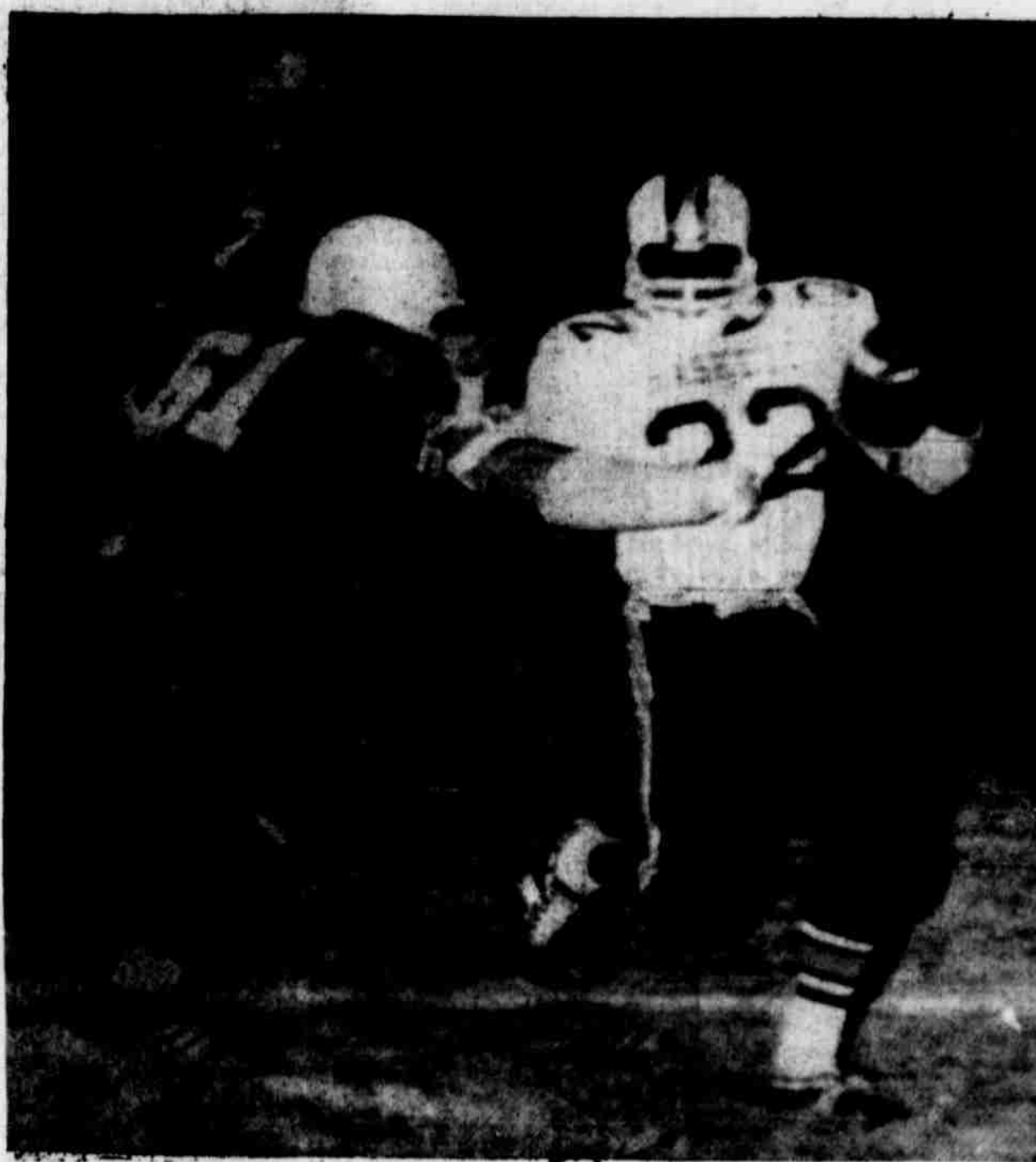

Indians Win Regional, 17-15

To Meet Childress On Friday At 7:30 p. m., Lions Stadium In Vernon

The first Regional title in Haskell's history was brought home by the Indians Friday night from Bobcat Stadium when they defeated the Ozona Lions in a 17-15 battle that kept fans on their feet till the last whistle blew. This hair-raising win gave our Indians a shot at the quarter-final berth against Childress Friday night at 7:30 in Vernon. Childress upset Denver City Friday night by a whopping 27-8, to pit them against us.

