The Tire Industry Safety Council recommends that tire pressures should be checked at least once a month, and preferally with the motorist's personal hand gauge as service station air lowers may be inaccurate.

Pressure should be checked when the tires are cool, before starting out on a trip. Make a mental note of how many addinal pounds of air are needed and add them when you get to the service station. For sustained high-speed driving at turnrike speeds, inflation pressure should be increased 4 lbs. per square inch over normal reccommended pressures.



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
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
