"It is a known fact that July traffic is more hazardous due to crowded conditions of the highways. Add driver misbehavior, misjudgment, negligence, and the drinking of intoxicating beverages while driving is like a giant exploding fire cracker," Bell said.

"In an all-out effort to keep this estimated toll down, the Texas Department of Public Safety will utilize additional personnel from its other services to augment the Highway Patrol force during the holiday period," Bell added


'However, the most important effort in reducing traffic accidents must come from the individual drivers," concluded Major Bell.



Today, the surest means of a book becoming a best seller is for the author to highlight and denounce bitterly the faults of this country. The same can be said of television and the movies, which prefer in these modern days to depict the seamier side of life in America.

But there's hope. As I have moved across this state, I have sensed that our people are growing weary of gloom. It's becoming easier to strike up a conversation on what's right about America.

I always suggest that there are a lot more level heads in this country than we are sometimes led to believe. There are a lot more decent, law-abiding citizens than there are crimi-nals and cheats and sharks. There are a lot more young people in the "now" generation who want to improve America who want to improve America than the handful of radicals who want to burn it to ashes and start all over.

I can understand why the "majority" has broken its "si-lence." There's a growing impatience with agitation and controversy. But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind.

I've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their govern-

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assur-ance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970s with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old poli-tics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.
