Colorful Parade Opens Rodeo Thursday

Becky Richardson Is Frontier Queen

The Frontier Days Queen contest unfolded at a fast pace Tuesday and ended with the crowning of Mrs. A. C. (Becky) Richardson as Haskell's 1971 queen, by Mrs. H. O. (Sue) Abbott, reigning 1970 Queen.

The Scarleteens, Haskell's own group of pretty misses, sang songs of the era, accompanied at the piano by their sponsor, Mrs. Sonny Everett.

Rex Felker narrated a background of Haskell's beginnings while historical figures of the past crossed the stage at the Texas Theatre, beginning at 8 p. m. Larry Hartsfield portrayed the Comanche Indian and did a great impromptu rain dance that set the pace for the evening. Next in Haskell's history came the buffalo hunter, portrayed by Snuffy Morales; the cattleman, portrayed by Brooks Middleton; and 'Doc' Holliday by Charles Thornhill; General Robert E. There is an old saying which proclaims that "everybody loves a parade." If that be true, then, EVERYBODY should make definite plans to be in Haskell not later than 5 p. m., Thursday, May 20. That is the time set for the kickoff of Frontier Days' Parade, which promises to be one of the most colorful and entertaining that local folks have had the privilege of witnessing in many a year.

Led by the classy Haskell High School Band under the direction of Wendell Gideon, the parade will feature music that will provide a holiday atmosphere for the entries as well as for the spectators who are expected to line the streets of the business district. But not to be outdone by their older brothers

and sisters, the Junior High Band will be present to take their own place in the spotlight and to play their own arrangements of parade music.

Other bands are expected to be present to march in the parade but there is no question that lots of good music to provide a background for the entire length of the parade will be available.

Information has just been received from the S&M Music Company in Abilene that they are planning a most unique concert beginning approximately at 2 p. m. Thursday on the covered stage on the courthouse square. At this time an organ artist will play numerous numbers on a Piper Auto-Chord, which is classified as a fun type form of music. He will also furnish background music for the parade at intervals where the instrumental bands are not passing in review. Organs and pianos for the entire Frontier Days Program are being furnished through the courtesy of the S&M Music Company of Abilene.

At least ten visiting riding clubs and sheriff's posses that are the most outstanding riding organizations in West Texas will be here to provide a western atmosphere. These will include the Vernon Riding Club, the Olney Boots & Saddle Club, the Quanah Riding Club, the Abilene or Taylor County Riding Club, the Stamford Junior Riding Club, the Fisher County Sheriff's Posse and junior riding club, the Stonevall County Sheriff's Posse and Haskell County's own Sheriff's Posse.

Immediately following the parade, all members of the riding clubs and posses will be the guests of the Chamber of Commerce at an old fashioned chuckwagon supper to be held at the Corral Building on the rodeo grounds. All merchants and individuals are urged to purchase tickets for the chuckwagon supper and to be in attendance to visit with our out-of-town guests.

Several antique automobiles are expected to take their place in the parade for a reminder of how the modern cars have changed since the early days.

Novelty entries will also be prevalent along the parade route with some definitely providing a frontier or pioneer theme that will be most interesting to old and young alike.

Thursday's program is fully loaded with entertainment features that include the parade, the chuckwagon supper, the first performance of the Rice Springs Rodeo under auspices of the Haskell Jaycees and the Campbell and Cordell Rodeo Co. of Childress, Texas, and the rodeo dance at the Corral Building, sponsored by the American Legion.

Parade chairmen are C. O. Holt, who has had a great deal of experience in parades, and Ned Phillips, parade chairman for the Haskell Jaycees.

Newspaper Costs Soar With New Postage Rate

Newspaper and magazine publishers lost their battle with Postal service this week when, according to a story in the Dallas Morning News, the Supreme Court refused Saturday to block postal rate increases which went into effect Sunday, May 16th.

