Buford, please forgive me for not writing more often, but, really, my day is usually too short for me to do all the things that have to be done, and the things I want to do. I appreciate your sending the paper more than words can ever tell you. Even though I don't write, I am always thinking of what you are doing and what it means to those of us who are away from home, thanks a mill'on times.

I suppose you have been reading about what these B-26's are doing to the Axis. I can truthfully say it has taken them quite a while to make a name for themselves, but all of us fellows who work on them and know what makes them tick can understand how they are getting the job done. We are proud of them and will continue to be 'til the Axis is whipped.

It seems that our job here is rather insignificant but if we don't keep 'em flying over here, they won't fly over there, so I suppose we have an important job to do as well as the fellows on the front. Bye the way—just in case someone asks, you, there is plenty of work to keep a B-26 in the air.

I read Corky's letter and piece to the boys in the Review today. I really enjoyed it a lot and think the women are doing a swell part as well as the men. May I say to Corky and the other women in the service, you are doing a big job for the best country ever to be, for the grandest uncle we will ever have; so keep on working. We fellows are for you and we are your buddies 'til victory is ours!

As yet, I don't like Kansas, but I shouldn't talk, because a lot of fellows talk about Texas, but it has one thing no other state will ever have and that is my home.

The weather situation is subject to change a dozen times a day without notice. It may be hot, cold wet, or dry. Right now, it is wet and is getting wetter. We have had a good rain today. Thanks again for the Review. Your friend, J. B. Jones.

NEWS OF OUR MEN and WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Second Lt. Earl E. Crow, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Crow, is now a B-24 instructor at Liberal Army Air field, Liberal, Kan. Lt. Crow enlisted in the Air Corps Oct. 17, 1942, and received his wings in the 4th field, Brady, Goodfellow field at San Angelo, and Ellington field, Houston, where he received his wings and commission on July 28. He is a graduate of Abernathy High school and attended Texas Tech two years. He was an employe of Peoples Ice Co. prior to appointment as an aviation cadet. Lt. Crow is married and has two children. His wife and children are residing in Liberal. — Lt. Crow has graduated from the Liberal field after nine weeks of four-engine bomber training. Already a commissioned Air Corps pilot when he reported at Liberal, he is now rated an "airplane commander," qualified to lead the crew of a B-24 Liberator bomber.

Pvt. Garland Elkin, 22, above, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer G. Elkins, who reside southwest of Abernathy, is serving with the U. S. Army in Newfoundland. A former student of Abernathy High school, Garland married Miss Freda Dickson of Lubbock on Jan. 17, 1942. He entered the service Aug. 27, 1942, and from the Ft. Sill, Okla., reception center, was sent to Camp Stewart, Ga., for basic training. In December of 1942 he was sent to Camp Miles Standish, Mass., and to Newfoundland in April. RATIONING COUPONS
Gasoline — A-8 coupons now good for 3 gals each.
Shoes: Stamp No. 18 in book 1 valid indefinitely for 1 pr. shoes. It overlaps Stamp No. 1 on airplane sheet of Book 3, good after Nov. 1.

Sugar — Coupon No. 14, book 1, good for 5 lbs. thru Oct. Stamps 15-16 good for 5 lbs. each for home canning thru Oct. 31. If additional is needed, apply through ration board.

Blue Stamps (Processed Foods) — Blue stamps X, Y, Z good thru Nov. 20. Green stamps A, B & C in Book 4 become good Nov. 1 and remain valid thru Dec. 20.

Meats, fats—Brown stamps C, D, E & F good thru Oct. 30.
Brown stamp G now good thru Dec. 4.
Brown stamp H becomes good on Oct. 31 and remains good thru Dec. 4.

Tire Inspection — A bookholders must have 3rd official inspection by March 31, 1944; B bookholders, 3rd inspection by Oct. 31; C bookholders 4th inspection by Nov. 30; TT bookholders should have tire inspection every 60 days, or every 5,000 miles whichever comes first.

SOLDIERS GATHER MORE THAN 100 TONS OF SCRAP METAL

In only one week's time, the crew of 47 soldiers from Amarillo Army air base stationed at Hale Center has salvaged more than 100 tons of scrap metal from farms, old lake beds and other sources, and has shipped it direct to steel mills in three rail cars this week. The group, headed by Lt. Clyde Hendrickson, lost six of its members Wednesday when they were called back to the base. Despite the shortage, the remaining men will continue the county-wide farm-to-farm canvas for scrap. They have 17 vehicles, including two large cranes, to handle all kinds of scrap metal.

