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600 CAR SALES IN 1940 IS GOAL



The Review has set as a goal for the five local agencies for automobiles and commercial units 600 sales for 1940. Sales for the first half of this year totaled 286 leaving 314 units to be moved in the last six months to reach the goal.

Automobile sales here have increased yearly from 1936 when records were started by the Review. In that year sales totaled only 251 units. Deals in 1937 increased 73, or to a total of 329 sales. Smallest increase was in 1938 when only 341 sales were made and topping the previous year by only 13 units. Last year saw the greatest advance in sales with an increase of 141, or a total of 482 sales for 1939.

To reach 600 sales this year demands an increase of only 118 sales. The first half of 1940 saw an increase of 83 sales over the same period of the previous year.

Brad Seale, manager of Abernathy Motor Co., left, and Arlie Pope, right, his service department manager, are pictured in the top left group. They are seated in front of a 1940 Mercury, Ford's newest car which is gaining in popularity here as well as over the entire nation. Seale and his associates offer sales and service for Ford and Mercury automobiles and commercial units. Seale assumed management of the company August 10, 1938.

Top, center: Bill Wolf is shown in front of the wrecking yard establishment which he opened here in 1938. Wolf added a needed firm here when he started the wrecking yard. He has served farmers and town people with new and used parts from his yard—holding in Abernathy business which formerly went to nearby towns. He has furnished a market for used cars, buying them wholesale from local new car dealers and preparing them for re-sale. Workers following cotton harvest to this area provide an excellent outlet for his cars.

Top, right: Alfred Hughes and Bob Reid, of Reid Chevrolet Co., are pictured in front of a 1940 Chevrolet. Andy and Bob Reid bought the interest of Crow-Harral in the Chevrolet sales and service firm February 10, 1937, and Andy resigned as cashier of First State Bank in 1938 to devote full time to the business. Hughes is head of the service department. The firm sells Chevrolet passenger cars and commercial units. Doc Crow and Leonard Harral bought the Chevrolet agency in Slaton when they sold their interest here. Another pair of Abernathy men entered the automobile business late last year when Dutch and Arthur Crow formed Crow Chevrolet Co. at Sudan. Pete Buske who moved from here to Friona several years ago formerly operated the Friona Chevrolet dealership.

TO HOLD HEARING ON HALE COUNTY'S OWN SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

A hearing on organization of a proposed soil conservation district in Hale County will be held in Plainview at two o'clock on the afternoon of July 31.

V. C. Marshall, administrator of the state conservation board, last Friday dated an order for the hearing and it has been mailed out from the Temple office for publication.

County Agent C. B. Martin today said that the hearing would be held at the agriculture building.

It is expected that W. G. Kennedy of Muleshoe, member of the five-man state board, will conduct the hearing. Petition for a hearing and an election was presented to the state board on June 29, signed by the requisite 50 land-owning voters of the county. It was on this petition that the hearing was granted.

Should the examiner recommend that an election be held and the state board order the election the organization of the district can be authorized only by a favorable two-thirds of the voting land-owning residents of the county, otherwise qualified to vote under Texas primary election laws.

An effort to create a district of Hale and Lubbock counties failed, after a hearing conducted at Abernathy the latter part of April.

At the hearing here, Plainview men voiced objection to creating the two-county district due to dissimilarity in soil and crops in the two counties.

It was stated there that there is great dissimilarity of soil and crops in Hale and Lubbock counties.

After County Agent Martin advised the state board that there was little probability of united opinion in Hale County for a district joining Hale with any other county, the petition for a district of Hale County alone was received and the hearing ordered.

FORMAL STATEMENT OF CANDIDACY FOR STATE SENATE ISSUED BY JUDGE MARSHALL FORMBY

Charging that the members of the legislature had bitterly disappointed the people in failing to solve the old age assistance and other social security problems and in failing to raise the truck load limit law, Judge Marshall Formby of Dickens County, a candidate for the State Senate of the 30th district has issued a formal statement concerning his senatorial candidacy. Judge Formby, serving his fourth year as county judge of Dickens County, made the following statement:

"Because the people have been promised so much and given so little during the past two years, I hesitate to infringe upon their good nature with a load of promises in order to influence them to vote for me for State Senator. However, there are a number of vital questions the people want answered and I submit the following as my formal plea to the voters of the 30th senatorial

district.

