Tax in 22 Years

Aided by the lowest county tax rate in 22 years, taxpayers of Hale County will pay 20 cents less on \$100 valuations at the county assessorcollector's office for the year 1940-41. Commissioners met with Judge Frank R. Day Friday morning and before last and another there last approved a 53-cent rate, a reduction of 12 cents, and budgetary estimates

calculated to meet the expenses of the county government for next year. Supplemented by the state's eightcent slash to 69 cents, a combined levy of \$1.22 will be required. The 1939-40 assessment was \$1.42.

The county reduction was deducted from the road bond and interest sinking fund, effecting an eight-cent levy on that account. The county general and courthouse and jail funds remained at their last levies of 25 and 20 cents, respectively.

Estimated expenditures for the county in 1941 range upward of \$165,-000. Anticipated resources by income are estimated at \$175,000.
