations in letters of Commendations and Appreciation from his command-

Q) I'm hoping to get a partme job after school this fall. it true there's a form I can Il out to stop taxes from beig taken out of my pay?

A) Yes, you may avoid havig Federal income tax witheld from your pay if certain inditions are met and you ive your employer a Form W-E. Social Security taxes will ontinue to be withheld, how-

To avoid Federal income tax ithholding you must have had a tax liability last year and spect none this year. Under he new tax law, you can earn p to \$1,725 before you will owe ay tax

If you meet these conditions, sk your employer for a Form '-4E. It will authorize him to op Federal income tax witholding on your wages.

Q) Are you allowed any creit or deduction for foreign inme taxes paid while working

Cancelled checks, receipts and similar records are most helpful in establishing the nature, date and amount of the expense clauned. Taxpayers who keep adequate records have little trouble when their return is examined.

Q) After my father died, my sister and I began supporting eur mother. Can we both claim her as our dependent?

## **Proofs At Hand** Can Speed SS Dollars To You

Are you getting ready to retire?

If so, Wayne Baker, social se curity field representative who visits Haskell, has some tips to save you time and trouble!

A telephone call to the social security office (915-677-5262) is a good first step. The office can answer your questions and tell you have to apply and when to do it. In some cases they can call you back and complete the application by phone and mail it out to you for signature. Otherwise they'll tell you when and where to meet him.

Have your social security card or a record of your social security number, some proof of your age, and your last year's ire me tax return if self-employed or withholding statement if an employee-

If your wife also applies, she will need evidence of her age and her social security number if she has one.

The best evidence of age is birth or baptismal certificate B. made at or near the time of your birth. However, if neither exists, other documents may be used. Generally, the older the document the better.

If you have children under 18 or between 18 and 22 who are fulltime students - have their birth certificates and records of their social security numbers, if any, available. to the Center room, courthouse.

It's generally a good idea to apply about 3 months before you retire. Don't delay because you don't have any of the required documents or information. The people in the social security office will be glad to help you get the necessary information.






