» NEWS BRIEFS «

Funeral services were held in Floydada Sunday afternoon for Luther Roberts, 44, who died there on Saturday. He was a brother of Frank Roberts of this city.

Hale County Judge Frank R. Day and Commissioners L. M. Rankin, R. A. Daugherty and Chas. Howard attended a meeting of West Texas County Judges and Commissioners in Midland last week.

Abernathy elevators have received more than 150 cars of grain from the fall grain sorghum crops in this territory. The grain has come in faster than freight cars could be obtained to move it out of the elevators, and long, high piles of grain are at both elevators. Although the rush period has passed, the grain is still coming in at a rapid rate.

Abernathy gins had received about 215 bales of cotton, reports Tuesday afternoon revealed.

Funeral services were conducted in Lubbock last Thursday for Mrs. Hayden Morgan, 31, who died unexpectedly at her home in Lubbock on Tuesday last week. Rev. Frank Beauchamp, local Methodist minister, officiated. She was a sister of Mrs. Robbie Heath and a granddaughter of Mrs. W. H. Ragland, both of this city. Mr. Morgan, in the army, was in Africa when relatives last heard from him.

Heavy mist was falling Wednesday at noon here, and cotton and feed harvesting had been halted by the moisture. The sun was shining again Wednesday afternoon, however.

Marion Kee, 4-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Shipman, was only slightly injured Saturday afternoon when one wheel of a car passed over his chest. He and some other children were pushing the car, a light sedan owned by Dick Hughes, in the Shipman yard south of town when the accident happened. He was taken to a Lubbock hospital for observation, and was returned home early this week.

HALE COUNTY BUDGET SHOWS FINANCES SOUND

Hale county's 1944 budget, presented by County Judge Frank R. Day before the commissioners' court, was unanimously adopted in a recent session. No increase in tax valuations was made and the .53c tax rate was continued. The report revealed that no precinct or county fund was in arrears and substantial balances are maintained in almost all funds.

The county general fund has a balance of \$22,926.45, as of Jan. 1, 1943, and an estimated balance of almost \$40,000 is expected for Jan. 1, 1944. Nearly 100 percent in collections of taxes and adjusted taxes is responsible for the large balances, it was stated. Courthouse and jail fund showed a balance of \$19,080.77 and the interest and sinking fund had a balance of \$20,025. The county also has assets of \$40,000.00 in government bonds purchased last May.

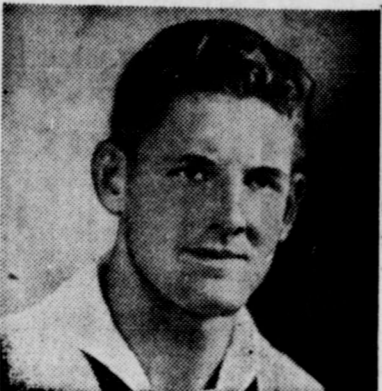

Roy, who started training in Kansas in July, was placed in fullback position on Pitt Gorilla football team by KSTC Coach Charlie Morgan.

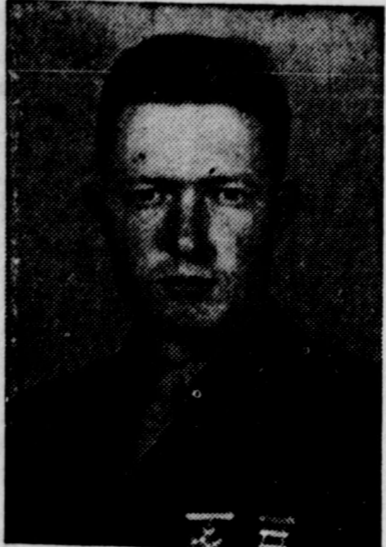

They can't fully realize why and for what things this war is being fought. If they had to leave it all and come out here it would really open their eyes.

"We out here have one satisfaction, and that is knowing that when we have won we can come back home to the best place in the world, knowing that what we did out here was to preserve those things back home so that we could come back to them and to prove to ourselves, Tojo and Hitler, that no one can take them away from us!"