After losing in two lower courts, publishers turned to the high court Saturday, arguing that the rates were set illegally and would cost newspapers and magazines a total of \$850,000 a week.

But Chief Justice Warren E. Burger denied the appeal for emergency relief, giving no reason. This opened the way for the rates to become effective a minute after midnight last Sunday.

Second-class postage, which newspapers come under is marked for a 142% increase in the Postal Service's permanent rate package. The increase would be implemented over a 5-year period, making the first

It's "A-Okay" At Courthouse After Election!

Everything's "A-Okay" at the county courthouse in Haskell—and with a majority of those voting—since the election last Tuesday. Results mean that Haskell County will continue to have both a sheriff and tax assessor-collector.

Voters in the special election went to the polls Tuesday and voted in favor of the offices almost 3 to 1. The vote count was 698 for and 237 against keeping these offices as they are.

The election was required by state law, since Haskell County's population had fallen below 10,000 in the last census.

If the outcome had been reversed, Sheriff Garth Garrett would have assumed the duties of tax assessor-collector, in addition to those of sheriff.

Time To Spray Pecan Trees For Nut Casebearer

The time for controlling the pecan nut casebearer in Haskell County has been set as May 25-28.

These dates were determined by observing pecan nut casebearer moth emergence from pupae collections. The optimum

Information based on the situation as it exists in the orchard where control measures will be applied is the most reliable. The application of insecticide should be made after small greenish white to brown eggs are found on the end of the nutlets and when the first nutlets are found to have an entrance hole at the base.

The insecticides that can be used for control of casebearers are Malathion, Guthion, Thiodan and Toxaphene. Use these materials according to directions given on the label of the container.

If egg laying continues for four or five days after the first application, a second application should be applied 7 to 10 days later.

Further information concerning the pecan nut casebearer and its control is available at your County Agricultural Agent's office.

