PLANT MORE TREES

Her Refusal To Crowd Driver Saves Life Of Williams Girl

Was in Accident That Claimed Lives Of Her Grandparents

Thoughtfulness in refusing to crowd the driver saved the life of Bobbie Lee Williams, 13-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. O. Williams of this community. Her grandmother, Mrs. Jack Hutson, riding in the front seat with her husband, who was driving, was killed instantly Wednesday afternoon of last week when their car was in collision with a truck on a highway near Hereford. Mr. Hutson died at noon the following day in an Amarillo hospital. Parents of Mrs. Williams, he was 76 years old and Mrs. Hutson was 69.

Riding in the rear seat, Bobbie Lee suffered only slight injuries consisting of bruises and abrasions. Visiting an aunt in that area, Bobbie Lee met her grandparents in Hereford and was enroute with them to their home in the Ward community when the accident occurred. When they left Hereford, her grandparents insisted that she ride in the front seat of the big sedan with them, but she refused stating it might crowd her grandfather who was driving. Impact of the collision jammed the motor of the car back into the front seat.

Funeral rites were held for the Hutsons in Hereford Friday afternoon.

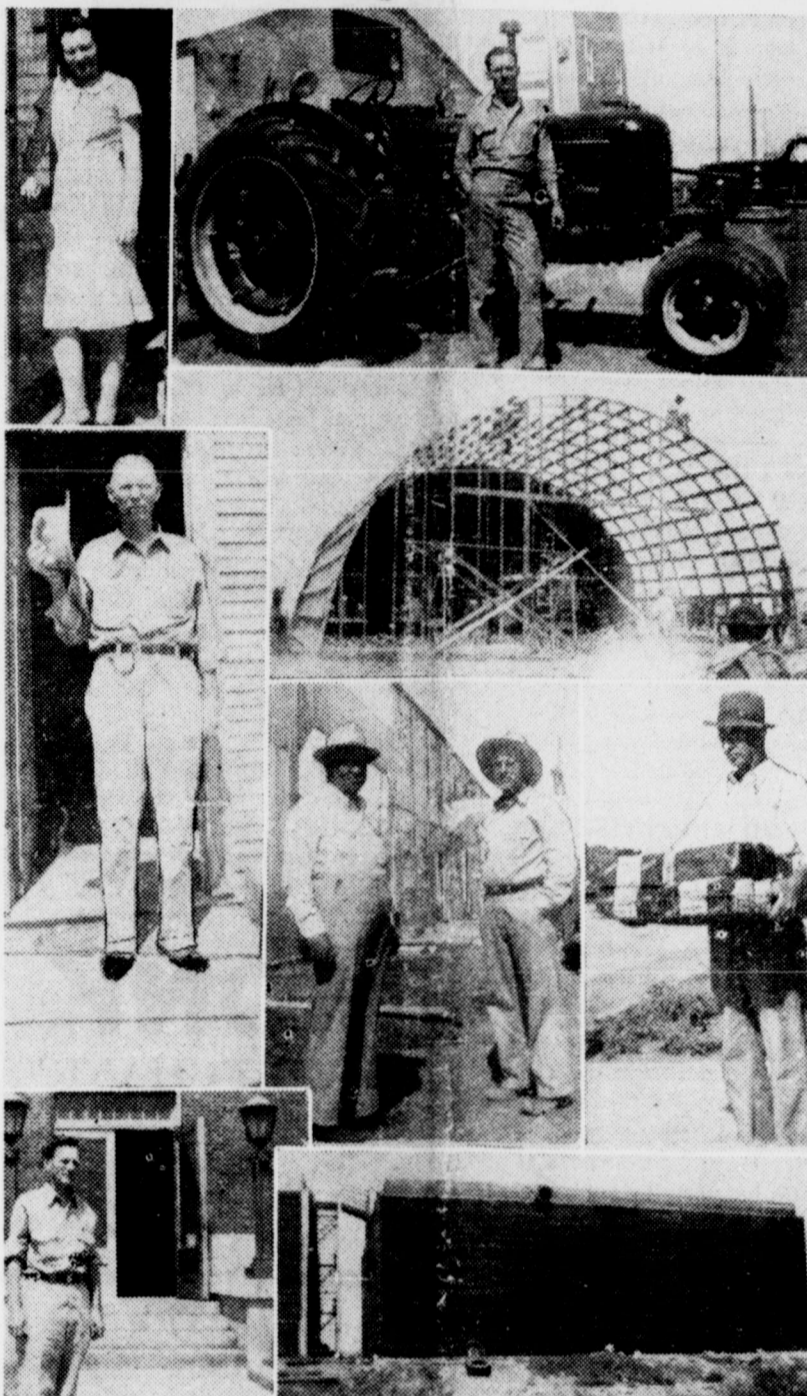

Top, left: Mrs. Douglas Chapman, who recently moved here from Quitaque. She is associated with her sister, Mrs. Alvin Hardin, in the operation of Abernathy Beauty Salon. Her husband opened Chapman Motor Co., Dodge-Plymouth agency, here last month.

Top, right: Hernon Peel, who last month was named local dealer for Case tractors, farm implements and parts. Peel is standing beside the Case DC tractor which he has on display at the J. U. Peel & Son shop, his headquarters. The tractor in the picture handles four-row row crop tools and wheat land equipment. The dealership is known as Peel Implement Co.

Center, left: H. H. Anderson (with hat in hand) moved here with his wife in May of this year from Lueders, in Jones county. He is the new manager of Abernathy Farmers' Co-op Gin. Mr. Anderson was manager of the Lueders Co-op gin for five years.

Center, top: Proof of Abernathy's growth is this building scene which shows frame work of the addition of 30 feet on the EAST end of the wool warehouse here. Two wool clips were stored and loaded out of there this spring, bringing near \$31,000 to producers. Not to be used for wool storage purposes until clip time next spring, the building was leased by the school to house buses. The 30-foot addition