

# All About Nothin'

In the following article Ray Pinson, local druggist and Abernathy's director in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, answers my proposal in last week's column that Abernathy not pay its dues to the WTCC next year.

Dear Mr. Editor:

May 1 in a friendly, constructive way take issue with you on article of last week, appearing in your column—"NOTHING ABOUT ALL." Wherein you expressed the opinion that Abernathy is not receiving ample benefit back from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce on the basis of dollar for dollar invested; therefore you propose in the future for Abernathy to cold shoulder the WTCC by refusing to pay our prorata quota which in most years is approximately fifty dollars.

I think the viewpoint expressed in this article—coming from any citizen would be alarming and tragic—more especially from the editor of the home town paper.

In the first place the West Texas C of C is not an organization, privately owned and operated. One in which towns buy stock in with their yearly dues and expect back enumerated benefits in proportion to the stock value they have bought in the organization.

To some extent the very opposite of this is correct, when we realize that the WTCC has no source no existence no affiliations, only in so far as are made possible through the efforts of the people of West Texas. The WTCC is a joint organization comprising 126 counties and 191 affiliated, separate towns. This area represents a vast Empire larger than the combined New England States.

It is cooperatively owned and operated by these towns—and was organized twenty years ago. Its organization grew out of a pressing need of this vast territory—(practically undeveloped—full of raw materials and running over with potential possibilities) for leadership,—unselfish leadership, in which the territory benefitted even before the towns.

In these twenty years the West Texas Chamber of Commerce through its various channels: worked long and hard, and with only one thought in mind; that of furthering the best interest of West Texas.

It would be futile for me to try in this article to give all the things that have been done or attempted to be done. Most of them are an open book in the public's mind. To mention a few outstanding objectives: The WTCC went on record among the first meeting pointing out the need for the establishment in West Texas of an A & M college; Texas Tech is in a large manner the product of this effort. It has continued the fight to have Texas redistricted so that West Texas would have more equitable representation in Government. It is leading in the fight to have state school funds apportioned on the basis of actual school attendance, rather than the present plan of on scholastic census;—in this way save to West Texas, (who has a high percentage attendance record), thousands of dollars that are now going to East and South Texas, both with a high total population of negroes and Mexicans, a large portion of which never attend school.

West Texas has already struggled for existence under the highest bracket of freight rates in the nation. We have always accepted this penalty, just because we were "Out West." The WTCC thinks the time has come when something should be done to ward seeing that this freight structure is leveled off in a more just way to this section, so today they are leading the fight in this direction.

If the West Texas C of C has ever accomplished anything, these results have been one of cooperation and if they continue to do things for West Texas it will again come only through complete cooperation of all the towns that comprise this, our home area.

Of course, with reference to Abernathy pulling off from this organization another year, that is our privilege—no town is forced to join, pay, or do anything they do not choose to do. It is our personal choice if we want to dig our heels in the ground and pull back, while our neighbor towns are doing something for a common cause, out of which we all benefit. This choice is up to the people—but in the past I know that the citizenry of ABERNATHY have been made out of a different grade of material,—and you can't make me believe that they are now changed.

Again with reference to your statement that this money could best be used for charity at home. I maintain that there is still money enough left in Abernathy for both. Mr. Editor, I recognized you as Ambassador and

Hale County's grasshopper control committee has laid battle plans for an extensive war on grasshoppers in the west and northwest part of Hale County. The committee is composed of: Clayton Lewellen, chairman, Fred Lowe and R. E. Wilson.

Two mechanical grasshopper spreaders have been constructed by the Hale County Commissioner's Court at a cost of \$28.40 each. In order to get this program started, a demonstration on poisoning grasshoppers was given on the farm of Clayton Lewellen last Thursday. At this demonstration a 40 acre pasture was thoroughly poisoned to eradicate grasshoppers. Mr. Lewellen used 800 pounds of poison, which was put out by the mechanical spreader pulled by his truck. H. L. Clearman, district entomologist in grasshopper control work, made a talk at this demonstration and explained the importance of poisoning these 'hoppers while they are small.

The spreaders are now in use in the northwest part of the County by farmers in spreading poison bran mash where the heaviest infestation of the 'hoppers have shown up. It is recommended by county agent, C. B. Martin, that farmers in poisoning grasshoppers should use approximately 20 pounds of mixture per acre. The poison bait is being mixed and put in the hands of farmers at 10c per hundred pounds; 5c to pay for the sack that the poison is sacked in and 5c for additional miscellaneous charges.

County Agent Martin urges that all farmers in Hale County examine their pasture land very carefully in turning rows to determine grasshopper infestation. Where these hoppers show up in numbers the farmers should get busy as soon as possible and poison them before they grow wings and fly away. Martin stated it took from six to eight weeks to grow wings and after that time it is more difficult and more expensive to poison the 'hoppers.

Lewellen, chairman of the grasshopper control committee, urges that all farmers, especially in the northwest part of this county, cooperate with the county agent and the grasshopper committee, in exterminating this pest. Lewellen states that the Federal government is furnishing practically all of the poison this time. The appropriation for this expense will not last through the growing season and for that reason farmers are urged to take advantage and poison their hoppers while it can be done at nominal cost.

## Hale Center Youth Is Wood Craftsman

HALE CENTER, May 4.—From an interest kindled in a manual training class of a small rural school, Howard Springer, 18-year-old Mayfield boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred H. Springer, has developed a hobby that is fast becoming profitable, and is winning him a reputation for producing beautiful furniture as fine as any purchased in the biggest home furnishing stores.

