Buried Here The 1,500 pounds of seed cotton yielded 535 pounds of lint and 735 puonds of seed. Grading strict middling, the Paymaster cotton staple was 31-32.

West's farm is in the Paymaster one-variety block of about 5,000 acres which was organized last spring by Fortenberry.

The first bale was fully matured cotton which opened under natural conditions.

West is a state certified seed breeder and he has fine crops on his section of irrigated land. Samples of his good feed crop are displayed in the office of Fortenberry's gin.