was required to accommodate the eight buses. The additional space also will be needed for wool next year due to the annually increasing size of the pool which is formed here by growers from many counties in this section of the state. School buses formerly were housed in the Ragland building in the business district. When Douglas Chapman moved here in June from Quitaque to open Chapman Motor Co., Dodge-Plymouth dealership, there was no building available, and the school board released the Ragland building to admit the new auto sales firm to that business location. Buses can be spotted in the background of the building picture. Homer Rantz, building contractor, is in the foreground standing on the ground, and workmen Jess Bryant, Earl Meador, Delton Richerson and Mutt Brown were busy in the frame work when this picture was taken.

Center, under left side of building picture: J. J. Caudle, left and Vincent Cunningham, right. Caudle, veteran gin man of Hale Center, is owner of the new gin under construction here. The new gin building, which is al-

most complete, can be seen in the background. He owns gins at Hale Center and Halfway. Cunningham, his son-in-law, is to be manager of the gin. The Cunningham family moved here early last month from Bovina. Installation of machinery is to start within the next week or two weeks.

Center, under right side of building picture: A. E. Tucker, owner and operator of City Bakery. Tucker, former Panhandle and Pampa baker, moved his baking plant here from Hale Center early in June. He is pictured holding a basket of Golden Krust bread and whole wheat bread which he delivers fresh daily to local food stores and cafes. Besides bread, Tucker turns out rolls, buns, cakes, cookies and pies. His products are of good quality and local persons are co-operating by calling for them at the stores.

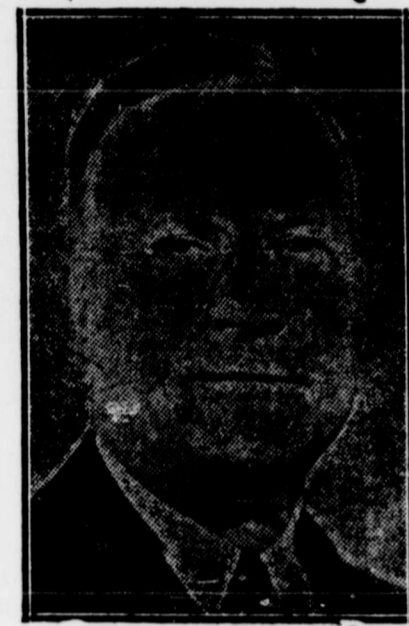

regular employees, there are from one to four part-time workers engaged most all time in the normal operation of the plant. About ten extra workers are now engaged in installation of a new boiler in the plant. C. E. Thompson, former Tuco worker, who is now engineer of the Clovis plant, is supervising the boiler installation work, which will be completed about October 1. This will make the fourth boiler in the plant. The third boiler was installed in 1938 along with a second turbine and a second generator. A new 66,000 volt extension feeder line went from TUCO to Hereford in 1938 and a feeder line of similar voltage went from there to Littlefield in 1939.

