ELIGIBLE WELFARE CLIENTS FOR FOOD STAMP PLAN NAMED

Welfare clients eligible to receive commodities under the county food stamp plan were listed by Jack Bramlett, Dallas, program organizer of the southern region, under six classes.

The program organizer, who will be in Plainview and in Lubbock alternately for several weeks starting stamp programs, named these groups: Grand clients of the Farm Security

Administration, Old Age Assistance, general relief, commodity only, WPA employed, and WPA awaiting assignment clients. The commodity group comprises those who are only receiving from the local commissary.

Interviews of general relief, commodity only, and WPA awaiting assignment clients are to be held before they are accepted for eligibility. The Hale County program, expected to begin Sept. 3, will serve approximately 950 families and 2,800 individuals.

Twenty food commodities listed for Texas as surplus commodities until Sept. 1 were named by Bramlett. Some changes will be made after that date. The commodities now include: Butter, raisins, rice, pork lard, pork, corn meal, shell eggs, dried prunes, hominy grits, wheat flour and whole wheat (graham) flour, fresh oranges, dry edible beans, and the following fresh items, cabbage, tomatoes, snap beans, beets, corn, apples and pears.

Surplus commodities may be acquired with blue stamps, which are granted to clients at the ratio of 1-2 for orange stamp purchases.

Bramlett will preside at a meeting in the Plainview city auditorium at 8 o'clock the night of Aug. 27 to explain the program to persons affected by the plan. These will include owners, managers and employees of wholesale and retail food stores, city and county welfare workers, relief case workers and supervisors, and WPA time-keepers and foremen.

Participating food stores will have to apply for admission into the program as same as clients. Application and original issuance of stamps will be made in Plainview. After that the issuing officers will have set days on which to be in Abernathy to issue the stamps. The office in Plainview is on the first floor of the court house in the southeast corner, the former county attorney's office. Circulars explaining the plan in detail will be distributed.
