## ARE WE DOING OUR PART?

Those seeking to increase the membership of the Texas State Teachers Association are frequently confronted with the question, "What has the Association Done to merit the support of Texas teachers?"

This Association has been actively interested in the equalization of educational opportunities throughout the state. With the help of law and professional agencies, it has been able to assist in getting the state per capita apportionment.

This Teachers Association has tried to conserve the permanent school fund, used its influence for the passage of a school budget law for Texas schools, and has been vitally interested in a teachers retirement system for this state, led by the Texas State Teachers Association, secured the passage of a law to elect a State Superintendent. Three years later, by the same means, a county superintendent was elected.

The achievements of the Association are all the more remarkable when it is recalled that at no time in its history has it had in its membership much more than two-thirds of the teachers of Texas.

Educational progress cannot run ahead of the wishes of those who carry on the work of the schools. For the first time in the history of Abernathy schools, our faculty has joined the association a hundred percent.

Educational needs can be met, educational weaknesses can be overcome, educational progress can be sure, only as all teachers, principals, supervisors and superintendents, show themselves willing to co-operate in a united effort for a more efficient school system.

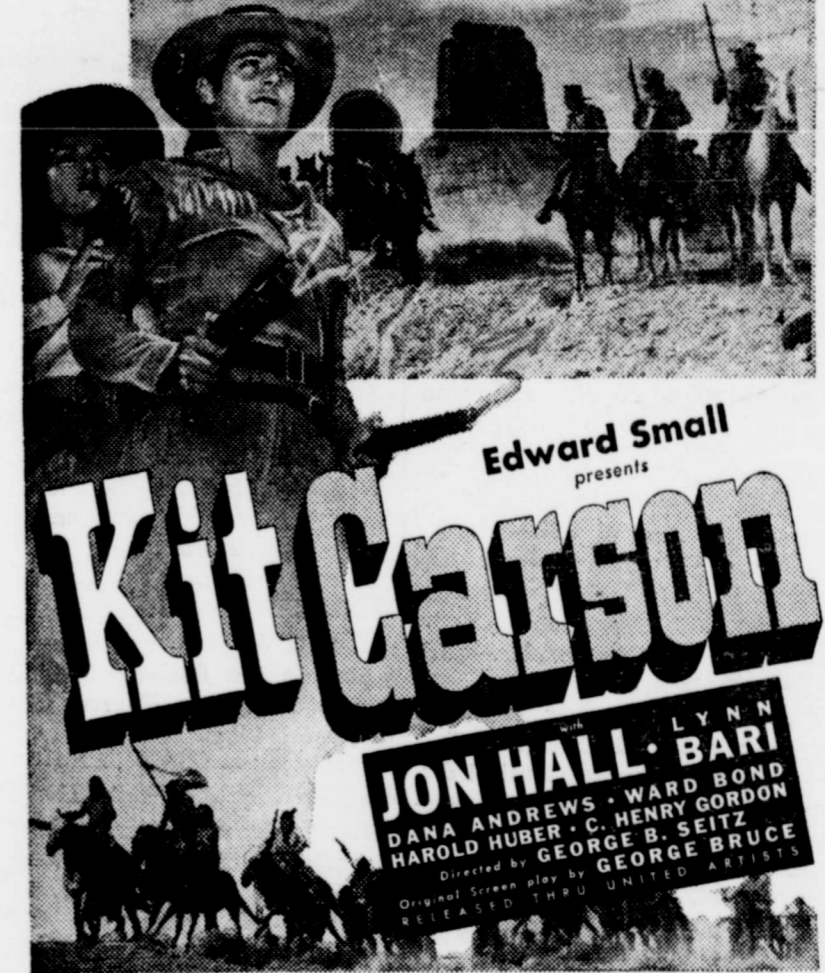
MEMBER OF COLLEGE SENATE