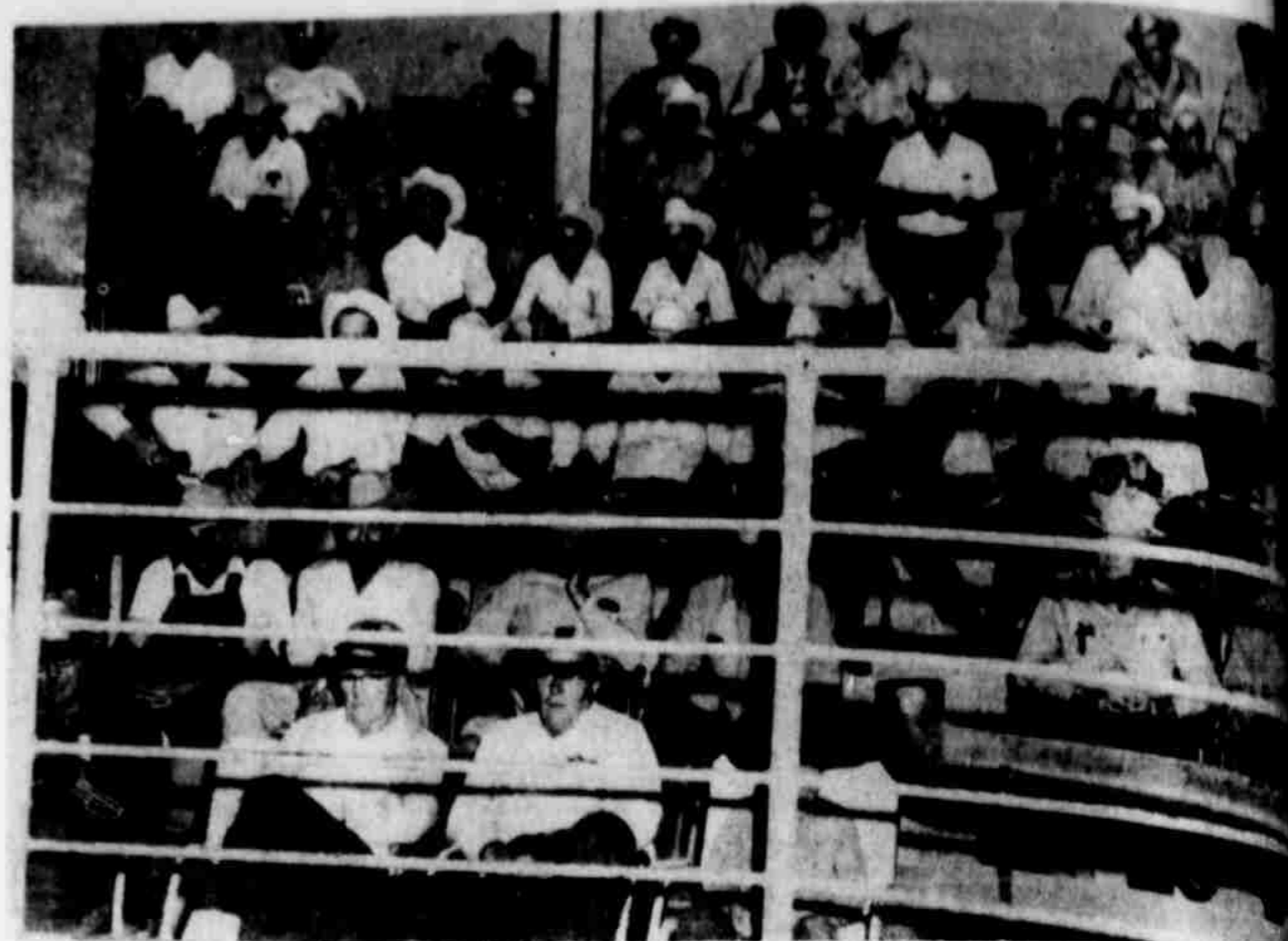
