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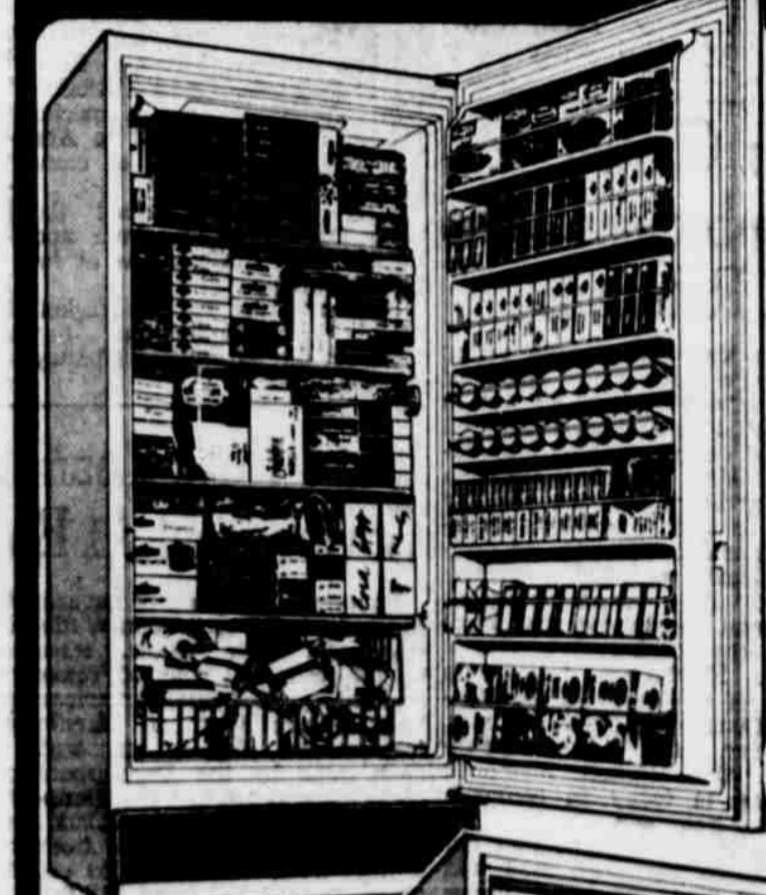

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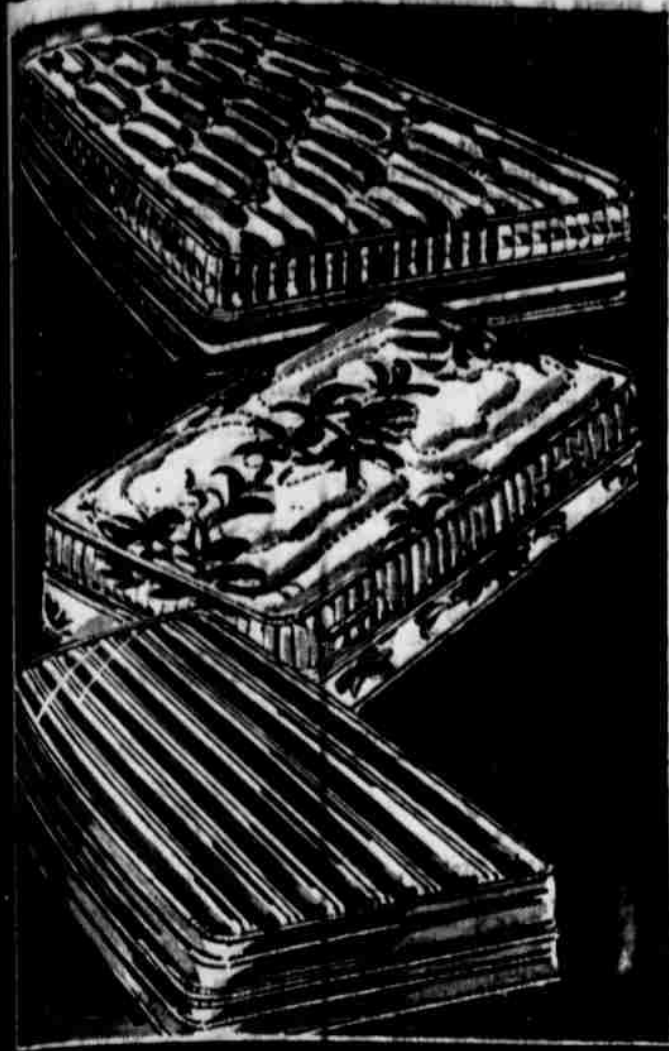

Stitching And Stewing

Soft-sided luggage often can withstand as much wear and tear as molded luggage. Most soft-sided suitcases should do well if you don't travel a very great deal and if you don't expect your luggage to be handled extremely roughly.