The winner of the Indian-Childress game will take on the winner of Wells Point and Iowa Park in the semi-final game. Friday night's tussle was another of those outstanding games to watch, as far as spectators are concerned. It began like a high-scoring game, with both teams hitting paydirt early. The Lions took opening kick-off on the 26 yard line and with Ruben Tambunga assigned as workhorse, it took the Lions only 12 plays to put six points on the scoreboard. Tambunga, one of the finest high school running backs around, picked up 40 yards in 6 carries to help set up this TD. Greg Stuart took the ball on Indians 17 and ran around left end for the TD. David Pagan kicked the extra point.

With 6:53 left in the first quarter, the Indians took the kick-off on the Lions 48. Keith Everett picked up 6 yards, Charlie Franklin got 7 more, then Franklin showed the Ozona people what they came to see (Continued on Page 2, Sec. 1)

Annual Youth Tour Contest

Expense paid trips to the nation's capital city will be awarded winners of an oratorical contest, announced this week by Jerry Terrell, Member Services Director of Stamford Electric Cooperative, Inc.

This contest is open to any boy or girl at least 16 years of age but not 18 years of age prior to September 1, 1971. Winners will join winners of similar contests sponsored by other electric cooperatives across Texas on the seventh annual Texas Electric Cooperative's Government-in-Action Youth Tour to Washington, D. C. All expenses of the 12-day trip beginning June 11 will be paid by SECC, Mr. Terrell said.

Each entrant will be required to give a 5- to 8 minute talk on the subject, "This I Believe."

The contest will be judged on the basis of (1) knowledge of subject, 40%; (2) speaking ability, 30%; (3) poise, 10%; (4) personality, 10%; and (5) appearance, 10%.

Interested young people may obtain an official entry blank from their school or the offices of Stamford Electric Cooperative.

The deadline for submitting entries will be January 29, 1971, Mr. Terrell said.

"TEXAS 24" NOW US 380

AUSTIN: The Texas Highway Commission Tuesday approved extending the U. S. 380 designation to include Texas 24 so the road will connect Old Glory in Stonewall County with Interstate 30 near Greenville in Hunt County.

The new designation provides an east-west U. S. highway by passing the high volume traffic in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

The only condition imposed was that a grade crossing protection device must be installed at the highway-railroad crossing in Graham. Once that condition is met U. S. 380 will run from Old Glory through Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Jack, Wise, Denton, Collin and Hunt counties to a junction of Loop 315, over Loop 315 to IH 30 near Greenville.

HASKELL NEEDY FAMILIES MAY HAVE SAD CHRISTMAS

a beautiful 40 yard TD run to put the Indians on the scoreboard. Randy Stone's kick failed and it kept the Lions ahead 7-6. It took four plays for the Indians to make their touchdown. This is when it looked like a high scoring game was coming up—each team had had the ball one time, and had scored.

But the rest of the first quarter it was a different kind of game. The Lions took the kickoff on the 29; tried two incomplete passes and Stuart picked up 3 yards and the Lions were forced to punt. The Indians picked up 6 yards on their 3 downs and punted. The Lions managed to pick up two first downs before the quarter ended. In the first period, the Lions picked up 103 yards and 6 first downs to the Indians' 57 yards and 2 first downs. The Lions were moving the ball on each play, going into the second period. Starting on their own 33 they drove down to the Indian 4, but big Clifford Campbell saved the night when he recovered a Lion fumble on the 7 yard line. Again the Indians could not move against the good defense of the Lions, and were forced to punt. The Lions managed to pick up 2 first downs before they had to punt on 4th. Indians took over on the 25. Everett picked up 4 but on the next play, Franklin fumbled on the 32 and Robert Maldonado recovered for the Lions. This time the Indian defense set in, and threw the Lions for a 15 yard loss and forced them to punt.