NEW CO-OP GIN BEGINS OPERATION

HERE THIS WEEK

The new plant of Abernathy Farmers' Co-op gin is expected to be ready for operation Saturday, Odie Hamilton, manager, announced early this week. All of the gin machinery is new. The engine and most of the press unit, which escaped damage in the fire that destroyed the plant early this year, have been reconditioned. The new machinery, made by Hardwicke-Etter, includes among other equipment, five 80 saw stands.

All of the machinery of the plant is housed in a new all-steel building. The large seed house and cotton platform is of wooden frame work covered with sheetrock.

Rummage Sale To Start Saturday

Church women of Abernathy are making plans to start the annual rummage sale here Saturday, Oct. 2. Women from the various churches will be on hand each Saturday at 10 o'clock during the fall rush, at Scroggin's fruit stand one door east of Roberts Drug, to take care of the sales of used clothing and shoes. Any one in the community who has clothing to donate may leave it at the Merritt laundry for the women or they may contact members of the committees from the churches. Clothing of all kind may be brought in, the only request is that it be clean. Many of those who buy the clothing prefer to make the repairs themselves, but a clean, repaired garment will bring a higher price than one unrepaired. Under the present circumstances, shoes that have been outgrown by children and need slight repairs will be in demand.

For several years now the church women of the town have each fall held the rummage sale which has made money for many items of benefit to the local churches, as well as for the various missionary projects which are financed by them.

This year it is particularly vital that all materials be conserved and this is a good way to help.

Abernathy Needs \$54,000 To Meet Quota In Bond Drive

Reports from N. C. Hix Tuesday night said Abernathy territory was \$54,000 short of its quota of \$151,000 in the 3rd War Loan Drive. A total of \$95,029.50 had been paid for bonds at the bank and postoffice here, and \$2,000 invested in bonds by Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. had been credited to our quota, making a total of slightly over \$97,000.00.

Reports said the 3rd War Loan Drive will be extended to Saturday instead of closing today (Thursday), on sales of negotiable securities, and to Oct. 16 on "E" bond quotas.

Residents of the area are urged to BUY EXTRA BONDS TODAY to meet and exceed our quota.

COUNTY CHAIRMAN ISSUES APPEAL FOR HALE TO MEET ITS 3rd LOAN WAR BOND QUOTA

"If Hale county wants to make its war bond quota in the 3rd War Loan drive, it is high time those who have not bought commensurate with their ability, do so!" said H. S. Hilburn, county chairman, today. "Those who have been holding back for last minute purchases, if needed, should buy quickly, all that they can afford to invest with the government.

"Everyone asks, 'How are we coming?' A check made on issuing agencies in the county Wednesday noon shows we lack \$123,000. We are holding back nothing as a 'back log' in our reports," Hilburn said. "This is the people's business and we have been frank and open in our reports, and will always continue to be.

"Everyone of us must work like beavers if we go over the top. We have bought only \$60,000 since Saturday. Orders for negotiable issues must be postmarked not later than midnight Saturday or it will be forever too late to get in on the 3rd War Loan on this type investment.

"The figures on the 3rd War Loan is as personal to us as a Nazi or Jap bullet to our son and neighbor's son. 'What excuse can we possibly give to one of Mark Clark's Fifth army boys in Italy for not helping him by buying an extra bond or two today? Will that excuse stand up?"

"You say you haven't the money, or you haven't been asked. If we are spending our time thinking up excuses for not buying EXTRA war bonds we don't deserve the sacrifices being made for us on the bloody sands of Europe and the Pacific," Hilburn said. "Salerno was strewn with American bodies . . . and not excuses!"

H. V. Tall, Jr., vice-chairman in charge of the 3rd Loan in Hale county, said, "It's high time for action—it's time for the last ditch stand. —Those of you who have been holding back to do some EXTRA buying, if required to do make the county quota, need wait no longer. —It is now time to HURRY! We CANT afford to FAIL!"

Rationing Calendar

Stoves — Purchase certificates can be obtained from county ration board.

