Rainfall Below Normal Here For The Year

Rainfall in Haskell for May and for the first five months of 1970 is running slightly below normal, according to figures released by Sam Herren, "The Weatherman."

Precipitation for May was 1.93, while normal for the month is 2.99. Annual rainfall here is 3.09; however, a total of 8.31 inches has been gauged here for the first five months of the year.

Here is how the rains came during May: May 12, .92; May 26, .02; May 28, .77; May 29, .14; May 30, .08. Total, 1.93.

Lowest readings in May were on June 1 and 2, when the temperature dropped to 41 degrees for two consecutive days. A high of 95 was registered on May 10.

"The following is the recipe," she writes, "is a favorite of mine because of the simplicity, yet those being served are delighted with the surprise of finding an egg nested under the lid of a potato. I served this at a brunch recently with a slice of home fresh strawberries and rolls."

Egg Cream
Select fine Irish potatoes, wash well and wrap in aluminum foil, making boats with twisted ends. Bake until well done, about one hour. Carefully unwrap the potatoes, leaving them on the foil. Slice the top off, lengthwise and set it aside.

Using a small spoon, scoop out the pulp and season to taste as for mashed potatoes. Next half fill the potato shell with light seasoned pulp and then break an egg into each, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Coat the underside of the potato lid with four cream or butter and replace it on the potato. Rewrap the potatoes, again making boats with the twisted ends, and bake at 375 degrees F. for 30 to 35 minutes. Serve immediately.

ACTIONS OF PEDESTRIANS

Why does a man challenge two tons of steel with equanimity? Courage isn't the answer.

The answer is foolhardiness on the part of a fool who may not stay hardy long. The pedestrian who crosses a street between intersections, who crosses at intersections against "don't walk" signs, who assumes all drivers are super-alert and super-considerate—he's no hero. He's a chump.

The 1970 edition of the annual booklet of highway accident statistics from The Travelers Insurance Companies, shows that crossing between intersections proved fatal last year to more than 4,040 pedestrians. Even at intersections, more than 2,190 persons were killed. The third major cause of pedestrian fatalities in 1969 was walking on rural highways. Some 1,400 lives were snuffed out here.

Many of those of the third category contributed to their own deaths by wearing dark clothes while walking at night or walking with their backs against traffic. Wear light colored clothing at night, walk facing traffic, cross only at intersections, AND with the traffic light. These are weary admonitions—but widely ignored. Why? Because "it can't happen to me!"

But, dear pedestrian, it can—and did to almost 10,000 fellow pedestrians in 1969 alone.

Texas Traffic Accident Cost Spiraling Upward

Traffic accidents cost Texans nearly \$38 million during April, according to the Texas Safety Association.

The total cost of traffic accidents during the first four months of the year was more than \$185 million, when computed according to a National Safety Council formula.

So far this year, the Texas Safety Association said that the most startling increase in traffic accidents and fatalities has occurred on the state's Farm to Market roads. Preliminary reports show a 51 per cent increase in traffic fatalities on the rural road system over the same period last year.

Traffic collisions on Farm to Market roads so far in 1970 have cost Texans an estimated \$23 million.

TSA reminds motorists who use the Farm to Market System that staying alert to such traffic hazards as slow moving vehicles and intersecting roadways can reduce traffic collisions and deaths.

The statewide safety group also emphasized the need for motorists to use seat belts and shoulder harnesses while driving on any roadway since a driver's chances of survival in a crash are five times as great if he is not thrown from the car.

Daily potential was 55 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 15 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 4,757-70 ft., treated with 500 gallons of 15% acid. The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 4,900 feet, total depth.
