The new owners of the Vineyard and Webb places plan to move there soon. Pettit farmed the Annie Bibby place west of town.

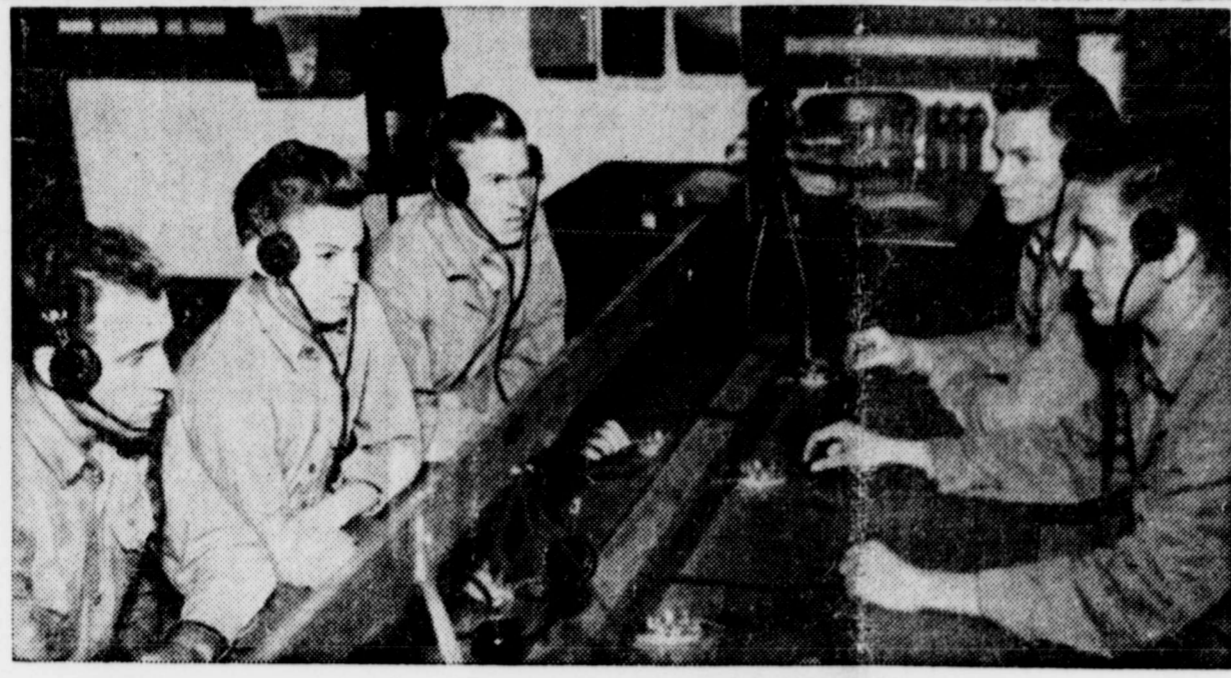

## Abernathy's First WAAC Reports to Fort Des Moines

(Editor's note: The following article concerning the first WAAC enlistee from Abernathy was received by the Review from the public relations office of Ft. Des Moines, Iowa, last week-end.)

Bulah Mae Lusk, of Route 2, Abernathy, has begun training in the Women's Army Auxiliary corps at Ft. Des Moines, Iowa. She was immediately assigned to a receiving center company for a week's elementary military training. There she is issued clothing and equipment, and instructions in rudiments of drill, and given Army classification tests. These tests will help determine the job she will fill in the WAAC.

For the following four weeks, she will be assigned to a basic company for more detailed training preparing her to replace a man in a non-combat Army job.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Lusk of Route 2, Abernathy, Texas.

## 116 HALE COUNTY MEN TO BE CALLED

Hale county will contribute 116 men to the Army through selective service within the next month. February quota has been set for the county, and is one of the largest in several months, the call being for 64 men on the 12th. January's quota is 39 selectees on the 22nd. With 7 supplementals called for the same date to make up for an equal number rejected in previous calls, there will be 46 white men inducted this month. In addition, two Negroes were inducted Jan. 1.

There will be three different deadlines, with basic A bookholders having until the end of March for their inspection, and subsequent inspections will be once in each six months, instead of once every four months. Motorists with B or C supplementary books will be required to get their first inspections by the end of February. After that, inspections for B bookholders will be once in every four months, and for C bookholders, once every three months.

**EMERGENCY CROP LOANS**  
AVAILABLE NOW  
Emergency crop loans, known generally as "seed loans," offered for many years in this county by the Emergency Crop & Feed loan section of the Farm Credit administration, are now available to farmers needing financial assistance for production of vitally important food crops for 1943. Applications for the loans are being taken at W. A. Richter's office in Abernathy each Monday under direction of Field Supervisor H. L. Kimsy.

Funds obtained under these loans may be used to cover the cost of preparing land and to purchase seed, fertilizer and supplies incident to the production of the crop. A first mortgage on the crops to be grown is the security required on the crop loans.

As in the past, borrowers must agree to plant a large garden for home use and a balanced crop program will be encouraged. This year, however, particular emphasis will be laid on the part-time duty of all growers to produce food crops and oil bearing crops outlined by the department of agriculture as all important goals in meeting the urgent war needs.

Loans are also available from this agency to purchase or produce feed for livestock. A first mortgage on livestock to be fed is the security for this type of loan.

Applicants who can obtain loans from banks, production credit associations or on reasonable terms from other sources are not eligible for Emergency Crop loans.