Gasoline — A-8 coupons now good for 3 gals each.

Shoes — Stamp No. 18, (1 pair), good thru Oct. 31.

Sugar — Coupon No. 14, book 1, good for 5 lbs. thru Oct. Stamps 15-16 good for 5 lbs. each for home canning thru Oct. 31. If additional is needed, apply through ration board.

Blue Stamps (Processed Foods) — U, V & W now good, expire Oct. 20.

Meats, Fats, Etc. — Red stamps X, Y & Z good thru Oct. 2. Brown Stamps A & B in Book III good thru Oct. 2. Brown stamp C good thru Oct. 30, and D, which becomes good Oct. 3, is good thru Oct. 30, also.

Tire Inspection — "A" book holders should have tires inspected by Sept. 30; "B" bookholders, third inspection by Oct. 31; "C" bookholders, fourth inspection by Nov. 30, and "T" bookholders should have tire inspection every 60 days, or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Dear Buford:

Just a line to ask about things at home. I'm doing fine here. Wish the Plains had some of the rain we have been getting every since I came back to camp. It's unusual weather here, the natives say. It's cool enough to make a heavy undershirt feel comfortable.

I certainly hated to come back here after spending a few days at home. Suppose all the boys feel that way, but we all have to come back. I've seen a lot of towns since I en-

tered the service but none of them are as good as the old hometown.

Must close now to go on guard duty—and down here in Louisiana, that's a tough job.

Just a few lines to let you know I am still getting the Review and enjoy it very much.

Just recently I was transferred to this auxiliary field. This is a small

outfit and the duty is very good so I am very well pleased. Franklin is a small place but the people are really tops. I think the best part of it, tho, is that we are the only service group in this vicinity and believe me it's something to get away from a place that is overcrowded with servicemen. Dear Buford:

I have been in the Naval Hospital here in San Diego for the last two weeks. I only had my tonsils removed, so I haven't been sick since about the third day. They have some of my records mixed up, so I am having to wait here until they are straightened out.

Most of the fellows here are men who have been in action against the enemy in fighting all over the world. Lots of them will be crippled for the rest of their lives. Several that I have talked with have the Purple Heart, but they all say that they, nor anyone else, would go through what they did for any award, except the freedom of their country, and the rights and privileges that they enjoy in being a part of this country.

I like it here just swell because the chow is good and we don't have to work very hard, yet I would like to go back to duty so I would know that I was doing a little good, even if it was chipping rust or painting on a ship, because, after all, that has to be done. Of course, the painting and all is just a temporary job, while I'm waiting to be shipped out.

RULES FOR MAILING CHRISTMAS PACKAGES TO SOLDIERS OVERSEAS

TIME OF MAILING—Gift packages may be mailed to American soldiers overseas without presentation of a request from the soldier during the period from September 15 to October 15.

SIZE AND WEIGHT—Packages must not exceed five pounds in weight, 15 inches in length and 36 inches in length and girth combined.

LIMITATIONS—Only one such package will be accepted for mailing by or on behalf of the same person or concern to the same addressee during any one week. It should be indorsed "Christmas Gift Parcel". Perishable matter will not be accepted.

ADDRESSING—Write legibly and give full name, Army serial number, service organization and unit, APO number of addressee and the post office through which parcels are to be routed.

PREPARATION—It is absolutely necessary that articles be packed in substantial boxes or containers and that various gifts in a combination be securely fitted. Pointed or sharp-edged instruments should be protected. Candies in thin pasteboard boxes should be enclosed in wood, metal or corrugated pasteboard.

POSTAGE—The rate on parcels of fourth class matter (exceeding eight ounces) is the zone rate applicable from post offices where mailed to the post office in care of which parcel is addressed. The third class rate of one and one-half cents for each two ounces applies to package not exceeding eight ounces. Parcels containing only books are acceptable at the special rate of three cents a pound. Inscriptions such as "Merry Christmas" or "Don't Open Until Christmas" may be placed on the covering but should not interfere with the address.
