Heart Attack Fatal For "Uncle Ed" Bynum Heart attack at about 6:20 a. m.

Monday was fatal for "Uncle Ed" Bynum, 77. His nephew, L. C. (Kay) Ferguson, with whom he had made his home since 1929, heard his voice

and went to Mr. Bynum's room. "When I got to the door," Ferguson related, "Uncle Ed said, 'well I'm dying,' and he lived only a few minutes after that statement." Bynum was just rising and had his shirt on and his trousers partly on when the attack came. After he told his ne-

phew he was dying, "Uncle Ed" said several other words. He told Arthur Crow, a neighbor who had been sum-

moned to help, that he was not suffering. Ferguson went for the doctor, but Bynum had passed on before they returned. He lived an estimated 15 or 20 minutes after Ferguson went to his room.

Rufus Edward Bynum, known in Abernathy as "Uncle Ed", came here in 1928 from Busque county. He was born March 14, 1862 in Alabama and was reared in that state and in Arkansas where he taught school. He

The three gins at Monroe this week topped the thousand mark, reporting 1,133 bales of cotton turned out to sell for around 8.45c to 8.95c and \$28, it was reported.

FIRST BALE OF STAPLE COTTON IN LUBBOCK COUNTY **GROWN BY WEST**

The first bale ginned at Monroe was the first bale of staple cotton for the 1939 season in Lubbock county. The bale, of strict middling 31-32nds inch staple was grown by J. R. West who lives 4 miles east of Monroe and was ginned September 1st at one of the Automatic gin plants of the Fortenberry gins at Monroe.

This was the earliest bale of staple cotton ever ginned in Lubbock County according to available records. The cotton was of the Paymaster variety, an early maturing cotton noted for productivity and superior staple. The Paymaster seed planted by West was grown by Lockview Farms of Plainview.

Five shots from nightwatchman O. Rutledge's revolver roused many sleepers and adequate help was at the scene within a few minutes after the first report.

Mrs. J. C. Hurst, who aided Mrs. Jones in telephoning for help estimated the time from the first call to the time the blaze was brought under control to be about 30 minutes.

Members of the volunteer fire department in action and others who assisted were complimented for their work in saving as much as they did. It was the first time the new fire truck and equipment had been used since its purchase this summer.

Many were kept busy protecting other homes near the fire. Wind carried burning shingles as far as three and a half blocks northeast and east of the scene.

It was Abernathy's first fire since Anderson Bros. Mill & Elevator burned to the ground Sept. 1, 1938.