With only a handful of tools, and those, at best, just the ordinary kind found in any farmer's shop, he fashions kitchen cabinets, ironing boards, utility cabinets, tables and odd pieces that are both useful and add charm to a home.

He first became interested in doing woodwork back in 1934 under the instruction of J. L. Hood, then principal of Mayfield's two teacher school, nine miles northwest of here. With Howard were nine other youngsters in this experimental class of Hood's, pupils from the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

He first discovered his hobby of being particular with a plane and paint brush would mean dollars in his pocket when he made an end table and typewriter stand for J. D. Worley of Plainview. Since then he has made four kitchen cabinets, three of them of the moveable type, and the fourth, a huge built in job for Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Harrel of Mayfield, which has just been installed. Two of the cabinets he made were for newlywed couples, several months ago. They were Mr. and Mrs. Frank E. Young of Weatherford and Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Young of Hale Center. The other one was made for his mother.

Among folks who have bought pieces of Howard's handiwork are: Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Laney of Mayfield, a large built-in bathroom linen closet; Mr. and Mrs. Harry Mills of Edgar, Nebraska, serving table, Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Boston, Tipton, Okla.,

serving table and radio cabinet; Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Dent, Hale Center, large portable clothes and linen closet; Mrs. Ola Legg, Plainview, two footstools; and C. V. Springer, Hale Center, breakfast table.

Exhaustive patience and long hours go into every article he makes. He works both day and night, using a lantern in his workshop when the sun goes down. The glass-like finish he paints on his furniture reflects the long hours spent with his brush. He figures varnish is not thoroughly dry for at least a month. He puts on four coats in four months on most of the furniture he builds. However, such a long period of time does no matter to him so long as his work is perfection when completed, he says.

Springer departs from set rules in designing some of the pieces he builds. He incorporates original ideas in his carpenter-cabinet making.

Each piece of wood he used in cabinet drawers, top or doors is selected with the care of a master craftsman. Every nail or cleat is put in with exactness. But, when the article is finished, both the buyer and maker are completely satisfied.

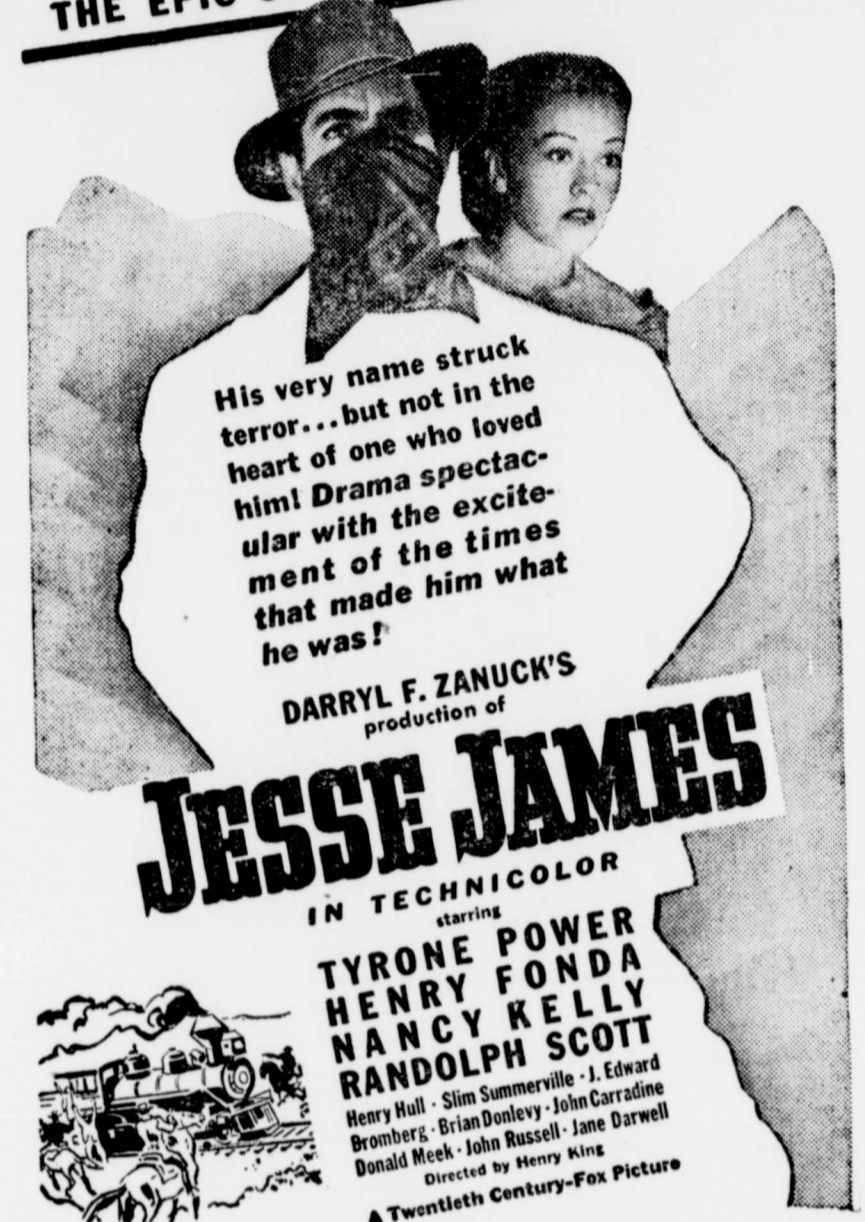
