**655 BALES GINNED HERE**

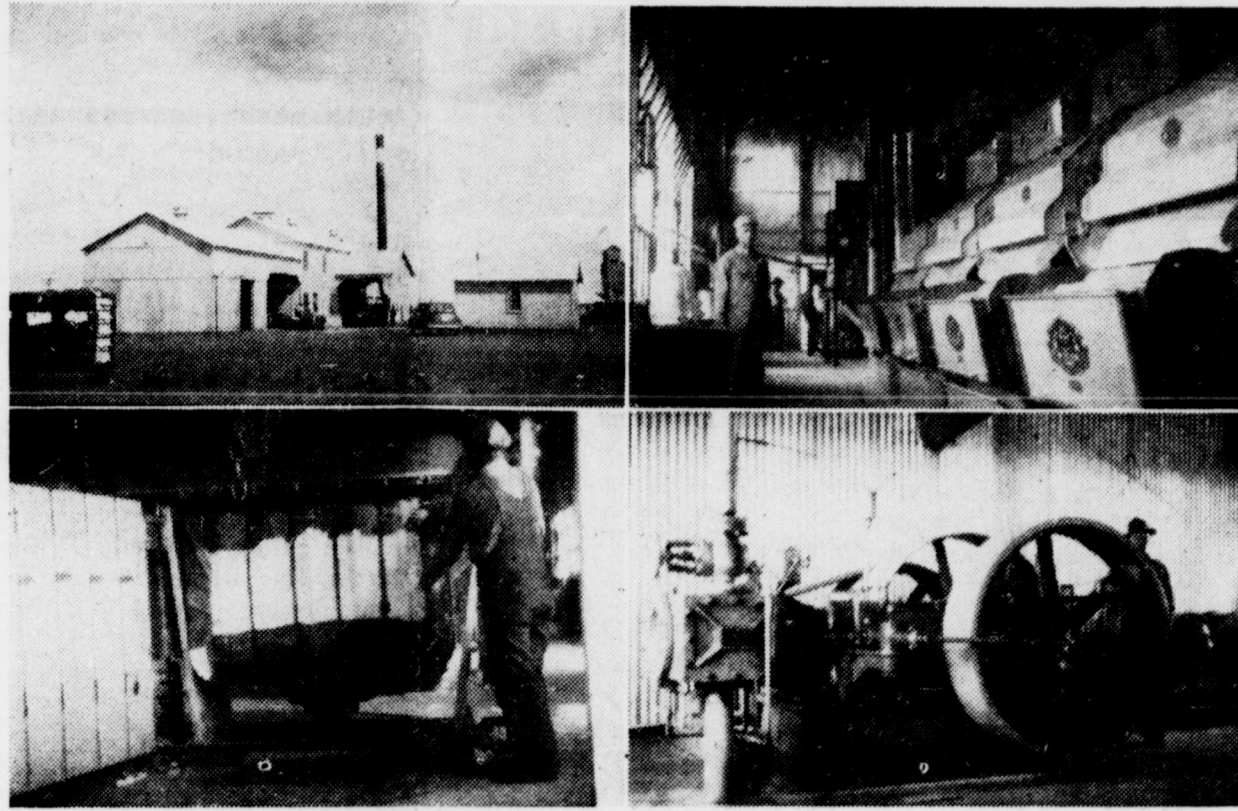
Reports Wednesday morning said the three gins here had turned out 655 bales of cotton. Pickers are coming into this section daily to aid in harvesting the crop.

American men, aged 21 to 35 inclusive, married or single, will register Wednesday to be subject to call for training in the national defense program, to comply with the recent Conscription bill, passed by Congress. Merchants, clerks, farmers, relief workers and otherwise, all must appear before registration boards in each of the voting precincts in Hale county next Wednesday. The scene here will be repeated in every city, town and hamlet in all of the 48 states of the Union on Oct. 16, in this nation's foremost step to show beligerent nations of the world, its manpower is ready, willing and able to train for any engagement.

Information regarding rules and regulations of the conscription will be provided every registrant in booklet form when he appears before the board. Questions men may have concerning details of the plan are all answered in the question and answer pamphlet to be given all men eligible for selective service.

Hale county schools will be dismissed while the registration is underway, Wednesday, flags will fly over all registration places, and volunteer workers have been asked to assist in the registration. They can not be men of the ages eligible for the draft, however.

Those in charge of registration solicit the co-operation of everyone in giving information about those of draft age who are physically unable to reach the registration places. They will name helpers to contact the men whether at home or in hospitals.

Transient workers in this area on Oct. 16 will be required to register here.

Registration is to be held in the library room on the second floor of the Abernathy school with Walter Harp and J. W. Harris in charge.

Gid Adkisson is to be in charge of the Abernathy Lubbock county registration place, which probably will be in the Edgar Heath home.

S. M. Harrison and E. C. Wilson are to have charge of registration at the Lakeview school.

W. O. Fortenberry is to have charge of registration activities in Monroe. Although school is not to be dismissed, teachers and typing students are to assist with the registration which will be done in the New Deal High school gym. Fortenberry Tuesday told the Review that other volunteer workers will be needed.

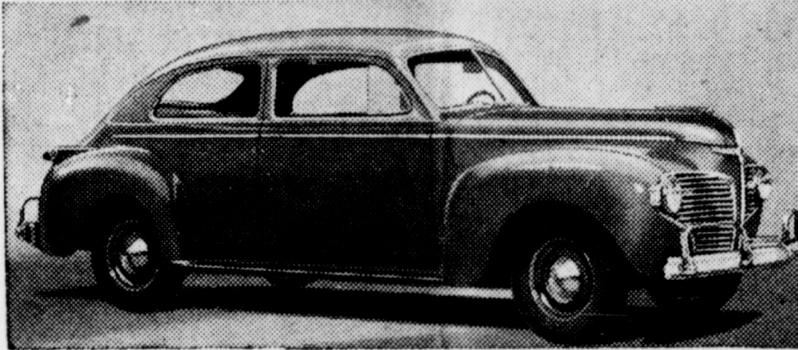
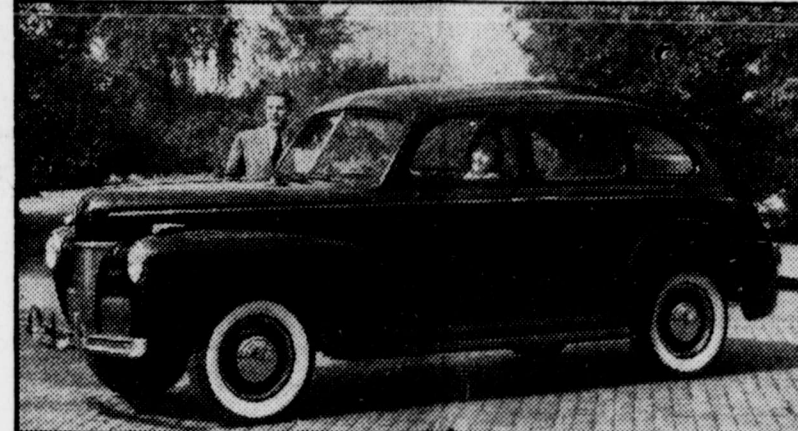