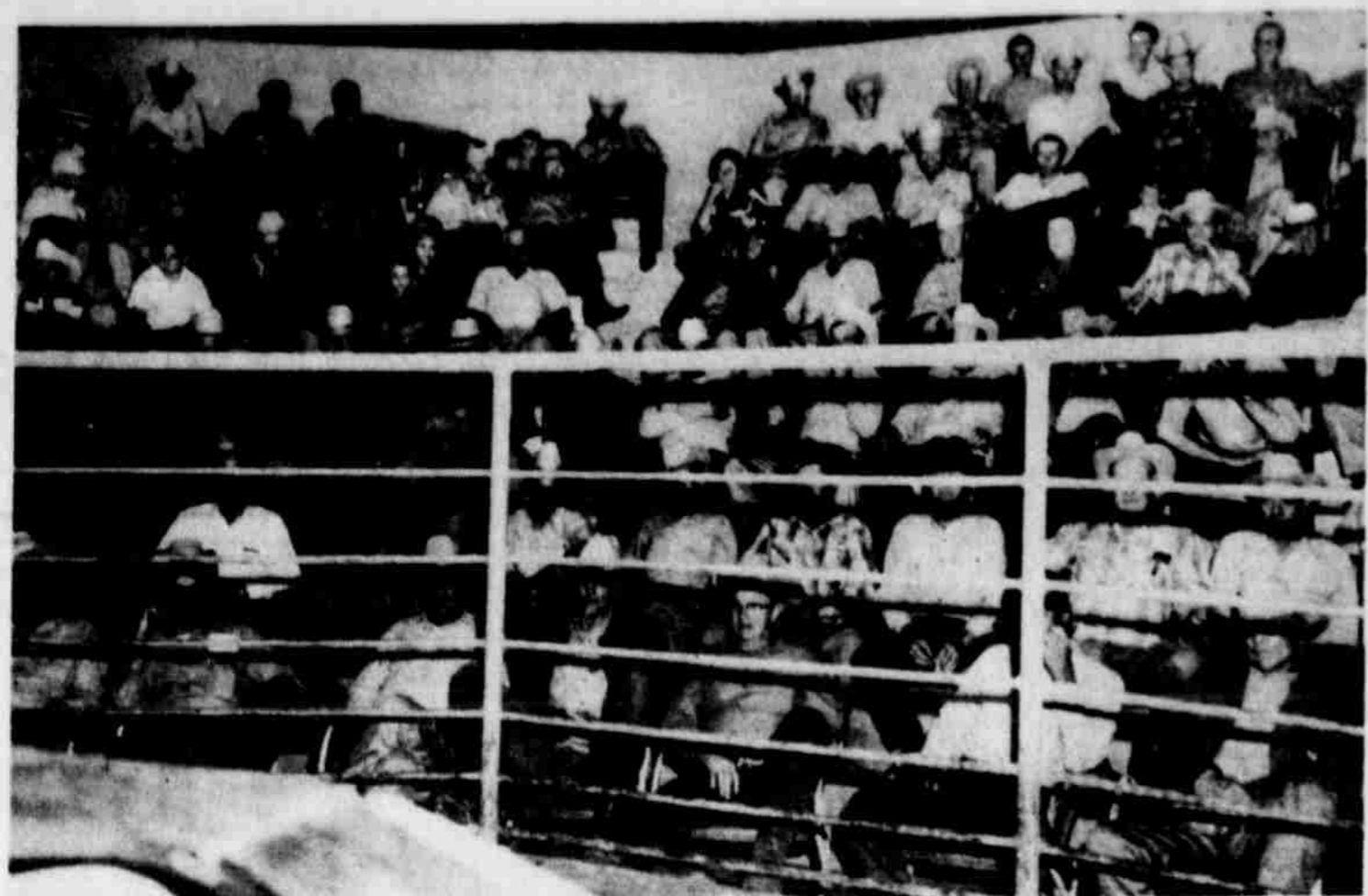