The Indians took the punt on the 28. Everett picked up 15 good yards. A Terry Pringle pass to Eric Whitaker barely failed, as Whitaker made a great try, but couldn't hold on to the ball. Then, with just 30 seconds left in the half, Pringle connected with Franklin on a pass and Charlie made another beautiful run for the second TD. This pass and run to Franklin covered 57 yards. The Indians elected to run for two points and Franklin carried around left end for the two. Score tallied Indians 14, Lions 7.

The Indians kicked an onside

kick, and Gary Cobb covered the ball on the Lion 31. Franklin lost 3 yards, then a Pringle pass to Whitaker for 24 yards put the ball on the 10. An incomplete pass left 9 seconds on the clock. Tambunga picked up 5 to set up another touchdown for the Lions, only to have it called back on a 15 yard holding penalty. This was the first penalty of the game. The clock showed 1:14 left. The Lions tried two passes, both incomplete, and the Indians took over on the 10 yard line. Everett picked up 5, then lost 3 trying to run out the clock. Everett gained 7 more to the 21. On 4th down and 30 seconds left, the Indians were going to punt. A bad snap to Bill Cox sent the ball sailing over his head. He managed, however, to get the ball and was tackled behind the goal line for a safety.

With the 30 seconds still on the clock, the Lions took the ball on their own 10 after the kickoff, and the Indian defense held them, to end another cliff-hanger ball game.

This is the fifth game this year for our Tribe that anything could have happened in the last seconds of the game to change its outcome radically. They were great games to watch, but sure rough on the fans!

Checks Mailed Tuesday To Members Of Stamford Electric Co-op., Inc.

Checks totaling \$175,771.30 were mailed to members of Stamford Electric Cooperative, Inc., on Tuesday, December 1, 1970, according to Charles W. Stenholm, Manager. These checks will retire capital credit investments made by S.E.C. members during the year 1958. The Capital Credits plan is one aspect of SEC's non-profit operation under which members agree that all amounts paid for service in excess of operation costs are furnished as capital. Each member invests in his cooperative in proportion to the amount of electricity that he uses. Amounts thus invested and credited to member accounts are returned when the Cooperative's financial position permits.

The Board of Directors of SEC is charged with making decisions on finances and other policies of the cooperative. It has been the policy of SEC over the years to pay back as quickly as economically feasible all REA loan funds. This has been done to the extent that members today have a 94.2% equity in their own business.

It is now possible to refund members capital investments on a regular basis. All such retirement of capital here made in the order of priority according to year in which capital

was furnished and credited, the capital first received by the cooperative being retired first. "With the mailing of the 1958 retirement checks, this will make a total of \$1,158,124.73 thus refunded since the cooperative's organization in 1939," said Stenholm, "and during this period SEC has served every applicant for service in the area served by the cooperative, no matter how small or far away."

Dollar Day For December Comes Early!

Dollar Day, which comes early in December, in the form of a "Holiday Festival", Tuesday, December 8th, falls just right for residents of this wide trade area.

Dollar Day is usually the third Tuesday of each month, but will be observed on the second Tuesday in December.

Cotton Classing Report

Cotton harvest continued at a rapid pace keeping the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Monday, Texas, about four days behind in classing. According to John E. Williams, In-Charge, there were 12,467 samples classed during the week ending Nov. 27, 1970. The total for the season was 46,733.

Grades showed only a small change with white cotton having another slight increase in percentage. A breakdown of the predominant grades follows: 31 with 15 percent; 41 with 28 percent; 32 with 33 percent; and 42 with 17 percent. Staple lengths continued about the same with 29's, accounting for 31 percent, 30's were 49 percent, and 31's and longer were 17 percent.

Micronaire readings, which measure the fineness and to a certain extent the maturity of the cotton fiber, showed a substantial increase in premium range cotton with 64 percent compared with 55 percent the previous week. There was 29 percent of the cotton making 5.0-5.2 and only 7 percent making 5.3 and higher.

Cotton prices dropped another 25 to 50 points as producers received from 170 to 350 points above CCC loan prices for the predominant grades. Some average prices for grades in the premium mike range were: 41 30-19.30 cents per pound; 32 30-19.55 cents; 42 29-18.80 cents; and 42 30-19.30 cents.
