LAMB COUNTY PLANS FOR PAVING ROAD OF INTEREST HERE

Of vital interest to Abernathy and western Hale Co. residents is the hearing called Nov. 20 in Olton on a proposed road bond election for paving an east-west route through Lamb county, to connect with the improved lateral road east and west through Hale county, which runs from Petersburg west, by Tuco and Eagle Springs, to the Lamb county line just a few miles south of Cotton Center. Should the election be called, and the bonds be voted, only a small gap would remain from the south end of the Cotton Center paved road to the Lamb county paved route into Littlefield.

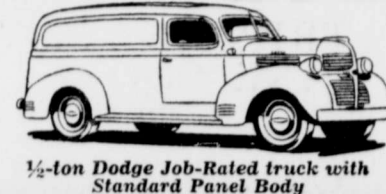