Withholding is also lower for single persons because tax rates for this group were reduced. B) But for some, withholding won't cover this year's liability; and underwithholding could result for those earning over \$11,500. C) If your present withholding won't cover this year's liability, you can avoid owing money next April by dropping exemptions now or, if you are already claiming no exemptions, by asking your employer to withhold an additional amount. D) My income is low, and I never pay any tax although I file every year to obtain a refund. Is there anything I can do to stop my employer from withholding taxes? A) Yes. You should file a Form W-4E with your employer. This is a "Withholding Exemption Certificate" in which you can certify that you did not have any tax liability last year and will not have any income tax this year. Your employer must then stop withholding taxes. Q) How long must I keep my records for income tax purposes? A) You must keep your records as long as their contents may be material in administering any Internal Revenue law. The Internal Revenue Service cannot suggest a specific time, but certainly all records should be kept for at least three years and many records, such as stock and property transactions, even longer. Q) I am retired with a company pension and an annuity. Can I have tax withheld on these payments? A) Yes. You may use Form W-4P to request the payer to withhold any whole dollar amount. However, the amount to be withheld must be at least \$5 a month and must not reduce the net pension or annuity payment to less than \$10 a month. Q) I have received a gift from the bank because I made a long term deposit. Must I pay taxes on this gift? A) Yes. In general, the fair market value of property received for making a deposit or opening an account in a savings institution is income and must be reported as interest income in the year received. 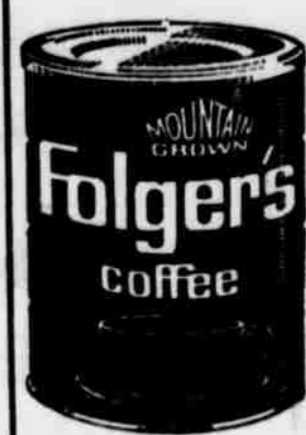

The World And They That Dwell Therein . . .