Hail place, 9 miles west and 1 1/2 miles north of Hale Center. Kenneth Bozeman will be auctioneer and V. L. Martin, clerk.

Seale and McDonald will be auctioneers for a sale Thursday next week on the M. E. Chick farm, five miles east and 1 1/2 miles south of Hale Center. Thirty head of extra fine cattle, as well as farm equipment, other livestock and household items are listed for sale. See the special advertisement in this issue.

DAIRY FEED PRICE PAYMENTS TO BE MADE IN NOVEMBER

Dairy feed price adjustments will be made to Hale county dairymen after Nov. 1, said J. B. Martin, Hale county ACA administrator. He said records must be kept on sales of whole milk, butterfat and that satisfactory reports must be made if payments on the dairy feed subsidy are received. Where whole milk is sold records are necessary on only weight and other records on a butterfat basis.

For this area, payment to 40c per 100 lbs. on whole milk and 5c per lb. on butterfat. Martin urges dairymen who want the payments to either write his office or contact him in person so sufficient forms may be made available for the payments. First payments will be on October sales.

CAN STILL SEND SOME GIFTS

Christmas packages for soldiers overseas which have been returned to the sender because of an improper address still may be mailed, the War Dept. says. The original wrapper, bearing the indorsement, "Return to sender, Insufficient Address," must be submitted with the correctly addressed package to prove it originally was mailed before the Oct. 15 deadline. Another reason — If your boy in service is changed to an overseas address between now and Dec. 10, even tho the deadline for mailing Christmas gifts to soldiers

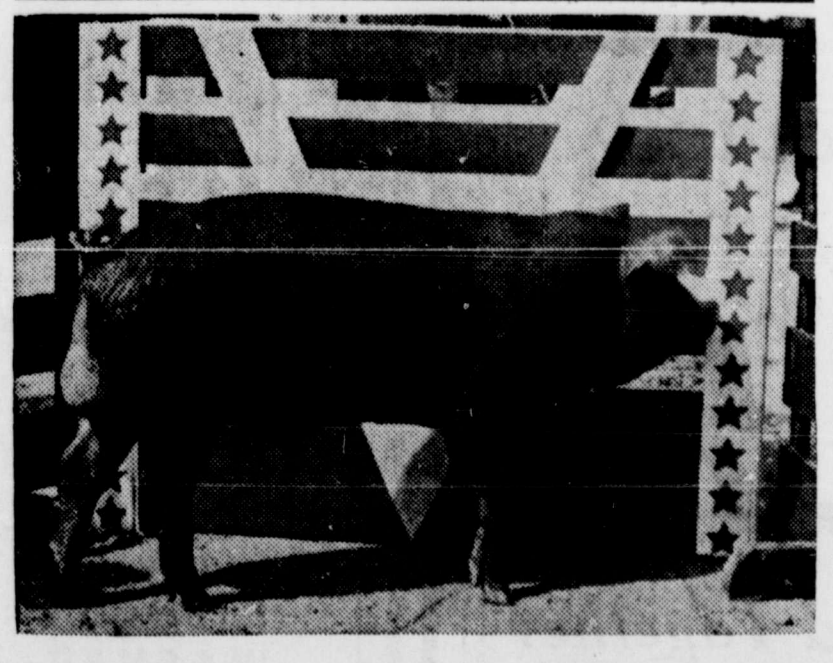
"Salute for Three" Is Free Show

October 20, 1943.

Dear Buford:
Yesterday at noon I received three copies of the Abernathy Review. I have never enjoyed anything as much as I did those papers. So many of the people I read about I had lost sight of in the last few years — it was like meeting someone from home. Thank you so much for the papers.

I will have been in the service a year in February. I like the service very much—in fact, three days after I got in the army I had almost forgotten how I lived as a civilian. I find that nearly every one feels the same way—it is the routine, I suppose. Besides our job, we have physical education and drill three times a week. Once a month we each have our day on K. P.—which, incidentally, isn't as bad as story and song would have you believe—but it isn't so good either. We all have numerous other duties outside of working hours — so you see, we have very little spare time. But, oddly enough, very few of us would change back.

Florida is quite lovely now — the climate is wonderful—but, this past summer the heat and mosquitos were terrific. But, I haven't seen a state yet that compares with Texas. I had a card from Rudolph Richter recently — he saw my name in the Review. I am stationed only 40 miles from Miami — wish I could have seen him before he left. That is very typical of the army, though.