Cooperation Pledged

"When elected your state senator, I pledge my sincere cooperation to the members of the Senate, House of Representatives and the governor of the state, in helping pass measures beneficial to this district and to the state as a whole. There was no cooperation between the various branches of the government in Austin last year, and believing that only through cooperation can the state's problems be solved, I hasten to pledge my full cooperation to the Legislature and governor.

"I am opposed to a tax on poverty and believe that any needed revenue should be raised by placing taxes on those able to pay, which is, after all, the correct foundation for the assessment of taxes.

"It will be my aim to work toward an immediate solution of the old age assistance and other social security problems. There should be more action in providing for the aged, the blind, the delinquent children and others in dire need.

Cash Basis Favored

"The state government should be placed on a cash basis like any sensible business is run. This can be done through economy in the inaction of overlapping governmental agencies. It is foolish business, for the state to continue to build up a deficit in the general fund. Business-like methods, the same as we have inaugurated in Dickens county's government, should be adopted.

"The laborer should be given at all times a fair deal and I favor legislation for his protection.

"I favor legislation favorable to

agricultural interests believing that only when agriculture prospers in West Texas does the average business man prosper. For the benefit of agricultural interests, I favor revision of the present truck load limit law. The truck law limit should be raised to a sensible limit.

"It is unfair for certain counties in Texas to have remitted back to them the state ad valorem tax and I will oppose this special legislation to certain favored counties in Texas.

"Because as a county judge, I have learned the various problems relative to the care of the unfortunates in Texas, I shall fight always for humane treatment and care of the insane, feeble-minded, epileptic, deaf and dumb and blind.

"In order that the average citizen might have his day in court and have his problems solved without having to waste his time and money, I shall favor legislation to speed up civil procedure in the Texas Courts.

"It shall be my aim at all times to support legislation, favorable to the average farmer."

WHEAT INSURANCE PAID IN COUNTY

Crop insurance indemnity payments to Hale county wheat growers amounts to \$6,128.90 on the present crop, said E. A. Gilbert, crop insurance supervisor.

Forty wheat growers have filed applications for indemnity payments amounting to \$8,059.10 and all applications have been certified and checks or wheat delivered to 26 of the number, said T. A. Shipp, chairman of the county AAA committee.

Most loss claims in Hale were due to drought, wind and hail with about 90 per cent of the claims constituting total losses and producers receiving the full 75 per cent of their crop for which they were insured, Gilbert said.

Indemnity payments are made either in bushels of wheat or cash equivalent at the going market. If payment is taken in wheat, that wheat is eligible for a loan from the Commodity Credit Corporation, should

the farmer want to hold it for a better market by putting it under the loan, Gilbert pointed out.

In 1939 the Hale county wheat insurance office paid 97 claims for a total of \$37,151.59. Gilbert said more claims were expected this year than last because of a greater number of farmers having crops insured.

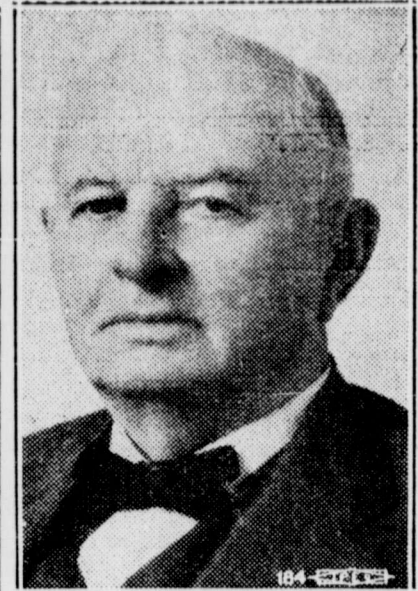