The following editorial was written by J. C. Yeary, District Conservationist, SCS, California Creek Soil and Water Conservation District.
 The scriptures declare: "The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein."
 More than two thousand years later, we of 1971, can repeat, appropriate of our time and place, that the human race and all other living things are the Lord's as well as the environment which surrounds and sustains us.

President Richard Nixon says, and I quote:
 "At the turn of the century, the chief environmental concern of our country was to preserve what we had. It is out of this concern that the conservation movement was born."
 "Today conservation is more important than ever. But it is no longer enough to merely conserve what we have; we must also restore what we have lost."

"Soil Stewardship Week, May 16-23, 1971, crystallizes the urgency of the work that is before us. I know that it will be observed with the enthusiasm it invokes, and that America will be richer and future generations of our citizens happier because of what we together achieve."

And in accordance with God's will, we are stewards of His creation.
 At the risk of over-simplification, the environmental task facing us ahead can be divided into three parts. First, there is the formidable and vital work of correcting the transgressions of the past, such as cleaning up our lakes and rivers, and abolishing our rural and urban slums. Second, there is the array of assignments and actions necessary to move us deliberately along a broad front toward an enduring and rewarding harmony of man and nature. Third, and probably most difficult of all because of its magnitude, is the change imperative in the attitude of each

and every one of us toward the Lord's earth, the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein. A sustained and prodigious effort will be necessary to stamp out selfish irresponsibility and replace it with a universal and genuine feeling of concern for the community.

Whose environment? The earth is the Lord's, as we know, and as His stewards we are responsible for the condition of the resources in our charge. What you and I are willing to do in fulfillment of this responsibility will help determine the state of our environment, for better or worse. It may even influence whether we will have, in the end, a new world or no world.

The environment is not a lofty generality, distant and unreal. It is your front yard or sidewalk, your road or street, your air and water. It is the character of your town, the location of new housing in your county, and the condition of your parks and lakes.

Anywhere you look and breathe, the environment is yours—not somebody else's.

Experts On Tire Safety Issue Inflation Alert to Texas Drivers

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Tire safety experts today issued their own "inflation alert" to Texas motorists, citing recent studies which show that more than one out of four cars on the highway has at least one seriously underinflated tire.

"Proper inflation is the most important rule in tire safety and mileage," says Ross R. Crmsby, Chairman of the Tire Industry Safety Council. "When tires are underinflated they will 'flex' more, thus causing unwanted heat build-up."

The Council advises motorists that excessive heat is a tire's worst enemy. Flexing, due to underinflation, increases rapidly as speed increases. Running a tire at sustained high speeds under such conditions may raise temperatures above the critical level of about 250 degrees F. (water boils at 212 de-

grees F.), reduce its strength and tread life and increase the risk of sudden tire disabement.

"The problems caused by under inflated tires being run at high speeds for continuous periods should be of special importance to motorists about to embark upon summer vacations," Crmsby noted.

Tire safety experts of the U. S. Department of Commerce's National Bureau of Standards estimated more than one out of every four cars on the road are driving on at least one underinflated tire. When rounded off auto registration figures this would indicate at least 1,272,000 Texas motorists may be extremely careless when it comes to their own safety and that of the other drivers on the road.

The experts say a tire is seriously underinflated if it is 4 lbs. per square inch or more

below the recommended normal inflation pressure for the vehicle. Motorists can determine the proper inflation pressures for the load being carried by referring to their car owner's manual.

The Tire Industry Safety Council recommends that tire pressures should be checked at least once a month, and preferably with the motorist's personal hand gauge as service station air towers may be inaccurate.

Pressure should be checked when the tires are cool, before starting out on a trip. Make a mental note of how many additional pounds of air are needed and add them when you get to the service station. For sustained high-speed driving at turnpike speeds, inflation pressure should be increased 4 lbs. per square inch over normal recommended pressures.

