## WPA Grant Opens Work on Road By Tuco; Is State Highway No. 287

Announcement last week of a grant of \$12,355 from the Works Progress Administration (WPA) to Hale county precinct 3 for road improvement was hailed by South Hale county citizens as another feather in their cap for an improved East-West route in their territory. Coupled with \$8,341 to be added to the WPA grant by sponsors of the project, the money will aid greatly in the development of the route.

Commissioner L. M. Rankin of this city said the money would be used to widen, improve drainage and strengthen the roadbed of the route which now runs by Tuco west through Eagle Springs community. "That road is a part of a state highway, designated as No. 287, which begins in Bailey county, goes east through Lamb county, touching Littlefield and south of Spade, on east through Hale county by Eagle Springs, Tuco, Petersburg, and from there to Slaton, or to Floydada." In time this route may be hardsurfaced, as considerable traffic out of New Mexico, Bailey and Lamb counties goes eastward to Fort Worth and Dallas, and this through route saves a dip south through Lubbock, or a wide jump north through Plainview.

Rankin said that his full crew of WPA workers in this precinct started work Monday morning on improving the Eagle Springs road, and that all Abernathy and Hale Center men would be included. (This route was improved once before with a farm-to-market grant, in 1938.)

## Announcing . . .

**B. M. TALIAFERRO ANNOUNCES FOR OFFICE OF COUNTY COMMISSIONER**

B. M. Taliaferro, long time resident of the Abernathy area, this week authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the office of Hale County Commissioner in Precinct 3. He has been a resident of Hale county since 1915, and has a wide acquaintance of friends all over the county, as well as in this precinct. He has engaged in farming for most of this time, and has had considerable experience in meeting the public and dealing with them. At present Mr. Taliaferro is residing a mile west and three miles north of Hale Center.

In his statement to this newspaper, Mr. Taliaferro said "I believe in treating every man alike, and in giving a square deal to every part of the precinct. I'm not experienced in making friends and keeping friends by treating them fair at all times."

He also stated "In regard to WPA work for our precinct, I believe these federal funds could be put to much better use than they are now. I do not favor making the WPA jobs last too long just to keep the pay checks coming, but for economy's sake I think the WPA money should be spent more wisely and for more permanent benefit. As it is now, the WPA money is taking family men off the farm, and I think it should be the other way. I think we should not encourage men to work on WPA, but should encourage them to stay off relief and get back on the farm."

He further said: "I welcome investigation of my qualifications to this office, and will appreciate the votes and influence of all my friends. I intend to visit with every voter, if possible, sometime before the elections, and will welcome the advice and discussion of all persons interested in improving the service of our county commissioner's office."

"Another matter I would like to call to the attention of our voters is that I do not believe a public official should hold his office for more than two terms. In our Democratic system, we should pass the duties or public service around to other capable men every so often. I also intend to give my full time to this work if elected."

Mr. Taliaferro concluded his announcement with the statement that "I will make only one promise, and that is I will be honest in this office, and I will be honest when my service is completed."

## Gilliland Heads New Club Of Farmers And Merchants

**HILBURN BARRICK NAMED SECRETARY OF GROUP FORMED TUESDAY NITE**

G. G. Gilliland, farmer northwest of town, Tuesday night was elected president of the new Farmers and Merchants club which was organized during a meeting at the home economics cottage.

The local chamber of commerce was abandoned in favor of the new club which will be affiliated with the Texas Agricultural Association. Members of the Abernathy Agricultural Association, a farm group which is affiliated with the Texas organization, voted to merge with members of the chamber of commerce in forming the new Farmers and Merchants club. Combining the groups will make the new club stronger in its relation to the Texas Agricultural Association.

Hilburn Barrick, youthful farmer northeast of town, who was president of the Abernathy farm group, was named secretary of the new club and Dan Z. Ward, president of the old chamber of commerce body, was elected vice president of the Farmers and Merchants organization.

Directors elected were D. O. Williams, farmer of near County Line, W. A. Richter, Arno Struve, R. T. Price and Marshall Rhew.

## Orchestra Plays

The meeting was opened with several numbers by the high school orchestra directed by Miss Bernice Heggen. ## Committee Named

Business men retired from the room and farmers discussed the advisability of combining the two groups. Their vote favored the action and a resolutions committee composed of Barrick, Gilliland, Arno Struve, Frank Roberts and Ray Pinson was appointed.

Among resolutions they drew up and reported back to the body were the following:

"In view of the fact that it is a consensus of opinion in both clubs, the Abernathy Agricultural Association and the chamber of commerce, that more constructive work could be accomplished for our entire community if the two clubs were combined and the name changed to Farmers and Merchants club."

The body adopted the changing of the name and the resolution making the free show a separate enterprise, financed entirely by the merchants.

Korner**

If you have a beef roast for Sunday's dinner, will the family be eating beef roast—without any trimmings—for the next few meals?

One good rule for a person who aspires to the role of an excellent cook: Never serve the same thing in the same form two days in succession. Use your imagination! Disguise the product so the folks will never guess that this is "the same old roast." Suppose you have so much roast left over you don't know what to do! What will you do? Try a juicy meat pie on Monday. Cut up the roast in fine pieces—the amount depending on the number in your family, of course. Cut fine an onion or two and cook in the frying pan with sufficient grease. When onion is about half done, add the meat and any left-over gravy. Add carrots and

peas if you have those left-over. Potatoes can also be added. Chopped celery gives a delicious flavor too. Simmer for a few minutes while you make this pastry:

**Meat Pie Pastry**  
1-4 cups flour, sifted  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
7 tablespoons shortening  
3 1-2 tablespoons cold water  
Add half the shortening to the flour and salt. Cut in until mixture is very fine. Add remaining shortening. Sprinkle water over mixture. Work into dough.

Put the meat in a greased pie pan. Cover with the pastry. Bake in hot oven for 30 minutes.

Now is beef still left over? If so, this time try creamed beef in patty shells or tart shells. Have the pastry shells already made. Chop up some pimento and add. Green pepper or celery, though optional, adds a distinct flavor. Add necessary salt, of course. When this is thoroughly heated and has cooked enough to blend all the flavors, pour into the tart shells and serve. A garnish of pimento strips is attractive. Place across the top of the shells.

If you still have beef, it must have been an unusually large roast! Try a hot beef sandwich for supper. Toast the bread on one side, each piece.

Heat thin slices of beef with any gravy you had left from cooking it. Perhaps you'll need to add a little water. Chop the rest of the beef in small pieces; let simmer with the other mixture. You might want to add onion, chopped very fine, or onion salt. If the gravy needs thickening, add a bit of flour, thoroughly made into a paste with water. Add a bit of dry mustard and Worcestershire sauce if you have them. Spread the untoasted sides of the bread with butter or mayonnaise. Place the thin slices of beef on these sides. Top with the other pieces, toasted side up. Pour the hot gravy with finely chopped pieces over the whole sandwich. It's a wonderful dish!
