Lt. Rodgers Awarded Purple Heart Medal

Awarding of the Order of the Purple Heart to 2nd Lt. Horace C. Rodgers in England has been announced. He was wounded Aug. 27, while participating in a bombing raid over France. Lt. Rodgers was co-pilot of a medium bomber on the raid.

He is a son of Mrs. Audie Rodgers of Covington. The Rodgers family resided here 11 years, from 1924 to 1935.

Lt. Rodgers was released from the hospital and returned to duty in September.

HAWKINS LANDS A DEAD PLANE

(Editor's note: Here is a news story from the Paducah Post which will be of interest to the friends of Mrs. Merle Hawkins, a former chief operator at Abernathy Telephone office. She and her mother, Mrs. W. E. Madera, who also resided here, now live in Paducah.)

Lt. W. L. Hawkins, of the U. S. Army Air Forces, landed his four-motored B-17 bomber, "Sweater Girl," in a perfect "dead stick" landing at an air base in England after a raid in Southwest Germany. Lt. Hawkins, who has been affectionately nicknamed "Honest Abe" because of his likeness to "Honest Abe" in stature and facial characteristics, has built up the remarkable record of 17 raids with the same engines in his faithful bomber.

"Abe" and his co-pilot, Lt. D. G. Barnes of El Paso, so skillfully maneuvered the huge plane, when she ran out of fuel 2,000 feet above the home field, that the other crew members were unaware the ship was in trouble until the landing had been effected.

"Landing a B-17 without power is like trying to fly a brick," Hawkins said, "but Barnes and I were too busy to be scared."

Lt. Hawkins is the elder son of Mrs. Merle Hawkins and is a grandson of Mrs. W. E. Madera, both of Paducah.

Lt. Hawkins, who was graduated from Petersburg High school, enlisted from Abilene. He received his wings and commission at Victorville, Calif., Nov. 25, 1942, and landed in England May 2, this year. Lt. Hawkins has the air medal and two oak leaf clusters.

His younger brother, Eddie, who attended Abernathy school, is a senior student in Paducah High school.

Notice To School Patrons

Members of Abernathy school board think that the community will be better served by not dismissing school for cotton picking. Valuable time is wasted in stopping and starting school. If teachers are stopped from their work, they might not be available when school is resumed. Teachers are difficult to replace.

It may be advisable to keep your child out of school for a week or two to help in gathering of your crop. Such action may be more desirable than dismissing all students. If students are kept out of school for gathering of crops, the teachers pledge their assistance in helping these students make up any work missed.

Due to unsettled weather conditions, the dismissal of school was not considered desirable from any angle at the present time.

It has been and will continue to be our policy to direct the school in such a manner that it will serve you and the best interests of the community.

Geo. Neely, a former resident of Abernathy, died Thursday at Memphis. Further details were not available at press time.

Damages, estimated at between \$6,000 and \$8,000, resulted from a fire in T. B. Stone Gin cotton storage house early Friday night. Nearly half of the structure was damaged, including all machinery used in unloading and cleaning cotton going into stalls. Fire originated in one of the stalls in which cotton was being unloaded. Some of the cotton, about 25 bales, which was in the house, may be salvaged. Stone carried insurance on the building and contents. Efforts of volunteer firemen and others saved most of the structure, which may be put back into use this season if labor and material can be obtained.

Another scrap metal collection drive is to be staged.

A 9-ft. American flag soon will be flying from a recently erected pole on the east lawn at Tuco. The aluminum colored pole, made of scrap material, is 60 feet tall with a base of five inches and tapering to one and three-fourths inches at the top. Several employees of the plant helped make the pole, "but most of the credit goes to M. C. Davidson and Frank Lowe," R. T. Price, chief engineer at Tuco, stated.

Fortress Pilot Tells of Raid Over Germany

(Editor's note: Kermit D. Woodriddle, former Abernathy lad, who recently was advanced to rank of 1st lieutenant, and was awarded decorations in England, describes his first raid over Germany as a pilot of a Flying Fortress. The account is given in a letter received here last week by his sister, Lois Ann Woodriddle. He is the son of Mrs. Dot Woodriddle of Abernathy.)
Hello Sis:

Everything is about the same over here—same old routine every day. Of course it gets exciting at times, if you know what I mean. As you have probably read—I was awarded an Air Medal, an Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Distinguished Flying Cross a short time ago. As it has been released, I can tell you in part what happened on my very first raid into Germany.

We were flying along in formation on our way back home from the target when one of my engines quit on me. I was unable to keep up with the rest of the planes and finally found myself alone, far behind the group. Well, about that time 40 enemy fighters attacked my ship and began to raise hell in general. I was flying at 26,000 feet at the time and there were some scattered clouds about 2,300 feet below me, so I decided that to reach those clouds was my only chance for those fighters were literally tearing my plane to pieces.

You can't even begin to realize the sensation I had when feeling their shells hit the plane and exploding, tearing huge holes in it. Well, anyway, I started down at a terrific rate of speed for a bomber, meanwhile maneuvering violently to try and make the fighters miss me. They followed me all the way down, shooting most of the rudder and elevator off and shooting out another motor, leaving me with two. Then, as I got down to an altitude of 12,000 feet they filled the sky with anti-aircraft fire from the ground. It's called flak over here. That stuff started hitting us, too, and soon there were huge holes in both wings, part of my control cables were shot away and the hydraulic system shot out, leaving me without brakes. I finally got down to a cloud and ducked into it. It wasn't very large, though, and soon came out of it. The fighters, yes, there were still at it, made another pass at us as I ducked into another cloud. Then they left. I suppose they thought we would never get across the channel and back home, for we were nothing but a smoking wreck, with two motors and practically no controls. We were lucky enough to make it back to our field and landed o. k. There are quite a few details I can't tell about yet, but that gives you an idea of what goes on over here. Well, I will close for now.