Four Institutes Funded Under EPDA Planned

The Education Service Centers in Regions IX-Wichita Falls, XIV-Abilene, XVI-Amarillo, and XVII-Lubbock, are co-operating to make available needed instruction for teacher aides, special education teachers and kindergarten teachers. Four institutes, funded under EPDA, are planned to begin in the summer, 1971. Teacher aide institutes, to be conducted in Amarillo and Abilene, will have three weeks of intensive training during the summer with in-service follow-up during the 1971-72 school year. conducted during the 1971 school year. Participants selected will receive a stipend of \$75.00 per week for the intensive pre-service training. College credit will also be given for this training.

The institute for kindergarten teachers will be conducted at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls. The intensive pre-service training will continue for five weeks, July 12 through August 13, 1971.

All participants must have a minimum of a high school diploma or GED, and must have been employed as teachers during the previous phase. College credit will also be given for this training.

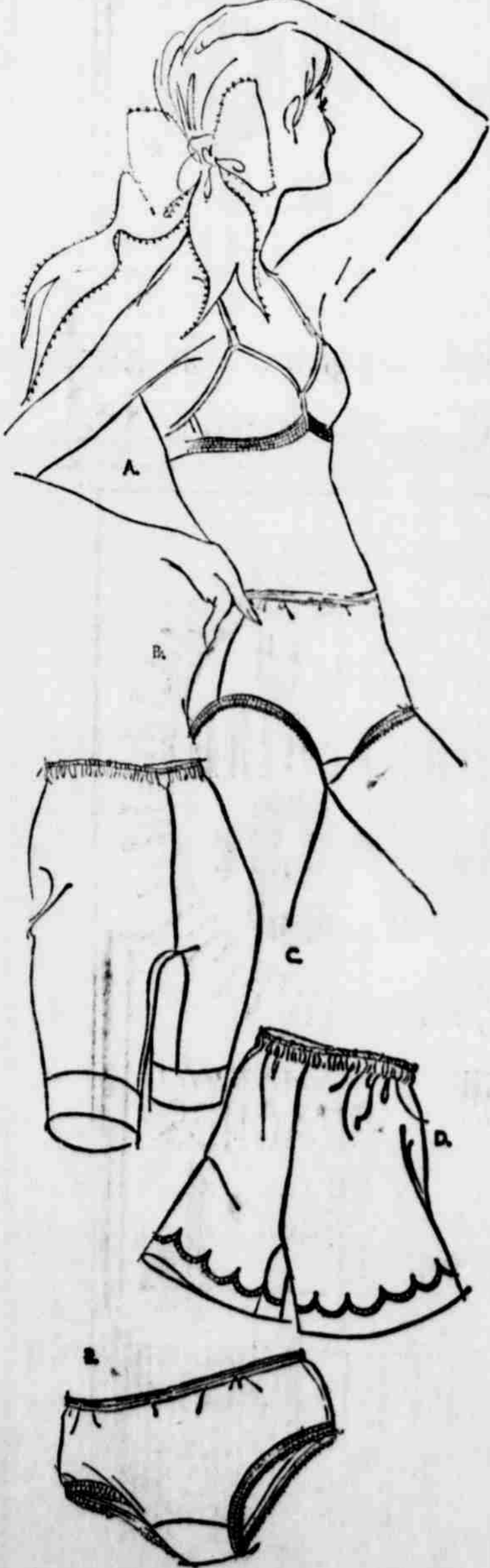

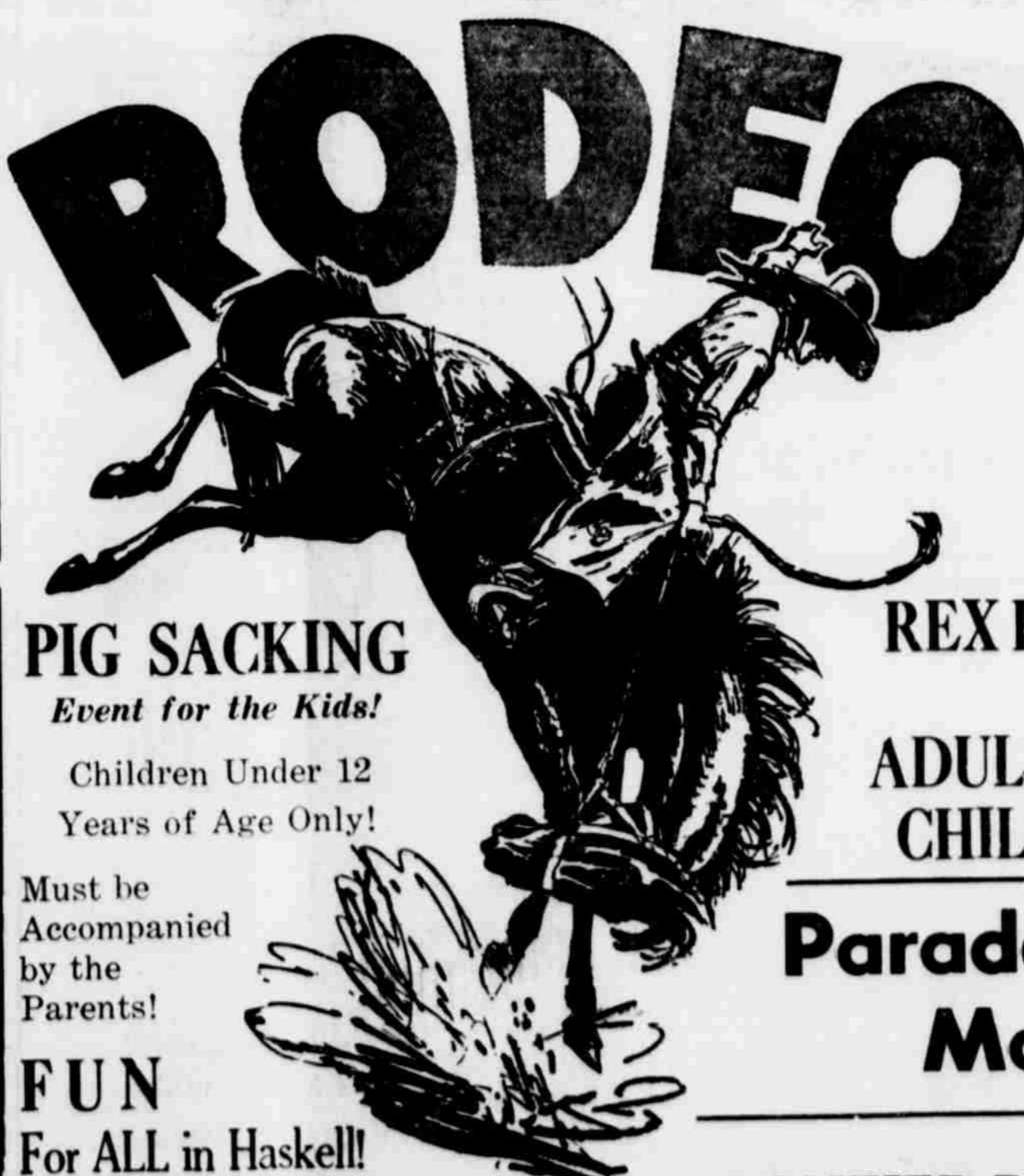

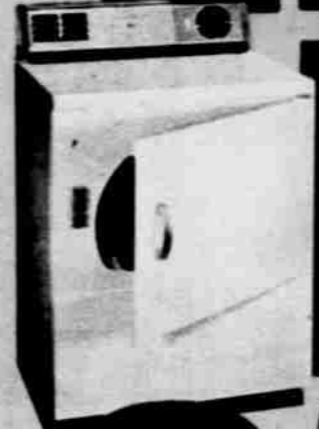