Bottom, right: Work probably will be completed this week on TUCO's newest unit pictured here. The Marley Co. of Kansas City, Kas., contractors, started work on the cooling tower in May. It is a twin of the one built in 1938 and which joins it on the south. The unit cools 7,000 gallons of water per minute. An induced draft type, the tower has three giant, electrically powered fans in the top. Redwood lumber was used in construction. The plant also has two other cooling towers of the old, or atmospheric, type. A new well was drilled south of the plant this year.

Hale county Democrats will go to the polls Saturday to express their choice for nominees for precinct, county, district and state offices. With interest stirred up in only three county races, and very little enthusiasm worked up over any state race, candidates were worrying how to get the vote out in this region.

Poll taxes paid this year totaled 4,235 in Hale county, and exemptions issued totaled 168, giving a total voting strength for the county of at least 4,403. Of this number, voting strength in the various southern Hale county boxes has been announced as follows: Petersburg, 264; Hale Center, 469; Cotton Center, 143; Abernathy, 355; Lakeview, 103.

Long List of Candidates

Hale county voters will encounter 62 names on the ballot for 17 state offices while Lubbock county voters will have to scan 61 names due to there being only two in the race for state representative from the 119th district. There are three candidates seeking to represent the 120th district in Austin. Approximately 81 names for places from district judge to precinct chairmanships appear on the Lubbock county ballot.

NO EXEMPTION NEEDED

Following is a statement from a Hale county official:

"The first part of the year, a ruling by the attorney general stated that all persons reaching the age of 21 years in 1940 before the primary in July would be required to have an exemption to be allowed to vote. That ruling has been interpreted to apply to persons residing in cities of 10,000 or more population. No exemption will be required here."

If you have reached the age of 21 years in 1940, consult the election judge at the polls where you desire to mark a ballot.

Governor W. Lee O'Daniel has seven opponents. Eighteen men are seeking the Railroad Commission office.

Lubbock county's voting strength is set at about 12,271.

R. M. Hardesty is to have charge of Abernathy's Hale county voting box. Plans are to set up the voting facilities under the city tabernacle, Hardesty said. Polls are to open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Hardesty and the other election judges urge voters to mark ballots early in the day in order that returns may be compiled soon after polls close at 7 p. m.

Lubbock county residents in the Abernathy area are to mark ballots at polls in the Edgar Heath home here. A white frame structure, the Heath home is the first house on the east side of the highway coming into town from the south.

Frank B. Lovelace, farmer residing south of town, is to be in charge of the polls and will be assisted by Heath.

Fortenberry at Monroe

W. O. Fortenberry is to be the election judge at Monroe and voting is to be in the New Deal high school building.

Lutrick Is At Lakeview

T. E. Lutrick is to be election judge at the Lakeview voting box which will be located in the school building. S. M. Harrison and others will assist him.

Hale county voters are invited to turn to the political announcements column in this issue of the Review wherein is listed most all of the candidates for offices of the county and district. Lubbock county voters also will observe a few candidates for offices in that county and district listed in that column.

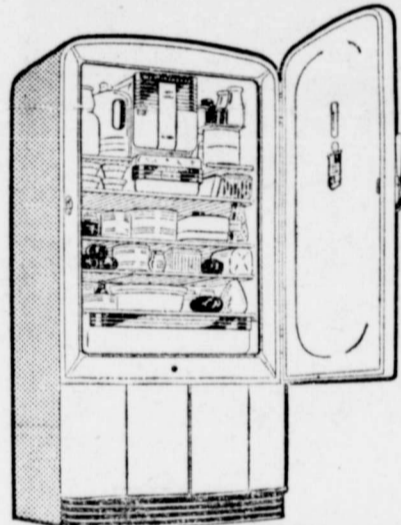