To help in buying soft-sided luggage, the following check list may help you: Make sure the closure rims fit properly; bindings are sewn securely; lining has no raw edges or dangling threads and is not separating from the shell; and there is no misplaced or sticking hardware.

Open and close the lid a few times. Work latches or zipper and the lock. See that fabric at the corners of the zipper, zipper tapes and adjoining fabric is not rippled. Check stability of the opened lid, especially if it has no stays. But, don't expect many guar-

antees. On the mail-order brands, you probably would get a general guarantee from the catalog, but many other guarantees may be vague.

Use sheets of aluminum foil as layer dividers in luggage. The sheets are handy for wrapping damp or soiled articles when repacking. Anytime you pack at night for an early morning departure, leave the bag open overnight, the air will keep things from wrinkling.

If your bag has ties or straps to keep clothes in place, slide a piece of cardboard or tissue under the buckles or knots when you tighten them. This avoids creases and muzzling clothes. When packing, wrap your jewelry and other fragile items in tissue paper or in a pair of socks and pack into shoes.

Add ingredients and bake about 30 minutes until brown in a 400-degree oven. Can pre-cook hamburger meat and drain.

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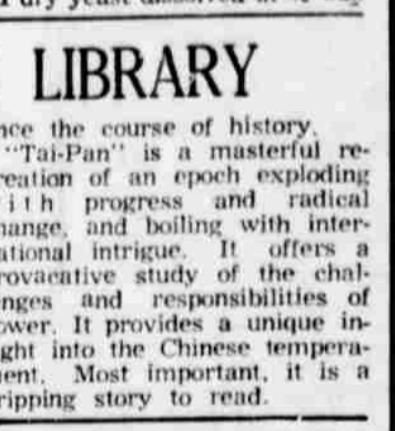

Texas Depends On Bond Money To Keep Growing

Last year in Texas, a record \$350 million in bonds was issued for projects in towns, large and small, and in many rural areas.
Of this amount the cities issued \$302 million in bonds: schools and junior colleges \$275 million; counties and road districts, \$47 million; special districts like water, river and hospital districts, \$137 million, and state agencies and state colleges, \$190 million.
Investors who bought these bonds do not have to pay income taxes on the interest which the bonds bear. Therefore, they were willing to buy them at a much lower rate of interest than would otherwise be the case. Except for this many of the badly needed projects would not have been possible.

Recording Deadline Under Water Rights Adjudication Act Given

The Texas Water Rights Commission has announced that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum

use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Further information and forms for recording claims under the Water Rights Adjudication Act may be obtained from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

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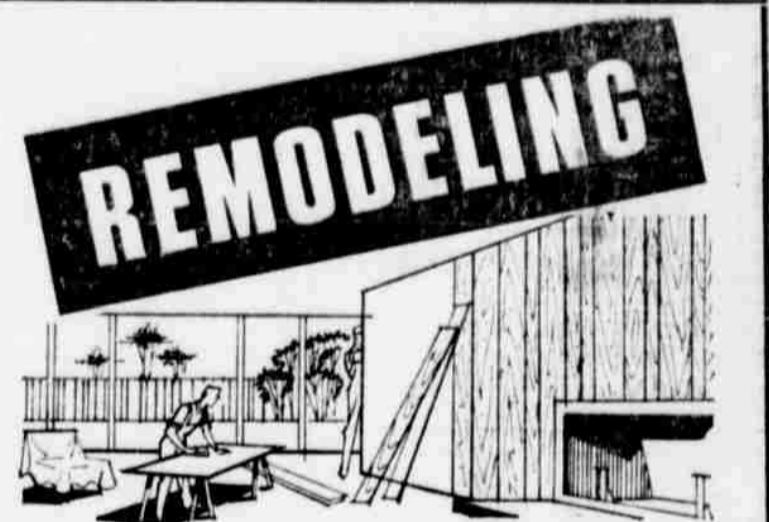

There are probably 50 families that lost all they had.
