Lakeview, nine-grade school nine miles northeast of Abernathy, will open the 1939-1940 schoolastic year with a two-hour program starting at 9 o'clock Monday morning, said Glenn Harrison, one of the two new teachers there. ## Darden Has First Bale of Cotton

Will Darden, farmer about four miles west of town, brought the first bale of 1939 cotton to Abernathy Wednesday. Hot, dry weather has opened cotton in advance of the expected starting time and local gins were not ready early this week to start operation. The bale, weighing 1,960 pounds in the bur, was stored in the seed cotton house at Farmers' Co-op gin.

Gins here probably will start late this week or early next week. Cotton is opening fast and several farmers may start pulling this week.
